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District Pastors will be Engaged in Action

Continuing the Florida-Georgia District theme of "Engaging in the Master's Business," pastors will gather in conference to focus on how they and other congregational leaders guide people to Gospel-motivated action.

The September 19-21 event will include plenary and break-out sessions. Dr. David R. Schmitt, the Gregg H. Benidt Memorial Professor of Homiletics and Literature at Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, will be the featured presenter.

The conference is being held at The Rosen Plaza Hotel in Orlando. Registration information will be available on the District website, fgadistrict.org. ■



District Welcomes New Pastors, Vicars

April 26 was Call Day for 149 Concordia Seminary/St. Louis students who learned their assignment of first calls to pastoral and diaconal ministry, vicarage placements and deaconess internship positions.

Of that total, 78 students received their first calls to serve as pastors, chaplains and missionaries for The Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod. One deaconess received a call and one deaconess has a call pending. Another 65 students who will serve as vicars and three deaconess interns received their assignments; one deaconess internship is pending.

"What is happening now is that ... we are passing the earthly leadership of our Lord's Church to a new generation," said Seminary President Dr. Dale A. Meyer during the Call Service.

"This generation is different. They form community in different ways. They are keen about worship, about receiving God's grace and returning praise — they are focused on Jesus and His ministry. ■

We see some exciting things going on across this Florida-Georgia District. God is at work in some amazing ways through His people. Lives are being transformed through the power of the Gospel as Jesus is proclaimed. Day by day I meet people and hear about churches and members who are engaged in the Master's business. I am seeing people equipped, empowered and engaged to connect people to Jesus.

However, all is not rosy in the church today. Certainly our Lutheran Churches are not immune to the cultural battles all around us. Life in the church has changed. Things aren't the same as they were 40 years ago in many ways, and the church is no exception. There was a time when the church held a position of honor and respect in a community. Today, it is considered one among many institutions in a community, no better, no worse than any other. It is considered on par with the synagogue, the mosque, but also with the YMCA, the health club and the country club.

Denominational loyalty among our younger adults is by and large a thing of the past as many congregations age and lose a sense of vision and sometimes the passion or ability to attract a younger generation. In the Florida-Georgia District, Mission Executive Douglas Kallesen reports that 65% of our congregations worship fewer than 125 on a given Sunday. We may often feel like sojourners in a foreign land. Yet, it is for this purpose that God has called us to faith in Jesus. We have an opportunity to reach many in the name of Jesus.

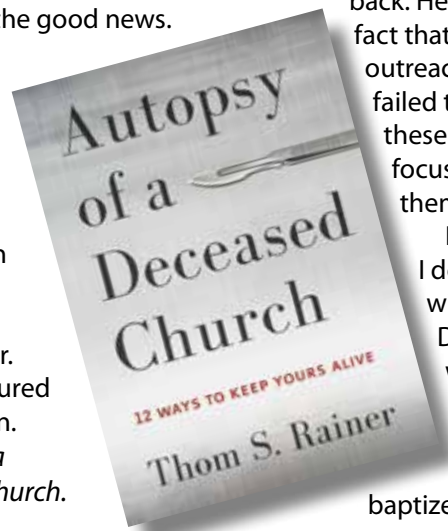
In 2 Timothy 4 the Apostle Paul writes prophetically: "For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off

into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." It seems like we are living in these days.

Look at the way Satan has lulled us into a false sense of security. The church is like the frog in the kettle. If you bring a pot of water to a boil and place a frog in it (I know, it's a mean idea, but it's an illustration) it will hop out. If you put a frog in a pot of cool water and slowly bring it to a boil the frog will get used to the circumstances and will eventually boil to death, not recognizing the need to change. Often the church has been so slow to recognize the changes around us in the world, and some are still unwilling to see them and adapt, but the water is rising and getting hotter, so to speak.

In the midst of this, God has called us for this time to reach the people all around us with the hope of life and salvation that can only be found in our risen Savior, Jesus. Peter, in Acts 4, pointing us to Jesus, writes, "And there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." The precious name of Jesus still has power to change and transform lives! We hold on to this hope. It's what drives us as a church. Yet, often we've lost sight of this calling to reach the world with the good news.

A few months ago my father-in-law gave me a book he had been reading written by Thom Rainer. Its title captured my attention. *Autopsy of a Deceased Church*.



It's a short book, not particularly theological but very practical. Rainer surveyed a number of churches that had closed from across denominational boundaries, of all sizes and ethnicities to find commonalities. He discovered some fascinating things that I believe hold some insights for churches headed in that direction, and even those that are healthy.

Rainer points to very common sense information, including things like the church stopped praying together beyond the Sunday morning formal prayers. He focused on how the church idolized another era, usually a golden age, hoping to achieve that once again — but with no real plan to get there and a failure to acknowledge that you can't go back. He touched on issues like the fact that there was little evangelistic outreach or plans; that churches failed to look like their community; these churches had no community focus — everything was about them and their survival.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, I don't know a community within the boundaries of our District that is so saturated with believers in Jesus that they don't need the message proclaimed! God has called each of us, His baptized, to connect people to

Jesus. This is what we, as a Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, have always been about, sharing the love of Jesus and the power of His forgiveness and life. This is why we are engaging with Lutheran Hour Ministry's Outreach Initiative, and working with the Southeastern District and Dr. Bruce Jaeger to introduce iNeighborhood to our congregations.

This summer the Synod will host its 66th Regular Convention in Milwaukee, WI. There are many important issues to be discussed and elections to be held. Nothing could



instead of boldly reaching into our communities as the incarnation of Jesus we have set up fences to protect ourselves from a harsh and cruel world, choosing not to understand and change? This was never God's plan for His people.

A number of years back former President Bill Clinton said, "There is nothing so wrong with America that cannot be cured by what is right with America." I wonder if that couldn't be translated to our situation. There's nothing so wrong with the Church that it cannot be cured by what is right with the Church! After all, the biggest thing we have going for us is Jesus — and what could be

better than that? As someone has aptly said, "The main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing—and that main thing is Jesus!" He has always been God's plan for His people!

Hebrews 12:2 reminds us, "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." May that be our aim and goal in all we do, not just for the sake of the church, but for the sake of a dying world. Jesus came to seek and to save the lost, and now He calls us to be His hands and feet, sharing this wonderful good news through the church in the communities He's placed us.

The Church, from its earliest days, has always thrived in the midst of challenge. In this post-Christian environment, Jesus is still Lord, and we look to Him for wisdom and

strength. As we stand in partnership, passionate about His death and resurrection, He promises to continue to work through us, individually and corporately.

Let's get back to the basics, commit ourselves to God's Word and make regular use of the Sacrament for the strengthening of our faith and assurance of our forgiveness.

Then let's engage in the Master's business and connect people to Jesus.

That's His call on our lives, isn't it? How will you respond? His Spirit promises to empower you as you go in His name! The state of the Church is one of constant change externally, but secure and steadfast in what we believe, teach and confess.

As partners in ministry let's share that with the world for the sake of Jesus.

be more important than discussing how we can reach more people with the good news of new life, with forgiveness of sin, with hope amid hopelessness while there's still time. Our call is to connect people to Jesus — *all people*.

In his report to the Convention President Harrison notes that in a demographic study commissioned by the Synod it was discovered that there seems to be a correlation between the birth rate and the decline of our Synod. While it's certainly true that the birthrate has declined, it is also true that all babies are born into sin and need a Savior, and we happen to have a solution to that dilemma.

Could the decline in our congregations also reflect the ever-changing culture that has abandoned God's Word and has grown ears that itch to hear a message of acceptance without any responsibility or accountability? Could it be that

Ministries “Bearing Fruit” in Florida-Georgia

Members of the Florida-Georgia District met via conference call on April 8.

“God is bearing fruit all around us in the ministries He has planted among us,” District President Greg Walton told board members.

“It’s an exciting time to be part of the Florida-Georgia District.”

Noting that the District would be assigned new pastors and vicars later in April, Walton continued, “We have the opportunity to help shape tomorrow’s leaders as they serve in congregations and do outreach to engage in the Master’s business. This is also our privilege.

“That’s why these are critical targets!”

Leadership: *District and congregational leaders are loving, visionary people of the Word, models of healthy Christ-centered living and life-long learners committed to equipping and empowering others to join in fulfilling the Church’s role in God’s Mission.*

• A third session of Emergent Leaders, concluding in May, included 12 participants. “This training has had a great impact on those who have participated,” Walton said. “We hope to continue it as well as broaden it to other East Coast Districts of the LCMS.”

• Executive Director Missions-Outreach Doug Kallesen and several others from the Florida-Georgia District attended the April 25-28 Church Planters Conference, called the largest church planting conference on the planet.

• Fall Pastors Conference is set for September 19-21 under the theme “Engaged in Action,” exploring the action side of the Master’s business. “The focus will be on better ways to proclaim the Gospel to motivate our people and ourselves to action, to connect people to Jesus,” Walton said.

• Fall Educators Conference, themed “All Things 2 All People,” will zero in on the opportunities Lutheran schools have as the diversity of our nation continues to expand.

• In preparation for the upcoming LCMS convention, regional conferences were scheduled around the District.

Congregations: *Congregations of the Florida-Georgia District are growing communities of welcoming, vibrant and faithful followers of Jesus Christ.*

• Operation Barnabas, the Synod’s ministry to the armed forces, is on track in Florida-Georgia will Dr. Mark Schreiber collecting names to form a task force. Rev. Gary Danielsen, OB project manager, is “very willing to assist our District in serving our vets,” Walton reported.

• More than 70 participants attended the training conference on Islam presented by the Muslim Ministry Task Force at Living Faith/Cumming, GA. Plans are under way for a similar training session in Orlando.

• Reconcilers Training on May 2-7 in Charlotte, NC, was attended by

many District Circuit Visitors. The training was done in conjunction and partnership with the LCMS’ Southeastern District.

Outreach: *Living out their faith in Jesus with urgency and joy, the people of the Florida-Georgia District eagerly invest, both individually and corporately, in bold and intentional service and witness to make know the love of Christ to all people.*

• Lutheran Hour Ministries Outreach Initiative is being refreshed. New outreach resources are being developed and will be presented online.

• A District-wide Outreach Conference is under consideration. The event would be held regionally in multiple locations.

• Also under consideration is a Small Church Conference for ministries worshiping fewer than 125. This would include presentations on best practices to help sustainability and vibrancy of ministry.

The next scheduled meeting for the Board of Directors is August 26-27 in Orlando. ■

Marchers Bring Attention to Persecuted Christians and Jews

An hour-long prayer march at Orlando’s Lake Eola Park on Sunday, April 17 brought attention to persecuted Christians and Jews around the globe.

“Religious persecution of Christians and Jews has reached epidemic proportions in the Middle East, Africa, North Korea, Iran, Europe and Asia,” said Rev. Bruce Lieske of Burning Bush Ministries, sponsor of the third annual event.

After the silent march, participants heard from an international panel of guest speakers that included Austrian Elisabeth

Sabaditsch Wolff, a board member of Pax Europa. She focused on the ongoing struggle against religious persecution on both sides of the Atlantic.

“Christians and Jews must march side by side against the persecution and abuse,” she emphasized. “We must not allow the persecution of people and their religious beliefs in the guise of misconceived tolerance and suppression of freedom of speech.”

Prayers for the persecuted and their persecutors were part of the event. ■

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New Rostered Worker Data Base to be Launched

When congregations and schools are looking for Rostered teachers, school administrators, DCEs, Directors of Family Life and other professionals, they want to be able to access a reliable data base of worker "resumes" to find potential candidates. Presently, we have the LEIF data base on the Lutheran School Portal.

As of 12:00am on July 1 that data base will no longer exist.

The good news is that a brand-new site with newly submitted "resumes" that will be called Commissioned Minister Information Forms (CMIF) will replace the old site. The forms will be "ministry specific," so DCEs, teachers and so on will have forms that are appropriate for their area of ministry.

And here's the challenge: nearly 12,000 workers will need to complete and submit new CMIFs. That is a lot of CMIFs!

Workers involved have been informed that it is time for them to go online to complete their CMIFs. The information included a video "walkthrough" that took them through the process. If you are a Commissioned Minister of Religion...go online and complete the form! If you are in a supervisory position to a CMR, give them a deadline for completing the new CMIF and make sure they follow through!

This is very important for our church body. When congregations, schools and ministries are seeking candidates to fill vacant positions, they want the most complete and up-to-date information possible, and they want to have an easy process at their fingertips to search for them. This is only possible if workers complete the task they will be given very soon.

We want the Florida-Georgia District to be the model for others to follow, and that will only happen with the partnership of our commissioned workers and supervisors.

Thank you in advance for helping to get this fantastic new resource up and running as it was envisioned. ■

God's Power Reflected in Miraculous Survival

Tracy is a member of Hope/Orlando, where I attend. I share her story of God's presence in her life. It's touching, and it is powerful! I hope that you enjoy it.

On January 3, I had a 9-cm thoracic descending aortic aneurysm burst and repaired. It is very unusual, even miraculous, to survive what I did. My doctor and I attribute my survival to God. Here is my story.

I went to church in the morning and a Hopefest meeting immediately after services. I drove home, had a drink of water go down the wrong way that caused me to cough long and hard to stop choking. After finishing coughing the muscles along the middle of my back felt like someone was twisting them like you twist a towel to squeeze out water. I assumed it was just a muscle spasm that would pass, but it didn't.

right ear. It wasn't painful, but it was the thing that made me decide to tell my husband to call 911 and that I needed to go to the emergency room.

We went to the living room to wait for the EMTs. They came quickly and took my vital signs. They were all normal! They gave me the option of being driven or having them take me to the ER. I chose them: they are a fast pass into the ER, no waiting.

I got to a room; the nurse and the doctor (a resident) came in and got me pain medications, an Xray and then immediately a CT scan. The doctor saw something that made her decide to transport me to Florida South. She would have had me taken by helicopter, but since the weather prevented it, I went by ambulance. She told my husband it was for further tests by a specialist, and even told him what room I would be in at Florida South.

Upon

arriving at the hospital, the aneurysm had burst and I had a barely discernible pulse. They rushed me into the operating room where I apparently talked with Dr. Varnagy before surgery; I do not remember this. I do remember hearing the nervous people around me getting ready for surgery and the anesthesiologist

telling me I was going to go to sleep before putting the mask on me. I was not scared or nervous. I was perfectly peaceful, the peace that passes all understanding the Bible speaks of.

I woke up later in my room all fixed up. Meanwhile, my poor husband arrives at the hospital, goes to the room he believes I will be in — only to find someone else! He did find me, and the doctor told him and my other family members, "Well, she is a miracle. Only 10% of people survive what she went through." He likened the size of my aneurysm to an indoor soccer ball...WOW!!

That's the reaction of any person with medical training when they hear this story. Me, I just let God and the people taking care of me do all the hard work. I was in the hospital for a week, went home and two weeks later discovered I had five to six blood clots that had developed because of being active after having been in bed for a week.

I am on blood thinners for a short time (hopefully), and have regained my strength and lung capacity over the last few months. The aneurysm left quite a bit of blood in my chest that my body has had to absorb over time. I no longer smoke and my lungs are not quite sure how to react to that either.

I am very grateful to all the friends and family who prayed me through this (and it was a lot). God certainly showed me His power that day as I am convinced that if even one situation had been off by even a minute or two, the outcome would have been very different. The EMTs who transported me, the resident who recognized the aneurysm and sent me to South, the fifth best vascular surgeon being on call and in the hospital on a Sunday of a holiday weekend and who gives God all the glory every time I talk to him.

God was everywhere, interceding and making miracles happen.

As my doctor said to me the first time I remember meeting him, "Young lady, God must have something important for you to

do for Him, because otherwise you would not have survived this." He took none of the credit for himself, just gave it all to God. I am truly blessed and am currently listening to God to try to figure out what He has planned for me. ■

Note — Tracy has now printed and laminated her story, sharing it with her customers at Longhorn. Soon she will be sharing her story at church. Several of her customers have said, "Let me know when you do because I want to be there!" It reminds me of another

woman who left her water jars at the well with Jesus. She ran back and told everybody in her town that she had met Jesus and the town came out to meet Him for themselves. Who can you tell your story of HIS STORY in your life to? — Doug Kallesen

New Survey Offers Insights on District Youth Ministries

The purpose of the District Youth Ministry Council is to equip, empower and engage the youth of the church for lives of Christian Discipleship. The DYMC asked volunteers and professionals in the District how they thought we could best equip, empower and engage the youth. Your responses were great, and we are so thankful for the time that Pastors, DCEs, teachers, parents and other volunteers took to provide this feedback.

We learned that out of the 84 responses, 77% have active youth ministry in their congregations with groups ranging from 5-30 or more and with the most common size being 6-10 active youth (33%). We also learned that the person most responsible for youth ministry in our District congregations is a part-time volunteer (41%) followed closely by full-time paid professionals (31%). Of those who responded, 13% have no youth leader at all.

It was made clear that the DYMC could support youth ministry, youth and those working in youth ministry in our congregations in four different ways:

1. Training Events for Adult Leaders;
2. Events for Youth (i.e. Gatherings, Leadership Training, Servant Events, etc.);
3. Consultations With or Advising Congregations in the area of Youth Ministry;
4. Networking Congregation Youth Leaders.

Only ten percentage points separated these answers with Events for Youth and Training Events for Adult Leaders rising to the top.

The District Youth Ministry Council will continue to explore ways to provide this leadership and support but will start by providing

the following youth events and adult leader training:

◆ The DYMC is working to ensure planning for District events for Middle School and High School Youth are under way by the proper committees.

◆ The Middle School Youth Gathering will take place again at Lake Yale on November 4-6, 2016.

◆ The DYMC will host a webinar in August to help leaders in the District learn more about taking a group of middle schoolers to the Gathering. In this webinar, members of the Middle School Gathering planning team and the DYMC will talk about important topics identified as needs from the survey including funding, traveling ideas, and recruiting leaders to go to the Gathering.

◆ The High School Youth Gathering date (spring 2017) and location are TBD.

◆ The DYMC will have a deliberate presence at the Middle School Gathering and High School Youth Gathering, providing training and learning sessions for adult leaders.

◆ The DYMC is exploring locations, dates and service opportunities for a High School Summer Servant Event for 2017. More information will be available in the fall of 2016.

We want to connect more with our pastors in the District. More than 45% of the survey responders were pastors. Members of the DYMC will be present at the Pastor's Conference this fall in order to share more information and provide support and connection between churches regarding youth ministry.



The DYMC members are keenly aware that the size of our District creates obstacles for many congregations to participate in District events that are as much as nine hours away. The Council is committed to exploring new ways of effectively serving them.

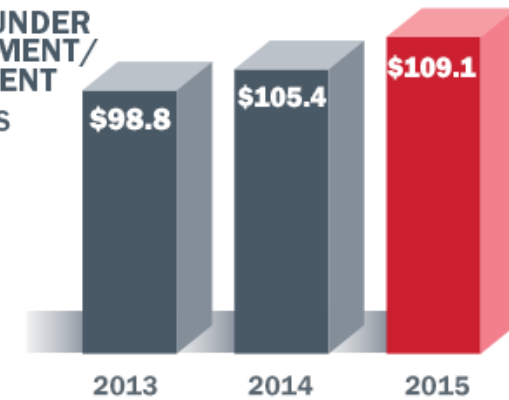

Defining the Coaching Leader

The last two columns addressed leadership in the church and the helping skill we call “coaching.” In this article we will put the two together and explore what it means to be a coaching leader.

The coaching leader is someone who is clear about where they are going and value the blessing of the whole body of Christ. They realize that other approaches to leadership can create passive or dependent followers who sit back and wait on the leader to

that without everyone in the Body of Christ engaged in the mission of God the church will be handicapped. (See Romans 12, Ephesians 4 & 1 Corinthians 12) So they intentionally engage a person’s thinking, inviting them to take small steps of responsibility. They keep in touch, provide support, and celebrate along the way – all while they have the preferred future, God’s future, in mind. “So that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the

faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.” (Eph 4:12-13)

So what does that look like

even a few to do it. Other approaches to leadership run over people or have other unintended consequences.

In the church setting though, leaders may include a variety of people and positions. It may include the pastor, the head of a board or committee or a leader may not hold any formal office at all! Leaders in the church are very likely people of faith engaged with others in the body of Christ, seeking to be supportive and a positive influence.

So the coaching leader wants to avoid the pitfalls of other approaches to leadership.

The coaching leader takes a stance of valuing people. They view others as gifts of God who are gifted by God. They understand

practically?

It means that whether you are a pastor or layperson, whether you have



a formal leadership position or not, there will be less talking and more listening. It means less telling what to do and more asking questions. It means less solving problems for people and more creating awareness and giving permission for people to

“own” the problem and creatively address it themselves as people gifted by God. It means less “making it happen” and more facilitating the action and ownership of others. It means less taking responsibility from people (or hoarding it for yourself) and more giving responsibility to others and supporting them along the way so they will grow through the experience.

The coaching leader will exercise leadership by asking questions, not to manipulate but to guard the values and purpose God has given the church and to encourage responsibility and taking action. The coaching leader carries him or herself in a way that values people, seeks to empower and strengthen them, so the mission of God can powerfully be accomplished. For example, “in the moment” the coaching leader may ask:

“How can we involve more people and the gifts God has given them?”

“How will this (what is being decided) help to make disciples?”

“How can we involve those who are new or inactive in our fellowship (while we do this)?”

“How can we be a blessing to the community?”

“What is your dream for this (board, committee, task force, involvement etc)?”

“How is it going and how can I help?”

Bethlehem Opens Campus for Block Party

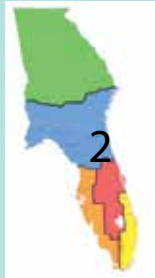

record. As of the end of April, 987,500 meals had been distributed.

"This past year we have increased by an average of 100 people per week over the past year," reported Fred R. Anderson, Risen Savior Council President. "In May we will be hitting our one millionth meal.

"To put this in perspective, if a meal is worth \$2, this is \$2 million in food," he continued. "Again, if a meal is worth \$2, one of our local grocery stores sells 30,000 meals a day, about three times what we hand out on a Wednesday.

"Think of the staff and size of the grocery stores. What happens here each week is truly the story of loaves and fishes."

The congregation marked the Food Pantry anniversary with lunch after the April 3 worship.

"At a time like this, we have to give thanks to God for putting this all together," Anderson concluded. "He has brought a facility, the food, the volunteers and the clients together at one place and time."

Redeemer LWML Launches Project to Aid Children

"Many children view the police as scary," DeWitt concluded. "Many children see the police take mommy or daddy away in their car. Our hope is that this small gesture will provide comfort to the kids caught up in these situations and to create a positive relationship between our police department and the children of our community."

Thrive Celebrates Charter Sunday

Thrive Community Church/ Estero chartered as a congregation of the Florida-Georgia District on Sunday, April 17, at its new rented space.

Thrive recently transitioned from being a "portable church," setting up each Sunday morning in rented space at Florida Gulf Coast University, to a "storefront church," now renting for three years at Estero Ridge shopping center on a busy corner of Tamiami Trail and Estero Parkway. Thrive occupies three storefronts with about 5,400 square feet of space for ministry.

According to Thrive Mission Pastor John Roth, congregation goals are to increase worship to 120 by the end of 2016; have six to eight home huddles (a version of small groups) meeting regularly in

the community; grow its campus ministry to 60 students meeting weekly and 24 in discipleship huddles; and increase its youth ministry to 20 per week.

Noting that "these are challenging goals," Roth said he "believes God is blessing our efforts and will extend His kingdom through Thrive."

Thrive has one Sunday service at 10 AM; however, with attendance now near 90 per Sunday, Roth anticipates going to two worship services in the fall.

Thrive began worship at FGCU in August of 2014, just 18 months prior to the move to the new rented space. Circuit churches and many members have contributed to the financial support of this mission along with the District. ■

During one painting session wailing was heard outside the building. A young teen boy trying to reach a mango from a third-floor roof had fallen onto the concrete. He was rushed unconscious to the hospital on the back of a motorcycle; his mother didn't have the money to rent a motorcycle for herself so she was left behind sobbing. The team sent her to the hospital and waited for news.

Gratefully, the young man only had one badly broken arm and a concussion, but the family had no money for surgery or hospitalization. The team collected an offering and raised

exactly what was needed for this young man's care. Without the team's kindness this young man would have come home without any medical care, and there is no way to know how his arm would have healed. God put His people at the right place, at the right time to change the life of one young man and his family!

Fulfilling a Heart's Desire

Later in January, a great team of folks — young and not so young —

from St. Paul/ Weston, FL, traveled to the small village of Jean-Louis, about three hours north of Port au Prince, to complete the floor of a church built in 2015. The church was the heart's desire of 122-year-old community patriarch Mr. Orilus, who deeded land to the church for the building as well as for village gardens. Though he could have sold the several hundred acres and lived well, he resided in a tiny mud hut and gave all he had so that the village he grew up in could have a church and gardens.

Besides accomplishing the hard work of concrete pouring by bucket brigade, the St. Paul team made Bible story presentations to the village children; taught hygiene and infant care; provided food for the workers; distributed shoes, vegetable seeds and garden equipment; and had a celebration meal with the village.

Our good friend Mr. Orilus did not see the floor completed. He had told us that he would not die until the church was completed. God was faithful to His servant. Mr. Orilus went to the hospital on the day the team arrived, and entered the presence of his Savior the day after the floor was completed. His final question to his grandson was, "How was the party at church?" The grandson told him that they had danced on the new floor and the party had been wonderful. Mr. Orilus said, "I knew it would be," then closed his eyes and died.

Homebuilding in Jubilee

In March a small team of folks from Texas, Florida and California undertook a 17- day trip to complete a second eco-dome home in Jubilee, pour a foundation for a new dormitory at the girl's home in Gonaives and check the boys dorm ceiling reported to be deteriorating. They took side trips to gather information for future projects.

The trip was an unqualified success!

The second dome was completed, the foundation was laid and good information was gathered. Unfortunately the boys dormitory was in worse shape than described and must be demolished. The boys have moved into alternative rooms on the campus, and the old dormitory is being torn down. Plans are in the works for a new dormitory at an anticipated cost of about \$35,000 due to high inflation in Haiti.

Health Outreach Team Impact All Ages

One of three Community Health Outreach Teams that Mission: Haiti sends each year was in country April 9-16. Twelve participants from all over the USA came together to serve more than 1,000 adult patients and as many children in just four days.

Birthing kits were given to each pregnant woman during a class led by Dr. Nancy Swisher and Lisa Douthwaite, NP. Each kit contained directions in pictures and in Creole to help Haitian women have a clean, safe home birth.



The team traveled several hours each day over very rugged mountain roads to villages who had never seen doctors before. There were four medical providers, a pharmacist, two Haitian nurses and six helpers who worked with the children's clinic and gave out hygiene items, clothing and shoes. Pastor Bill Douthwaite of Shepherd of the Coast/Palm Coast shared the Gospel and prayed with almost every patient. We had the joy of witnessing two baptisms during the week: an eight-month old girl with Down's Syndrome and a mid 80s gentleman at very high risk with malnutrition who was a believer in Jesus but had never heard about baptism.

Beginning January 2, ten students and adults from Immanuel Lutheran/ Riverside, CA, a mission partner since 2010, made their third trip to Port au Prince to present a week of VBS at different locations to several hundred youngsters on Christmas break.

The team taught about 40 children to play the recorder, helped paint a Lutheran guest house and taught carpentry to some local men. The young adults met with college-age Haitians to learn about each other's lives, cultures, hopes, dreams and faith.

District Congregations Again Respond to Flood Bucket Challenge

Over the past few months, congregations of the Florida-Georgia District have been busy putting together LCMS Disaster Response Flood Buckets.

Last fall, several volunteers rented and drove two trucks full of flood buckets to Columbia, SC, to help with the flooding in that area. This mission of mercy left the District with no more fully prepared flood buckets to help deal with the next emergency.

To remedy this shortage, Joel and Kathy Mathews from Messiah/Tampa spearheaded the new campaign to refill the stock of flood buckets across the District. The campaign saw a change that enabled the District to use a storage facility in Georgia and one in Florida. The final tally collected, along with a few more promised in the near future, came to 470 buckets stored in Florida and 149 stored in Georgia for a grand total of 619 flood buckets stored and ready to go.

"On behalf of the District, I would like to thank all those that participated in this challenge," said John Elliott, Florida-Georgia Business Manager and District Disaster Response Coordinator.

"Your love, kindness and care for your fellow man are not misplaced. We look forward to sending these buckets of love to those in need as they are required in the near future."

He added, "If your congregation would like to participate you can still make up the flood buckets at any time if you can transport them to one of the storage facilities. "We did it as a Thrivent Action Team during our kids' Spring Break for those families whose parents needed to work and sent their students to extended care. Our goal was for 15 flood buckets, but with the help of Home Depot donating 25 buckets and Thrivent Financial's seed money, we were able to complete 31 buckets. We followed the instructions to use an assembly line and the elementary kids matched up with the preschoolers to fill and carry the buckets. It was so awesome to see them working as a team."



Tina Wadsworth represents the LWML group at Our Savior/Lake Worth in the South Palm Beach Zone. "Our church has a very active Caring Ministry," she said. "The Flood Bucket ministry fits well with our mission. When the District contacted our Pastor Steve Wipperman, our LWML group readily agreed to take on the Flood Relief Buckets program. We used fundraising to purchase everything and got the buckets donated by our local Home Depot. Then we divided up the shopping tasks between our members. In the end we filled 21 buckets!"



According to member Leslie Jean, St. Mark/Tucker responded enthusiastically to the Flood Buckets appeal. Some of the contributors are shown above. "Several of our members are acquainted with victims of flood waters who have already been assisted by Flood Buckets and the mercy witness included with them," Jean added.
