Children, Families Benefiting from Mission: Haiti Programs

Progress is being made in programs launched by Mission: Haiti's to help atrisk children and families.

According to the latest update from Helen Roenfeldt, Executive Director for the organization, this year will end on a much happier note that it began for dozens of children.



Faith Boys Home in Gonaives is being repainted, the garden is being expanded and new chicken coops are being built.

"Fifteen girls from the ages of 3-15 will move into their new home by the end of December," Roenfeldt said. "Many of the girls come from severely at-risk situations.

"Thanks to donations to Mission: Haiti, 40 boys and girls have new clothing and shoes and eat three meals a day."

Construction will begin before the end of the year on the third children's home to be built through Mission: Haiti. This new facility, being built in the rural area of Poto, will welcome between 15-

20 children as it is finished.

Mission: Haiti medical teams have been focusing on the area called Jubilee, where the poverty is "almost indescribable," Roenfeldt continued.

"There is no sanitation, no place to grow food, 75% of the children under puberty had no

clothing, only about 20% of the children go to school and serious disease is rampant. The Lutheran Church of Haiti with Mission: Haiti was the first mission team to ever enter this Voodoo stronghold.

"There are now more than 100 new Christians in the area, a modest structure used for a church and clinic."

Mission: Haiti has provided funds for more than 20 microloans to help individuals and families support themselves.

"Microloans of \$50 - \$100 are given for business as diverse as repackaging rice for resale, purchasing and boiling eggs for sale and mattress repair and refurbishing," Roenfeldt elaborated. "We are especially grateful to our mission teams and the many churches and LWML groups who made pillowslip dresses, donated gym shorts, shoes, underwear, baby clothes and food for these who feel abandoned and hopeless.

"The love and care of Jesus shines through the gifts and service that has been provided by your generosity!"

A recognized 501(c)3 non-profit organization, Mission: Haiti has

> been endorsed by the Florida-Georgia District. The organization began in 1999 when leaders in the District saw the need to help support the growing Lutheran Church in Haiti. Advised by and accountable to the Florida-Georgia District, Mission: Haiti networks with other mission societies and

humanitarian organizations to provide support, assistance, disaster relief, medical care, education opportunities, and develop self-sufficiency projects administered through the Lutheran churches of Haiti.

Linking Reformation & Christmas An Opportunity to Focus on the True Meaning of This Season!

It seems like only yesterday we celebrated Reformation, then Thanksgiving quickly came and went, and now our focus is once again on Christmas.

As early as mid-October I began seeing the signs of

the trappings of Christmas. The commercialization of Christmas appears earlier and earlier, and numbs us to the reality of what Christmas truly is all about. All around us we find laws that prohibit our celebration, stores that refuse to speak the word Christmas, communities no longer allow crèche scenes to be erected and schools now have winter

holiday parties to be inclusive. And all the while Satan sits back with a jolly "Ho, ho, ho."

Maybe there's a link between Reformation and Christmas. I think we find it in 2 Corinthians 5:21, where Paul writes, "God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God."

As the Reformation reminds us that we are justified by grace apart from the law through Jesus Christ, so Christmas reminds us that God sent us this precious gift so that we would have eternal life.

Perhaps the church should jump on the opportunity that the world affords us! I think there is more of a correlation between Reformation and Christmas than maybe we've given credence. For instance, in the Reformation Luther wanted to restore the centrality of the Gospel so that people would not be burdened

by the law, but rather comforted by the hope of eternal life in Jesus Christ. In the Reformation, Luther wanted to re-focus the Church from spending time on all the peripheral things, all the rites and ceremonies that don't mean much



without understanding that it's all about Jesus, to focusing on the death and resurrection of Jesus and His grace and forgiveness.

Perhaps it's time for the Church to do something similar so that the world understands the true meaning of Christmas once again. Maybe it's time to reform Christmas!

In our day Christmas has become an opportunity to live large and get into debt purchasing gifts. The older I get the more I realize that the best gift of all is that of time. Spending time with the ones I love can't be bought at any price, although, at times, it may cost me.

To build relationship with others will take sacrifice and an investment of time. I have to be flexible and responsive and can't always have my own way. It means that I have to put others before myself.

Isn't that really what Christmas

is all about? At Christmas we remember how God, in love, put you and me first, all because He wanted to spend time with us. God sent Jesus into our human flesh so that we could enjoy a renewed relationship with our Creator,

> and have the best gift of all — the gift of salvation and eternal life. **Jesus sacrificed** all the comforts of heaven, lowered Himself to be born of a woman, humbled Himself to experience the normal human situations from infancy to puberty to adulthood all so that you and I would be freed from our sinful condition

and enjoy the blessings of an eternity with God.

Yet in our day so many people, even churched people, fail to recognize the wonder and blessings of this magnificent season to remember the glorious joy and blessing of our faith.

Maybe you've heard the story about the lady who was doing some last minute shopping with kids in tow, and having a hard time keeping it all together. As she shoved her way into a crowded elevator, she said, "I don't know who's responsible for all this Christmas stuff, but they ought to arrest him, string him up, and shoot him." Someone from the back of the elevator quietly said, "Don't worry, they already arrested Him, whipped Him, spat on Him, beat Him, taunted Him, nailed Him to a cross, stripped Him and Crucified Him."

It is way too easy to get

so caught up in the things of Christmas that we actually miss what Christmas is truly all about!

One of my favorite Christmas stories is the modern parable told by Paul Harvey about a family on Christmas Eve. This family had a tradition where the Mother and children went to the Christmas Eve service, and the Father stayed home and read the paper. When the family returned from church, they would gather to open their presents. The Father was not an evil man, but he just couldn't believe in the childhood stories anymore of God coming as a baby in a manger.

The family left for church and he began to read the evening paper by the fireplace. Suddenly, he heard tapping on the window. It was a bird flying against the glass trying to get out of the snow into the warmth of his home. The man had compassion on the bird, and he went outside, hoping to bring it in. As he approached the bird, it flew against the window even harder. Pretty soon, the bird flew into the bushes below the window, half frozen, yet too afraid to be caught by this huge man.

The more the man tried to reach for the bird, the more the bird flew frantically into the snow and thorns of the bushes. After a few minutes in the cold and seeing the bird continue to injure itself, the man yelled out in frustration, "Stupid bird, can't you understand that I'm trying to help?" The man paused and thought, "If only you understood you wouldn't fly away ... if only ... if only I could become a

bird, and get you to understand."

Just then, the church bells rang as they always did on the hour. But when the man heard the bells this time, he fell to his knees and began to cry, saying, "Oh, God, I didn't understand. Oh, God, I didn't understand."

Here's the simple truth of Christmas: Jesus came in human form that we might understand from where we have come, for what reason we were separated and how we could be restored to God. The Bible says, "But when the right time finally came, God sent His own Son. He came as the son of a human mother and lived under the Jewish Law, to redeem those who were under the Law, so that we might become God's sons and daughters." TGNT (Ga 4:4-5).

The world around us is so busy living life in survival mode that they don't realize that our God has offered us something better. He's offered us forgiveness of sins and new life in Jesus Christ. He's offered us a personal relationship with Himself for all eternity. I can't imagine it getting better than that!

In the days of the Reformation, Luther discovered the truth of the depth of the love of Jesus, who saves us by grace, through faith and not by works of the law. You can't buy or give enough Christmas presents to earn God's love—or anyone else's. I barely remember the Christmas gifts that my parents gave me —and even the ones that I vaguely recall, I no longer have. But I do remember the time they invested, and continue to invest, in my life.

the lives of my own children, and hopefully will have the opportunity to do that in the lives of my grandchildren when they come along.

Christmas is really all about relationship. First, and foremost, it's about our relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ. Stop during this busy season and reflect how God in His love sent us the precious gift of His Son, Jesus, so that we might have new life. Let that good news inform and reform the way you celebrate this year.

Secondly, may this Christmas be about the relationships that God has put in your life with family and friends, and how you have been so richly blessed by them.

Someone has said that the only thing we'll take to heaven are the relationships that we cultivate in our lives, so make the investment. It has eternal value! May your Christmas celebrations go through a wonderful reformation so that they focus on Jesus. And may your celebrations be used by God to connect others to Jesus this year!



Student Volunteers Needed for Bethesda Summer Camps

More than 750 student volunteers are needed for four Bethesda Lutheran Communities camp programs in Wisconsin, Indiana, Colorado and Texas during the summer of 2014.

Bethesda, a national provider services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, has offered camp and retreat ministry opportunities since 1969. Bethesda camps are designed to engage volunteers (ages 14 and older) as one-to-one companions with people who have developmental disabilities. Activities — including worship, arts and crafts, and outdoor recreation — foster spiritual growth and the development of meaningful friendships. Adults are also needed to serve as cabin leaders and in other capacities.

Camps, which last six days and five nights, are ideal for youth and adult groups and families looking for mission trip and service opportunities, according to Bethesda Representative Nicholas Honeck. Volunteers receive training on topics related to developmental disabilities, including etiquette, personal care and communication.




Lutheran Church Extension Fund was present at the Annual Florida-

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Parsing the Monotheists

Scholars claim that there are three monotheistic religions: Judaism, Christianity and Islam. This can lead to the misunderstanding that the three religions believe in the same God. Do they?

Paul wrote to Timothy — and he writes to us that God "desires all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus who gave Himself as a ransom for all men." (1 Timothy 2:4-6)

What about the Jews? First of all we must say that most Jewish people in America are not religious. They do not belong to a synagogue, they do not celebrate Jewish holidays, they are not familiar with the Jewish Bible (identical to our Old Testament) and most of them have never gone to Israel.

They have only a cultural heritage. We can only speculate what their god is — education, power, money, travel, some kind of worthy cause? But perhaps 40 percent of the Jewish people in America do espouse the religion of Judaism. They believe in the God who revealed himself in the Old Testament to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob — and all the other prophets.

But they do not know

Him, Yahweh, as He really is. Only the Christ, Jesus, reveals God truly. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you really knew me, you would know the Father

guilt. So it is important to continually do mitzvoth (good deeds) to please Him, and perhaps thereby, earn eternal life.

The god of the Muslims is called Allah. The Koran, the holy book of Islam, reveals Allah to be a jealous god who demands obedience, submission and worship to him alone. The shahadah, or basic creed of Islam, is: "There is no god but Allah, and Muhammad

sinners, and seeks them out to forgive them. The Koran says that Jesus is a prophet, but also claims that He is not the Son of God, nor did He die on the cross. Yes, Muslims believe in one god, but not the God of the Bible.

Let me conclude with some good news. The Florida-Georgia District Muslim Evangelism Task Force will be meeting in January to envision how we might better proclaim the Gospel to Muslims.

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Moving Stalled Ministry into Gear

A congregation needs healthy communication in order to grow, according to Rev. James Kress.

That's what members of Redeemer Lutheran Church-Englewood, FL, discovered this summer with the help of LCEF"s VisionPath.

Five years after a leadership change created a major ministry stall, Redeemer is moving forward – with the enthusiastic participation of young working parents as well as retirees and vacationing "snow birds." The VisionPath experience is helping members communicate, focus on ministry and determine a clear direction to best serve their community and the Lord.

"Without VisionPath, we'd probably still be stuck in a meeting," Kress said of the relatively new tool he credits with revitalizing ministry that had become stagnant. With VisionPath and God's help, "we are confident we will produce good fruit for His kingdom."

In 2007, Redeemer continued to benefit from an earlier population boom in Englewood. The growing congregation was looking to the future, including the potential of expanding ministry through its child care and development center.
But plans were put on hold – until this summer when the church council wanted to revisit them but was unsure how to proceed. Daniel J. Reichard, LCEF Florida-Georgia District Vice President, encouraged Redeemer to contact LCEF.

"He told us about a new tool to assist congregations in discovering what ministry, outside Word and Sacrament, God was guiding them to do," Kress said. "He said it would help us get the ball rolling."

In August, Max Biesenthal, Senior Vice President/LCEF Ministry Support, guided Redeemer through the half-day VisionPath event. Members discussed such questions as the greatest point of connection between the church and community and the greatest opportunity facing the ministry.

"It started slow, but by the last hour and a half, there was so much dialogue going on that Max was just nodding his head and allowing members to talk about how best to extend God's Kingdom," Kress said.

The congregation's energy and excitement became "almost palpable," Biesenthal said. "It was blazingly obvious that the Spirit was moving in the hearts of those in attendance to move in a particular direction.

"At the end of the event, they were ready to get going."

Through VisionPath, Redeemer has identified seven "organic" ministry paths, including expanding ministry to meet the needs of young families and children, to strengthen relationships within the church and to enhance outreach and spiritual care to the elderly.

Most of those paths already were in place but had been detoured, Kress aid. The congregation formed a VisionPath Development team of 11 members, ages 29 to 89, including working moms as well as retirees.

"Everyone is not of the same mind, but they all want to come together to see what is best for the congregation's ministry – not what is best for their particular group," Kress said.

The congregation is ranking the seven ministry paths through a survey sent to all who worship at Redeemer – even snow birds.

"We can't accomplish everything at once. We have to set priorities," Kress said.

Along with improving communication, the pastor sees congregants enjoying greater unity. "Though we always will have challenges in ministry, the VisionPath experience opened

up our minds to the idea that we can walk together to spread the Gospel," Kress concluded.


