

The Equipping Church

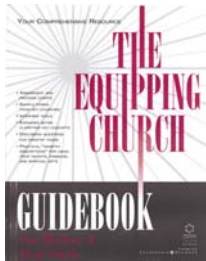
... is a church where¹

- pastors and leaders enable church members to share in ministry
- people's gifts, talents and life callings are matched with areas of service
- ministry opportunities are recognized and developed
- the culture encourages the growth of a broad array of ministries
- a well-designed system addresses needs of every kind, both individual and corporate
- the pastor doesn't have to be all things to all people

From a list of seven biblical imperatives, principle 2 says: "God has a unique purpose or calling for each of us." God knew before we were born what He intended our purpose and calling to be. So we aren't wired to do just anything we want to. We can work and serve, but we often find our greatest joys when we understand God's purpose in our lives.

"In that light, consider the word volunteer, which is used freely in churches. It implies that you "choose" to do something optional or extraordinary. If you are created with a purpose and specifically gifted to accomplish that purpose, how is what you were created to do from the beginning of time an act of volunteerism? Gift-based service is not an optional activity, but the activity for which we were created."²
