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A S I reflect on the District Convention and our theme of "Engaging in the Master's Business," I feel a great deal of joy because of conversations at the Convention with numerous attendees who understood where we are headed.

They got it! Many agreed that it's time for the church to stop all the talk and start to walk the walk!

It was a meaningful theme for me, personally, as it reminds me that there is still much to be done; I have three more years to help our ministries become better equipped, empowered and engaged to connect people to Jesus. So much time and energy went into the planning and preparation for the convention, and I hope it showed.

However, it's time to stop talking about engaging in the Master's business and actually start engaging in the Master's business.

There is much work to be done.
There can be no question in our minds, if we are keeping up with the news these days, that the Church is under attack. Peter's words to the early Christians seem worth reviewing: "Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that

the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world." (1 Peter 5:8–9)

How easy it would be to run and hide, to shelter ourselves in our churches, safe from the evil world all around us! Yet, this is

the very world that we have been called to reach with the good news of Jesus' life and death. This is the very world that Jesus willingly died to redeem. We now have the privilege of being His chosen representatives in the world. Jesus said,

"You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last..." (John 15:16) Imagine that!

God chose each of us to bear fruit for Him in the world. That's where we've been called to serve — in the world!

How often in Scripture do we find Jesus in the Temple or Synagogue? Certainly there are occasions when we find Him there, but more often where we find Him is in the world. We find Him sitting in the homes of tax collectors and talking to prostitutes and the sick

and hurting. We find Jesus seeking out the outcasts and lifting up the hungry and dejected ones.

Interestingly, the same is true of the early Apostles. They traveled from place to place, often in homes,

sometimes in the public square, sharing their personal experiences and their faith in Jesus.

One of the resolutions passed at our District Convention called for congregations to enhance their culture of outreach and be intentional in their mission to BE the church outside of their institutional walls. It's a desire to impact the hurting world all around us with the good news of Jesus. And now, more than ever, God is providing us with opportunities. We shouldn't cower in fear. We should stand boldly in God's love, offering forgiveness and

peace in the midst of chaos.

Jesus said, "But I tell you who hear Me: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. If someone strikes you on one cheek, turn to him the other also. If someone takes your cloak, do not stop him from taking your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you." (Luke 6:27-31)

These are difficult words for us to hear, especially when we already feel mistreated. We often talk about how the church culture is gone, that we are living in a post-church world.

Perhaps a better way to look at it is that we are living in a pre-church world. In many ways the world is more akin to the world in which Jesus entered. No one recognized Him, everyone was looking for something and they just didn't know what. Jesus came and brought healing, hope and peace. He offered forgiveness and love, just the opposite of what people expected of God. They saw God as harsh and One who sat in judgment and didn't care about them.

We often talk about how the church culture is gone, that we are living in a post-church world. Perhaps a better way to look at it is that we are living in a prechurch world.

Ironically, this is the view that many in our world today have of the Church. Many in the world see the Church as judgmental and self-righteous, looking down our nose in disgust at those wicked sinners all around us . . .

I suspect that most of us are familiar with the time Jesus encountered a woman about to be stoned because she was caught in the act of adultery. In the words of John Quiñonas, "What would YOU do?"

We may shake our head and say, "Well, she probably deserved what was coming..." The law actually demanded that she be stoned. Jesus taught a powerful lesson that day.

Listen again to the story: "The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in

adultery, and placing her in their midst they said to Him, 'Teacher, this woman has been caught in the act of adultery. Now the Law Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?' This they said to test Him that they might have some charge to bring against Him. Jesus bent down and wrote with His finger on the ground. And as they continued to ask Him, He stood up and said to them, 'Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her.' And once more He bent down and wrote on the ground. But when they heard it, they went away one by one, beginning with the older ones, and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before Him.

Jesus stood up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you; go, and from now on sin no more."' (John 8:3–11)

Wouldn't it be wonderful if

the Church became known as a

compassionate leader in sharing the forgiveness of Jesus? I don't mean simply among ourselves, but among those who are so desperate to know God's forgiveness and often have no hope. These folks are all around us. They are in our neighborhoods; we shop with them; they are on the highways; sitting in the next booth at the restaurant; standing at the bus stop; in countless bars or hospital waiting rooms. We have something wonderful to share. We have real hope and real peace that

The world around us is changing drastically and quickly. The values we once cherished are being crushed and disregarded. Churches have lost credibility in their communities, and attendance is shrinking in many congregations that fail to embrace their community and meet real needs.

emanate from the Cross of Jesus.

It is time for us to rise up and engage in the Master's business. It's time to act on our profession, to let deeds follow our creeds and become little Christ's wherever God places

us. Now is the time, and we have some great ministry partners to help you get to where God desires you to be — in your community as a light for Jesus!

It's time to boldly move forward, trusting our Lord Jesus to guide us, by conducting His business on His behalf to connect people to Jesus! Let's not just "play" Church! Let's impact lives with the good news of Jesus for now and all eternity!

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District Congregations Recognized for Efforts to Connect People to Jesus

God is good ... all the time ... God is good!

He is at work across our District accomplishing His mission and His will in the lives of people like you and me. And He is using people like you and me as vessels of His mercy and grace!

On behalf of the Florida-Georgia District, the following congregations were awarded certificates to acknowledge their efforts and the Spirit's work in the areas of child baptisms, professions of faith or adult confirmations. These ministries are in the top ten of our District in their respective areas.

- Salem Lutheran Church/ Lake Worth, FL, reported 30 professions of faith mostly as a result of community outreach through revivals and mercy ministry projects. Pastor Elie Louissaint told me that he already has received more than 18 new adults into his confirmation class and has another revival scheduled.
- Hospital de Alma/ Leisure City, FL, had 18 child baptisms, and Pastor Benito Perez Lopez is seeing growth overall again in his congregation. Attendance and giving are also up. He and his wife, Deaconess Jesse, are worker priests who serve as hospice chaplain and hospital chaplain respectively. Their connections through their tent making positions actually enhance their

ministry by connecting them to more people who are open to the Gospel.

- Our Savior/Plantation, FL, was awarded a certificate for 31 child baptisms. As I met with staff I heard of the public school that was adopted by the congregation where children are mentored, loved and prayed for, and how God Almighty deepened many of those relationships. The congregation, which currently has a pastoral vacancy, is poised and
- ready for community outreach as they seek ways to connect people to Jesus. St. Paul/Weston, FL, Pastor Tim Hartner gave me a tour of the new sanctuary. I awarded him with a certificate for 34 Adult Confirmations, the most in 2013 for our Florida-Georgia District. "God is so amazing, He keeps sending us people," said Hartner. "We try to do our part." Holy Cross Lutheran Church and School/North Miami, FL, was my final stop on this road trip. I was able to worship midsummer in a church that was surprisingly full. I heard a wonderful Gospel message on traveling "First Class" with Jesus in a Lutheran service that was blended. There was a baptism scheduled, and I was able to award another certificate to one of our top ten congregations for child baptisms. Pastor

Vice President-Ministry Support;


- Ron Chewning, Founder of Stewardship Advisors; and

LWML Convention in Des Moines

Elections, Adoption of \$2 Million Mission Goal Highlight Gathering

What a convention! Excitement, fellowship, meeting old and new friends – those were all elements of the 2015 International Lutheran Women's Missionary League Convention. How could you possibly go wrong at this convention?

The convention theme was Bountiful! Sow, Nourish, Reap. Isn't that what God does to us? We are sowed by the Holy Spirit, nourished by His Word and we reap the benefits in our lives!

It began on Thursday, June 24, with registration (and let me tell you that there were many, many registrants!). Some 4,600 people attended this convention – including 486 ladies who were First Timers.

There were servant events, choir rehearsals, caucuses and looking at the exhibits to fill the time on

Thursday. The opening worship service that evening featured Pastor Gregory Seltz – speaker for "The Lutheran Hour" – as the proclaimer. It was wonderful to see many pastors attending the worship service! LWML Florida-Georgia District Pastoral Counselor, Rev. Michael Zwemke, took part in this service.

On Friday delegates took their places, all ready to vote in the business portion of the day. The District banner procession began with the Young Women Representatives and District Presidents. Our Young Women Representatives, Darla Schutte and Chelsea Storr, walked with our District President, Bunnie Koelsch. Six LWML past presidents were in attendance, including our own Betty Duda.

A mission goal of \$2,000,000 was adopted; 19 mission grants were

selected with one receiving a partial grant. A Florida-Georgia mission grant, Redeeming Life Maternity Home in Sanford, FL, received a \$100,000 grant.

After all of this, we heard from many speakers including Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod President Matthew Harrison and Lutherans for Life President James Lamb. Then came the Bountiful Bash Party; 4,600 people entered the exhibit area to have a great time with fun and games to end the day.

Saturday began with another Banner Procession. Our YWRs walked with the Heart to Heart Sisters and Unsung Heroes. Darla and Chelsea held the banner and flag for Kenya. Our Unsung Heroes were Pastor Ed and Sheryl Dewitt representing Redeeming Life Maternity Home.



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Real Challenges, Real Rewards:

Someone once told me that if mission work were easy everyone would be doing it. If that is true, and it is, then Haiti is a fine example of that statement. Not easy, ever. But with all things that take a great deal of effort and often sacrifice come genuine rewards.

The last few months of work in





Haiti have been just that — filled with days of challenge but glittering with hope and reward. Four teams spent a total of five weeks in Haiti from April through July.

Two Community Health Outreach teams saw hundreds of patients and gave workshops to expectant and new mothers, teaching them about self care, baby care and nursing. Some at-risk babies were given special attention, and hundreds of

children received medication for parasites and scabies. Children and parents received hygiene instruction and vitamins along with kits of soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, wash cloth and a snack.

Hundreds of children and adults received clothing and shoes. We thank the many LWML ladies and

other individuals who sewed shorts and pillowslip dresses for children.

We have integrated a simple Gospel presentation with stories and a craft into our Children's

Clinic so that every child and parent who attends hears the Good News of Jesus Christ. Local pastors and elders are always visible so that attendees are encouraged to connect to the local churches.

Another important aspect of the Community Health Outreach is to identify families in exceptional need. We were able to provide several very needy families with food for at least a month, connect them with a local pastor and/or nurse for follow up and sent several patients to a reliable local doctor for care that we could not give.

There is only one doctor for every 10,000 people in Haiti, and most doctors are located in major cities. It is very difficult for people in the outlying villages, where we go, to get any kind of medical attention due to both scarcity of care and lack of money. Mission: Haiti care and medication are free. We would like to especially thank Waterman Hospital of Tavares, FL, for sending more than 30 medical professionals and construction workers who not only gave excellent care but also constructed the foundation and walls for the new orphanage kitchen.

The boys and girls orphanages have been receiving lots of attention — and the kids are loving it. The most recent team from Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church/San Antonio, TX, repaired the water system that had broken down last year, working in searing temperatures so there is running water to both the boys and girls sides of the facility and the dear cooks don't have to walk more than a few

feet for water. All the children can take real showers now, and no one has to carry heavy buckets of water for basic daily care. Water was run to the area becoming a garden so that real irrigation can be installed.

The girls just finished their first school year and were so proud of their report cards. Three young men entering high school this year will go to a special year of university prep instruction to prepare for the difficult university entrance exam next spring. Please pray for the men and women who work with these children every day.

Probably our biggest challenge was the Homes for Jubilee project. A unique type of low-cost, disaster resistant dwelling has been developed that can be a real life saver, literally, for Haiti. Costing \$4,000, the structure looks like a geodesic dome but with straight sides and can be constructed in about a week. The structure has no heavy ceiling to collapse and utilizes materials that work with the high saline content water of Haiti rather than rebar that begins to deteriorate immediately upon construction.

We successfully constructed five foundations. There were some very unusual delays and roadblocks in the beginning of this project, but we are confident that these are behind us now and that as funding is received, construction will move ahead quickly and the first home will be completed in September. Not only will this provide much needed housing, a team of men from Jubilee is being trained in the construction methods and is setting up a company so that they may move ahead on their own after six or so months of mentoring.

God is doing great work in Haiti. Men, women and children are coming to faith in Jesus Christ. People are asking for help to become self-sufficient, learn new skills and educate their children. By the grace of God and with His provision, Mission: Haiti plans to continue to walk alongside these precious brothers and sisters sharing skills and training, giving hope and help, offering love and encouragement so that God may be glorified.

"Since we gather in the Student Union as a student organization we are on the schedule of the University, and although we've been throw a few curve balls, God is good



VBS Students Dance, Play, Learn and Move Toward Jesus

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LC of the Redeemer Celebrating Milestone


Lutheran Church of the Redeemer/Columbus, GA, is planning a gala weekend celebration of its landmark 75th Anniversary on September 19-20.
