Hearts for Jesus To Support Lutheran Special Education, Redeeming Life Maternity Home

The District's "Hearts for Jesus" program is an annual project that engages the majority of schools in the District in a common effort.

"Chapel offerings are designated for the project, typically in the month of February," explains Mark Brink, executive director for education for the Florida-Georgia District. "This year's project will support Lutheran Special Education Ministries. Since 1873, Lutheran Special Education Ministries (LSEM), formerly known as Lutheran School for the Deaf, has been serving children with learning challenges. This organization has a history of dedication and commitment to serving all of God's children."

Founded in 1874 in Detroit as Lutheran School for the Deaf, they changed their name in 1990 to become Lutheran Special Education Ministries, to better

communicate the expanded services being offered to children well beyond the initial focus on those who were hearing impaired.

"Secondarily, we are encouraging schools to support Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries in Sanford, Florida, an RSO of the LCMS and an important partner in our District's ministry outreach," Brink continued. "Redeeming Life serves single pregnant and post-partum women who, because of the circumstances in their lives, lack the support and opportunities offered by a loving, caring, Christ-centered home and family."

It was more than 25 years ago that Pastor Edward DeWitt (then seminarian) and his wife, Sheryl, attended a Lutherans for Life event in St. Louis. The information shared at the meeting about the number of abortions taking place annually was heart-wrenching to the DeWitts. What impacted the DeWitts the most was the sense of desperation a woman must feel — the hopelessness and helplessness — in order to see no other option than to choose abortion. It was then that the dream of what would become Redeeming Life Maternity Home was conceived.

Lutheran schools can also take

advantage of a user-friendly website: www.luthed.org which allows for greater communication, collaboration and resource-sharing among all who are interested in Lutheran education. A helpful video is located on the homepage to assist in the navigation of the site, in addition to some FAQs. Resources are free to download or purchase through amazon.com. recently heard a story about a turn-around church that amazed me. It was an historic church, well over 100 years old, that had seen a steady decline since the late 1960s. It was a gorgeous old facility, gothic-looking with stained glass windows showing

various scenes of the ministry of Jesus. Behind the ornate wooden altar was a stained glass rendition of the Ascension of Jesus, with His arms held out over the congregation offering a benediction.

The stone walls reverberated with sound when empty, and hummed when people sang. However, fewer and fewer people were singing these days in that sanctuary. At one time it was one of the largest congregations in this particular denomination, with a school attached, and all kinds of ministries happening every day of the week. As children grew and culture changed all around them they noticed that the confirmation classes, once as many as 50 children, were reduced to two or three at most.

Certainly the changes in the neighborhood contributed, but the leadership couldn't understand why they kept losing members. The article remarked on the number of deaths the congregations saw each month, and lamented the fact that no one seemed interested in reaching out or inviting others in. It seems that those who considered themselves to be the core members were satisfied to keep things the way they always were, comfortable and familiar.

Long ago it was decided among some of the leaders that training new workers was more trouble than it was worth. As a result, some had served in the same leadership position, contrary to their congregational bylaws, for more than 30 years!

Many of the younger members felt their input and offer to help was unappreciated so they found other places to do "ministry," which didn't include Sunday worship anymore.

More recently the congregation experienced rapid loss of members when a dispute arose between the pastor and some leaders. It ultimately resulted in the pastor leaving, but many who saw him as the only bright hope for the future of the church left after he had gone.

Further controversy erupted and many of the old time leaders left. As a result the congregation had dwindled to only a handful of people. They were hopeless and despondent. They were vacant and had no vision for the future. The congregational president, elected by default, was talking with a coworker at his office, and he happened to be a Christian of a differing tradition. He told him about something his congregation was doing that was really having an impact. He shared how his congregation has taken seriously the call of Jesus to reach people outside of their congregation. Everyone and anyone who wanted an opportunity to serve could find a place to serve in some way.

With nothing to lose, the man prayed about this and brought it back to the handful of people who still gathered to worship and the retired pastor who had agreed to serve them. It sounded crazy. What impact could a few people have that would make a difference? His friend had pointed him to these words in James 2: "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, be warmed and filled,' without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. But someone will say, 'You have faith and I have works.' Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe-and shudder!"" (Jas 2:14-19).

Together this small group began to unpack this and look throughout Scripture, and what they discovered, over and over again, was that God's expectation was that they not simply have a faith, but that they live that faith out in their daily actions. They heard the words of Jesus saying, "Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them." (Jn 13:16–17).

Fed by God's Word and convicted by His Spirit they began to formulate a plan of action. How could they be in their community as representatives, first of God's Kingdom, but secondly, as members of this little congregation? They began to think of their contacts and people they knew in the community who could help guide them. Some began volunteering in the local clothing closet, others in the soup kitchen. Some of the men began working with Habitat for Humanity, others found other ways to impact people right where they were. Slowly, over time, they began seeing the very people they touched in these other places visiting their church.

A new, positive spirit, had taken over, and an openness to the people coming to visit. Some joined, and when they did, they were encouraged to go out and get involved. Soon, there was a new energy in the church and it began to grow.

Six months later God had blessed their work and they were far more stable than they had been in the previous decade. They formed a call committee and began their work to call a pastor. The congregation was clear that the kind of pastor they wanted was one who would join them on their journey to reach people for Jesus. Eventually God brought them a pastor who continued to lead them forward seeing that their ministry wasn't confined to their campus, but was all around them. When they stopped being inwardly focused and began looking at their community with new, outwardly focused eyes, they stopped seeing what they couldn't do, and began to see all the possibilities.

Truly these people had learned to let Jesus be seen in their lives, and like moths to a flame, people took notice and began to be inspired and involved. It revitalized their ministry.

The truth is, this can happen to any ministry that has people with a heart to serve Jesus. It is too easy to succumb to the lies of the devil and fail to see the possibilities and opportunities that God is providing right where you are. What new ministry could you raise up in your community, or maybe in a surrounding community, all for the sake of touching hearts and lives with the love of Jesus?

> Let Jesus be seen in 2019! Let Him be seen in your life! Let Him be seen within your congregation! Let Him be seen in your community!

I'm reminded of the old story of the elderly couple driving down a country road one day when they are passed by a young couple in a convertible snuggled close together. The wife looked at her husband, driving the truck, and said, "I remember a day when we used to drive like that, sitting close together. What happened?"

Her husband looked at her, and with the wisdom of Solomon said, "Well, I haven't moved!" My friends, our gracious heavenly Father sent us Jesus, and has claimed us with purpose. His plan for His



children has always been that we reach out to those who have not yet heard. They are all around us. He hasn't moved! So draw close to God and let His Epiphany light shine in your heart to connect people to Jesus.

6 Miessler Named Executive Director Rick Armstrong Announces July Retirement From Lutheran Counseling Services

The Rev. Dr. R. Richard Armstrong (Rick) has announced his retirement from Lutheran Counseling Services. Rick was the Founding Board Chair for LCS, became the Associate Director at LCS in 2004 and the Administrative Coordinator in 2011. In 2012, he was named Executive Director and has assisted LCS in expanding its clientele to serving more than 350 clients monthly.

Rick is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, a Fellow with the American Association of Pastoral Counselors and a Florida Approved Supervisor for Marriage and Family and Mental Health Counseling. He focuses on relationship issues, depression, anxiety, grief/loss, crisis management and spiritual growth. He also does leadership coaching and organization/ team consultation. Rick served as a Parish Pastor for 25 years. He is married with two adult daughters and six grandchildren.

Since its inception in 1987, LCS has provided a wide range of confidential professional counseling and consulting services to thousands of Florida residents regardless of race, creed, gender, religion, or national origin. Originally founded by the Lutheran Church and local community leaders, Lutheran Counseling Services has grown into an independent nonprofit providing mental health counseling, training and consulting services to an expansive community. In 2016 Lutheran Counseling Services served more than 700 clients (245 of these were children) and provided 3,500+ clinical sessions. The professional staff offers a variety of mental health services to those who reach out for assistance. They regularly serve the professional church workers of the Florida-Georgia District and have a presence at nearly all District conferences, conventions and events.

"I am very grateful for the opportunity I have had to serve in the ministry of Lutheran Counseling Services," Armstrong offers, "as Chair of the original steering committee and first Board of Directors for eight years, Associate Director, Operations Coordinator for eight years and for the past six years Executive Director. I am grateful for the staff and Board of Directors with whom I have served. I am humbled that God has used me to serve clients in need, as well as organizations and communities who have sought our services under our mission of 'Sharing God's healing and abundant grace.'

"At this point in my life I have decided to retire from the position of Executive Director at LCS effective July 1, 2019."

The LCS Board of Directors has chosen Megan Miessler, LCSW, DCE to serve as the next Executive Director of the faith-based organization. Miessler has been at LCS for 11 years. Prior to that she served in parish ministry for eight

"What Do You Want To Do?"

In the last issue we addressed this question with the emphasis on clarifying the destination prior to identifying the activity that would get you there. Yet there is another element that is helpful to also consider. The coaching leader calls it:



watch out for your assumptions!

Do you recall the husband and wife illustration used last month? We shared the story of the husband who asked the wife if she wanted to go by plane or car to which the wife asks, "where are we going?" Well, let's put another twist on the story: Suppose the husband made the decision on where to go, when they would go and how they would get there. Then further imagine that it was at the last minute that he finally told his wife to get her traveling shoes on, pack her bags and get in the car for a two week vacation!

That's kind of nuts. What good husband would make any of those plans without consulting his wife? Not only does she have her own opinions and preferences, which should be honored and respected, but she has her own schedule and responsibilities to work around. It would not be surprising if the wife in the story was in no small way offended and refused to get in the car! He may have been well meaning but he sure made some assumptions which turned into some very poor results.

This probably has a lot in common with churches that experience low participation with new styles of worship, new activities and new programs or even when repeating old ones. They may be for members or for the surrounding community but the error is the same: we make assumptions for people just like the husband made assumptions for his wife! It may be well meaning, but it can almost guarantee that things will not turn out as well as they could.

What this means is that when we ask the question, "what do you (or we) want to do" we will intentionally ask those who will be impacted by what we do. We will ask the members about their questions, concerns or hurts before planning a class. We will ask non-members about their interests, wants or needs before assuming we already know. We will furthermore invite people to be part of the conversation to identify what programs or actions we should take. That inquiry may look like surveys, it may look like interviews, it may look like focus groups or just coffee together, but it will definitely not look

like us deciding for them! So while you will want to clarify the destination (from part one last issue) it is wise to clarify your assumptions about both the goals (destination) and the actions (programs plans or activities) to see if

they would be interested or even participate. Better yet, involve them in the planning and designing of the activity. Then there will be built in ownership which may grow to involve their friends who also may be far away from Jesus.

Yes, I know all these steps take time and effort. Yet with each step and each conversation, a relationship is being formed. Plus, if you really listen and involve people and work with them, there is a much greater likelihood that this will build participation and attendance later. If they are far from Jesus, they may even come closer to Him, and by God's grace, confess their faith in Him. After all, the goal is not putting on the program! (Yes! Read that line again please!) The goal is loving people, serving them and this process of putting on an event or program will give you a greater opportunity to grow close to them and for them to grow closer to Jesus.

First Quarter District Board Met Mid-January Tackles Mission Opportunities, Synod Convention Business

The LCMS National Convention is slated to be in Tampa, FL next July 20-25, 2019 under the theme "Joy: Fully Lutheran" from 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18. Greg Walton reported to the board about what it means to be the "host" District. Our District volunteer coordinator will be Mrs. Liz Pfeffer, wife of Pastor Dean Pfeffer, Hope/Plant City. She actually works directly across from the convention center in Tampa, and will be coordinating with the Synod and with Kathy Keene as we support the 2019 Synod Convention. Liz Pfeffer anticipates having the volunteer form available early in February.

The board continued to review the celebration of the District's 70th Anniversary, and while the fan-fare has subsided, the goal of raising dollars for the Mission Loan Fund continues. The challenge is to raise \$70.00 per member of the FL-GA District for the Mission Loan Fund. The goal is to connect people to Jesus through the celebration of this significant milestone. The potential, if all participated, could be well over \$3.5 million. Laura Zirbel, Executive Director of Finance and Administration gave an update of details.

"Let's let Jesus be seen in 2019" is the theme that has been adopted for the anniversary year.

Oscar Benavides gave a report to the board about the FiveTwo Network activities. Details are on the following page.

During one break-out session the presidium met with the executive committee to review staff salaries and make recommendations to the board. Between December 3-14 annual Staff Evaluations were performed on all staff members. Both Laura Zirbel and Jay Wendland continue to show what great hires the District made late in 2018.

Rev. Dr. Victor Belton, Rev. Scott Gress and Rev. Michael Mast are serving as mission facilitators in various regions of the District. They meet monthly, via ZOOM, with Oscar Benavides. This team met with the Mission Advisory Council and the Circuit Visitors just prior to the District board of directors meeting in Orlando.

Jay Wendland reported on the LCEF Fall Leadership Conference that was held in San Diego in November. District Delegates included Greg and Edith Walton, Mark and Marybeth Brink, Karen (Dennis) Cerny, and Stan (Jody) Engel as well as our new DVP, Jay Wendland. Speakers included Edwin Meese III and Mike Meese, as well as Patrick Lencioni.

Five of the seven District Presidents on the East Coast have come together to form a program called GPS, to serve pastors in their first few years of ministry as they develop and continue to learn. The goal is to help them adjust to life in the parish as they transition from the seminary.

These five districts along the east coast have opted out of participating in PALS (Post Applied Learning for Seminarians) sponsored by the Synod so that a greater personal involvement in the new pastor process can occur with involvement from the District Presidents.

These DPs meet monthly via video calls and then annually face to face. Each month the participants are given a lesson with some assignments and follow up. The participating District Presidents are present to answer questions and to get to know the pastors, and we will each be teaching sessions online. The goal is to cement a strong bond between the pastors and the DPs so that there is a greater confidence and stronger relationship. The first faceto-face even took place immediately following our District Board of Directors meeting with excellent participation.

The 2019 Veterans of the Cross Retreat will gather March 4-6, 2019 under the theme "Bearing Fruit on the Edge" at the Life Enrichment Retreat Center in Fruitland Park, Florida. This event is inclusive of laypersons and now is the time to remind the retired workers in your congregation. More details are available on the back cover of this issue.

Mark Brink and Rusty Huseman, District Legal Counsel, are working with President Walton to explore the possibility of entering into a partnership with Ministry Safe. Huseman explained the concept of "grooming" and the danger our youth have as it becomes more and more widespread.

Through Ministry Safe the District would make a training program available to all of our ministries — churches and schools — to create a greater awareness and understanding of the dynamics that are typical in instances where sexual abuse of children by adults is taking place. Additional information about the organization is availbale at ministrysafe.com/ They are located in Fort Worth, Texas and are one of the nation's leaders in training to protect children and provide background checks. The mission of Ministry Safe is, "to protect children and those who serve them." As Brink, Huseman and Walton develop this strategic partnership more will be reported.



The District School Administrators Conference will be held February 27 through March 1 in Daytona Beach at the El Caribe Resort. The theme for the conference is, "The Leader Within You." President Walton will serve as Chaplain for the event and Pastor Scott Gress is the featured presenter. District Legal Counsel, Rusty Huseman, will present on Legal Issue Impacting Lutheran Schools, Mr. Bob Boyd, Principal at St. Paul, Lakeland and our District Representative to the Florida Association of Academic Non-Public Schools, will update the administrators on proposed and pending legislation that impacts our schools. A.J. Cluck, Principal at Trinity, Delray Beach will present on Retention of Students and Mark Brink will lead a discussion that will focus on how the District might best serve our schools.

The District School Music Festival will be held on Friday, February 22nd, at St. Paul/Lakeland. Daniel Bates, the Music and Band Director at St. Paul is leading the planning process for this event. Students from throughout the District will perform in choir, band, orchestra, praise band and bell competitions. It is a full day of celebration of music arts.

Plans for the 2020 Haitian Lutheran School Teachers Conference continue to move ahead. 
reach President Greg Walton's goal of 10 new starts each year.

Through the FiveTwo Incubator, they envisioned a resource center at the church that would build relationship with their immigrant neighbors and share Christ with them.

On February 20, 2019 they will launch the **Peace Center for Life** that will include expanding the ESOL program, offer immigration legalization resources and other important needs programs.

"The world around us is changing, and too many people still don't know Jesus," Borges emphasizes.

Lutheran World Relief, IMA World Health Join Forces

BALTIMORE, MD — International humanitarian organizations Lutheran World Relief and IMA World Health today announced they are combining operations to dramatically increase their impact on breaking the cycle of poverty and promoting healthier families and communities throughout the world.

Lutheran World Relief, based in Baltimore, and IMA World Health, a faithbased public health agency headquartered in Washington, D.C., integrated January 1 with a single CEO, leadership team and staff, and identical boards of directors.

The combined organization mobilizes a joint staff of 550 people in 21 countries around the world.

Ambassador Daniel V. Speckhard, president and CEO of Lutheran World Relief, will lead the unified organization. Rick Santos, who served as CEO at IMA World Health for the past nine years, will serve as a senior advisor for the transition.

"The move is a natural evolution for Lutheran World Relief and IMA World Health, which have worked together for more than half a century," Speckhard explained. "IMA World Health was founded in 1960 by a coalition of faithbased organizations, including Lutheran World Relief, to provide medical supplies to the world's poorest populations. Over the years, IMA World Health has provided \$75 million in medical-related materials to Lutheran programs and has evolved to become a comprehensive public health agency.

"In addition to our ongoing work serving more than 35 million people around the world, the combined agency is expanding programs to improve water and sanitation and thwart cholera in Haiti, prevent the spread of Ebola along the Ugandan-Congolese border, and provide treatment for pediatric and cervical cancer in Tanzania."

The two organizations' financial strength and complementary work in public health, rural livelihoods and emergency relief greatly extends the unified agency's reach throughout the world, Speckhard said.

"We're making this historic move to better serve the world's most vulnerable communities," he said. "We will have a much greater impact together than we ever could have apart in the goal of ending extreme poverty and hunger and building healthy communities."

Has Served as Chaplain for Past Three Years

Jim Weist Recognized for Chaplaincy Service to Palm Beach County's Sheriff's Office



A little more than four years ago, the Rev. James Weist made the decision to work with the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office sering the community through the unique and important calling of a chaplain. A chaplain is traditionally a cleric, or a lay representative of a religious tradition, attached to a secular institution such as a hospital, prison, military unit, school, labor union, business, police department, fire department, university, or chapel. "After some of my own hurt and tragedy, the opportunity for me to give back to our

first responders and especially those who are most hurt and broken in our society was something I felt called into," Weist explains. "After serving for a little more than a year I received training in CISM — Critical Incident Stress Management — for groups and individuals. I am one of a number of first responders for Palm Beach County for a major crisis in the community. I primarily work alongside fire rescue, and to some degree police officers, helping them process through major incidences that primarily involve childhood death and acts of terrorism."

Pastor Weist was recognized for his work through the Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue. Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue is one of the

largest Fire Departments in the state of Florida and they respond to emergencies such as fire, medical, car accidents, hazardous materials or conditions, plane crashes, aircraft emergencies, chemical spills, fuel spills, water rescues, animal rescues, hurricane/disaster planning, preparation and response and even presidential motorcade details.

Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue receives approximately 140,000 emergency 911 calls for help each year. There are 49 fire stations, including Palm Beach International Airport covering 1,761 square miles and there are more than 1,500 employees.

"My work with fire rescue has primarily been helping them process through several



critical incidences that have transpired during 2018," Weist continues. "All of the service is volunteer, although you do need training to be a part of the critical incident stress management team. As a pastor — and most importantly as a Christian — I believe it's important to be involved in this ministry because we can be called to deal with the most tragic and horrific challenges in the world. The only thing that brings hope is to ultimately point people to God and the answers that only He can provide. Without God, we are totally hopeless. But to be able to listen and love and walk alongside those who are in vulnerable circumstances and to provide love and care to them is both an honor and a privilege. I want to give back the love I have received from Jesus and other Christians so that those who go through challenges know that they have hope as well."





ACCEPTED!





As their chaplain, you have to know how to approach these situations and help the officers through them."

Eggebrecht may be called upon to offer up prayers or talks at specific public events something he is well-qualified to do as both an LCMS ordained minister and published author. In some cases, chaplains may even need to officiate at an officer's funeral.
