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

Rev. Lowell Holstein, 78, was called home on October 24 and remembered in a Celebration of Life

in Christ on November 8 at Messiah/Tampa.

A graduate of Concordia Seminary-St. Louis, Pastor Holstein was ordained by his father in 1964 and was a parish minister for more than 25 years – including serving at Zion Lutheran in downtown Tampa. He began working with refugees in 1975 at Fort Chaffee, AR, and in Trenton, NJ, in 1976.

He accepted a call to be Regional Consultant for Refugee Services for Lutheran Ministries of Florida – now Lutheran Services Florida – in 1979. During his decade in that position,

thousands of refugees and immigrants were greeted and cared for with the compassion of Christ as they entered the United States from all parts of the world.

Pastor Holstein is survived by his wife of 55 years, Janet; daughters, Julie Holstein; Susan Tumlin and her husband, Joe, and their three children Emma, Andrew and Kate; sister,

Eunice VanNatta; brother, Rev. Robert Holstein and wife, Lucille; nephews and nieces.

how will I be engaged in this New Year? When I was in the parish I used to try to come up with a catchy way to focus on the year ahead. As I look forward to the New Year this is what jumped in my heart: God's grace will be seen in 2015. I recognize that this is nothing too profound, at least not on the surface. God's grace always abounds. The writer of Proverbs says, "The eyes of the LORD are everywhere, keeping watch on the wicked and the good" (Pr 15:3). In other words, His grace doesn't depend on me seeing it to make it real or valid. His grace is seen even when I fail to see it.

However, wouldn't it be wonderful to see God's grace more and more in the year

made a trip to Haiti to meet with our partner church there, and to see a variety of ministries and opportunities around that country. It was an eye-opening experience. We continued working with Lutheran Hour Ministries on the Outreach Initiative and on revitalization in ministries around the District. We also launched a new training event called Emergent Leaders and partnered with Cornerstone Consultants to equip leaders with additional skills to serve in ministry, whether as a pastor, teacher, administrator or as a lay leader.

Certainly there were difficult things, too. No doubt we all saw loved ones pass to new life. There were also schedule challenges and deadlines and will never leave you nor forsake you," has been by your side every step of the way.

One thing I've learned by reflecting on the past. I can't change it. I can't unsay the stupid thing I said, I can't undo the regrettable thing I did. On the flip side, as much as I want them not to, the celebrations came to an end, the vacations are but a memory, and the good things I accomplished, while past, are hopefully becoming a legacy building for the future.

I learned a long time ago that while I can't change the past, I can influence the future. As this year quickly comes to a close and the year 2015 looms before us, ahead? It can be seen if we just open the eyes of our hearts to see where God is already at work. Paul reminds us, "And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work" (2 Co 9:8).

I believe this requires two things of us. First, that we open ourselves up to His grace in new ways by recommitting ourselves to being in His Word and regularly gathering around the Sacrament of the Lord's body and blood. These are opportunities that we actually have some control over, aren't they? Every year about mid-December I begin praying and considering what devotional materials I'll use in the New Year.

It's become a habit for me. If you were to look in the books on my iPad, you would find a number of sample devotionals that I've checked out to map out the year ahead. The closer I stay to God's Word, the more I see His grace abound.

The second thing this

requires of us is that when we see God's grace abound it should cause good works to abound in us. Elsewhere Paul writes, "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Eph 2:10). You and I were created, or rather re-created in Jesus into a living hope to do the works which God desires us to do. We certainly don't do these in our own strength, but rather by His Spirit working within us. We also read the familiar words in 1 Peter 2:9, "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light." This is a purpose statement. We were chosen to be declarers! And as we declare the wonders of Jesus we see His grace abound more and more!

Being engaged is nothing less than allowing the words of our faith and the actions of our lives intersect in the world around us. It's less about talk and more about action. It's less about defending our faith and more about living it out daily so that our neighbors see Jesus in our lives.

How will you engage in the New Year? Certainly there are

opportunities in our ministries
— congregations, schools, social
ministries and the like. These are
important and commendable.
But how will you move beyond
that into your own home life, or
into your neighborhood, or in
your work place, to be the light
of Jesus in the darkness and see

God's grace abound? How will you make decisions, based on this past year's successes and failures, to adjust your course to live more fully for Jesus so that you connect others to Him?

Maybe it's human nature, but I've found that if I wait to think through those things until after the New Year begins, it's a lot easier to procrastinate and never get to it. But we have a clean slate ahead, a brand-new opportunity to change the future as we think about the past. And we are never alone! Jesus, whose birth we celebrate as the coming of grace in its power; whose death and resurrection assure us of forgiveness and new life; who sent us the Holy Spirit as an Advocate and Comforter and Encourager; this Jesus promises to walk into the New Year with us that His grace may abound as we engage in the future as His disciples.

May God's grace be seen in 2015 in the lives of His people who take seriously His call to engage the world with this good news. May His grace abound in you and overflow so that others might see His grace in our lives,



and taste and see that the Lord is good. He is a good and gracious God who loves us in spite of our frailties and faults; in spite of our doubts and fears; in spite of our faithlessness and failures.



He invites us to look to the past and see His blessings so that as we look to the future we are encouraged to be equipped, empowered and engaged to connect people to Jesus. God has great things in store as we look to the future. May we stand in His Word as His people and engage in that future for the sake of Jesus.

District Leaders Renewed During Three-Day President's Convocation

Professional and volunteer leaders serving Florida-Georgia District churches, schools and ministries were renewed and further equipped to connect people to Jesus during the September 29-October 1 President's Convocation at the Buena Vista Palace Hotel in Lake Buena Vista.

Represented among the 700 participants were 150 churches and 40 schools — including the Lutheran Church of Nassau / Bahamas.

District President Greg Walton welcomed participants, who were purposefully seated with colleagues according to their area of service. "Be equipped, empowered and engaged to connect people to Jesus," he encouraged participants.

"I believe that God has each of us here with a desire to bring us renewal, new insights for ministry and strength to continue to serve Him."

Aspects of the Convocation theme — "Renewal from the Inside Out" — were explored during mega workshops by nationally known speakers Dr. John Eckrich of Grace Place Lutheran Wellness Ministries; Dr. Dina Vendetti of St. John Lutheran School/Dover, DE; Rev. William R. Woolsey, of Cross Point Community Church/Katy, TX; and Rev. Gerald P. Coleman, Director of Music, Christ Lutheran

Church/Washington DC. Coleman was also the music leader for the Convocation.

Designed to accommodate time for fellowship and relaxation, the agenda included workshops that focused on all areas of renewal — including physical fitness, spiritual growth, professional development and personal wellbeing.

Highlights of the Convocation included:


- President's Reception, staged for the first time in the Renewal Mall, site of various exhibits.

Emphasis on Outreach, Revitalization Reflected in District Board Discussions

Meeting in Orlando November 7-8, members of the Florida-Georgia Board of Directors continued work on updating District Success Indicators as part of the business agenda. President Greg Walton shared some of his recent reflections on District activity, and Board members provided their input on the 2014 President's Convocation.

Highlights of the President's Report to the Board are summarized below by ministry targets.

Leadership: District and congregational leaders are loving, visionary people of the Word, models of healthy Christ-centered living and life-long learners committed to equipping and empowering others to join in fulfilling the Church's role in God's mission.

- Emergent Leaders is one of the upcoming signature ministries of the District. The first and second training sessions for the inaugural effort are completed, with the final workshop set for January 2015.
- Circuit Visitation Georgia was done in conjunction with the dedication of the new worship facility for Living Faith / Cumming [see story on page 28]. District Executives visited churches and schools during the visit, which Walton described as "an excellent opportunity to be with and pray for our ministries in Georgia."
- The 2016 National Lutheran Youth Gathering is set for July 16-20 in New Orleans. Planning has begun for District youth participation in the event, themed "In Christ Alone."

Congregations: Congregations of the Florida-Georgia District are growing communities of welcoming, vibrant and faithful followers of Jesus.

• Another signature ministry of the District focused on congregations is Revitalization. The focus on Church health continues "because healthy Churches reproduce naturally," Walton said. Available services to congregations include personal visits, webinars, seminars, coaching in

person and via telephone.

- District Executive Director of Outreach Doug Kallesen has been on the road making regional visits to speak with congregations about their outreach plans, new starts in the region and revitalization efforts. New starts are under way in each of the District's five regions.
- The 2015 District Convention will be held at the Airport Marriott from June 12-14. The theme "Engaged in the Master's Business" is built off of Luke 19:13: "Calling ten of his servants, he gave them ten minas and said to them, 'Engage in business until I come.""

"We will emphasize our privilege and responsibility to connect people to Jesus," Walton said.

Outreach: Living out their faith in Jesus with urgency and joy, the people of the Florida-Georgia District eagerly invest, both individually and corporately, in bold and intentional service and witness to make known the love of Christ to all people.

• Quoting the latest available numbers, Walton announced that in 2012 District congregations reported gains from adult confirmations, professions of faith and child baptisms of approximately 2,300. The top five congregations reporting such gains were: Trinity/Summerfield – 59; Grace/ Jacksonville – 54; Trinity/Delray Beach – 49; St. John/Ocala – 49; Trinity/ Orlando – 47.

- Lutheran Hour Ministry/Florida-Georgia Evangelism Camp was hosted by Living Faith / Cumming, GA, from June 19-21.
- Mission Planters are being contacted for possible service in the Florida-Georgia District. "Pray for workers in the Lord's harvest," Walton encouraged Board members.
- National Hispanic Conference will be held in Tampa from July 28-August 1, 2015. The District has been involved in the planning and will participate to support the event.
- The District Muslim Task Force has established goals with action plans to raise awareness of the tenants of Islam, provide training to respond to or provide positive witness to Muslims in our communities and consider establishing a Missional Community to reach Muslims. The Task Force has the goal of starting cultural centers to reach Muslims in Orlando, Tampa and Atlanta.

The next District Board meeting is scheduled for January 23-24, 2015. ■

Thrivent Cited in Study Fraternal Benefit Societies Generate \$3.8 Billion in Annual Value to America's Communities

According to a new study from the Center for Financial Policy at the University of Maryland, from 2007 through 2011 fraternal benefit societies contributed an average of \$3.8 billion per year to the United States economy.

Even in the face of a deep recession, fraternal benefit societies produce \$76 in value to society for each dollar the federal government invests, through the fraternal tax exemption, to help support their operations. This is according to the study authored by Professor Phillip Swagel of the University of Maryland School of Public Policy and former senior economist in the Bush and Clinton Administrations.

Building on his September 2010 analysis of fraternals' economic contributions, Swagel confirms and expands on that paper's finding that the nation's two largest fraternals (Thrivent Financial and the Knights of Columbus) provided \$3.4 billion in a single year through direct support and social capital. Over the five-year period studied in Swagel's new report, fraternals contributed \$19 billion to the U.S. economy.

Working through grassroots networks of member groups,

fraternal members are engaged in their communities and positioned to identify and help meet pressing needs large and small at the local and national levels. The study finds that fraternals provide direct charitable contributions and volunteerism as well as "social capital," which is built through the efforts of fraternal members bringing people together for the common good and results in stronger communities nationwide.

America's fraternal benefit societies are not-for-profit mutual aid organizations created more than a century ago to serve the financial and social needs of communities. While fraternal benefit societies provide some \$1.6 billion a year in direct contributions to communities, their impact throughout the United States generates another \$1.7 billion in social capital, according to Swagel's comprehensive analysis.

Swagel's latest analysis assesses fraternal activities over a longer period of time and through a broader range of fraternal benefit societies. He demonstrates how such activities build social capital through the networks fraternals create that bring people together for the common good, build

community trust, widen awareness of local needs, educate and inspire younger generations of service, as well as provide a consistent first response in times of crisis – and a consistent presence after the crisis.

For example, Thrivent
Financial and its members serve
as the largest source of nongovernmental support to Habitat
for Humanity International with
fundraising and thousands of
volunteers. Workers at one such
project are pictured below.

At a time of shrinking government budgets and rising demands from communities struggling through a weak economy, this updated study again confirms that fraternal benefit societies represent a tax policy solution with an enormously positive ratio of benefits to costs for society. The beneficial activities performed by government or corporations are important, but cannot replace the level of commitment of dedicated fraternal member-volunteers who are active in their communities and come together through their lodges to help others in a more targeted, efficient and consistent way. As Swagel suggests, "the fraternal is the community."



LSF Head Sam Sipes Elected Chair of National Board

Lutheran Services Florida President and CEO Samuel M. Sipes has been elected Chair of the Board for Lutheran Services in America.

His term as board chair runs through June 30, 2015. Sipes, who joined the LSA Board in 2009, fills the chair position left vacant in September due to the retirement of previous Chair John Bauer.

Since joining LSF in September 2007, Sipes has seen the agency grow from an annual budget of \$34 million serving 33,000 people to a budget of \$200 million serving 130,000 people each year. He manages 1,300 employees who oversee more than 60 programs.

Sipes has an extensive background in leadership roles in nonprofit organizations, as well as experience in child welfare, social services and programs for senior citizens. Prior to joining LSF, he served as President and Chief Operating Officer of Lutheran Social Services of the South in Austin, Texas.

Lutheran Services Florida is a nationally recognized faith-based organization transforming individuals and families by providing healing, hope and help through education and effective human services. LSF is responsive to the changing needs of Florida communities. Established in 1982 by Lutheran churches, LSF is one of the fastest-growing nonprofit organizations in the country.




Speakers and sessions focused on the theme "Reflect His Glory" based on II Corinthians 3:18.



Worshippers gathered at the front doors of the church for the opening of the service, then followed Living Faith Pastor Timothy Droegemueller and other participating clergy inside to the sanctuary.

The journey to this new church home began with a small group of individuals meeting in a residence in 2000. The following year, those individuals began meeting at a school in Cumming and planted a mission church known as Living Faith led by Pastor Ken DeSoto.

In November 2006 – after a few other relocations and an interim pastor – Droegemueller was called. The next year the congregation moved to 103 Buford Dam Road.



After years of seeking a suitable property, Living Faith leaders in 2012 located a site on Highway 9 South in Cumming. Groundbreaking activities were celebrated on May 5, 2013, to begin the initial construction phase for the first permanent home for a congregation that in its short history had met in a house, a school, a hospital and a funeral home.

Living Faith members gathered for the first divine service in the new church on July 20.

Mission Congregation Dedicates First Facility

Pastor's Personal Mission Trip Aids Refugees in Ethiopia, Sudan, Kenya



Rev. Bafel Paul Gak Deng, the former Chairperson of Peace and Reconciliation Commission for Upper Nile State of South Sudan, spent a month this summer on a personal mission trip to aid refugees in Sudan and Ethiopia. Deng is now with the Peace Lutheran / Decatur Sudanese Ministry, which sponsored the trip.

"Malaria threatens thousands of people in refugee camps in Ethiopia, Sudan, Uganda, Kenya and IDPs [internally displaced persons] under the bushes in South Sudan," Deng said. "Many catch the disease each year, and many die from it, mainly children under five years of age and pregnant women. Malaria kills around one child in 20."

Anti-malaria medicines and sleeping under mosquito nets offer protection from the disease.


"Unfortunately, in many places the malaria parasite becomes resistant to anti-malaria drugs and the problem is getting worse in refugee camps," Deng explained. "Therefore, Peace Lutheran Church and the Sudanese Ministry decided to address the concern. "We distributed the mosquito nets to the vulnerable South Sudanese people in refugee camps in Alagai, Judah of Sudan and Tharpham Gambella of Ethiopia. Additionally, we preached the Word of God and empowered refugees to have confidence and strengthen their faith in Christ Jesus, so that they may have hope and peace."

Deng's trip was made possible by many generous donations – including a gift from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod that made it possible to do even more than expected in the camps in Ethiopia.



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Meeting with Pope Generates Smiles

Rev. Dr. Timothy Parsch, Senior Pastor of Bethel / Clearwater, was introduced to Pope Francis by Cardinal Timothy Dolan, Archbishop of New York, outside of the Senate Hall at the Vatican in Rome during a recent trip to Italy.
