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Seminaries Scramble to Adjust Traditional 'Call Day' Worship

Due to concerns about the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic, both Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO and Concordia Theologial Seminary/ Fort Wayne, IN call days will be held as a "virtual-only event" for the first time. Students, deaconesses, interns, graduates - and even the LCMS Council of Presidents – will not attend.

Calls will be announced during one 7 p.m. (CDT) virtual service at csl.edu/ callday for the St. Louis Seminary on April 28, Tuesday.

On Wednesday, April 29, Concordia Theological Seminary will hold their virtual service – also being live streamed at 7 p.m. (CDT).

In St. Louis, Seminary President Dr. Dale A. Meyer will preach. It is his final call day service before his retirement. Dr. Glenn Nielsen, Director of Placement and Director of Vicarage and Deaconess Internships, will announce the assignments and calls.

Students, families, congregations and the public are encouraged to share photos and videos of their in-home celebrations and watch parties on social media by using the hashtags, #CallDay2020 and #CallDayWatchParty.

In a March 30 video message to students, Meyer addressed the disappointment many in the Seminary community feel regarding the out-ofordinary format for these events: "We don't only grieve when someone dies.

We also grieve when we lose something precious to us . . . you are experiencing grief. After all these years of sacrifice and study for a most noble purpose, you and your family can't celebrate in the way you had planned and hoped for.

'Let's all make a conscious decision to meet this grief with hope," Meyer told students. "There should be no lessening of our joy as our Lord places you into His service in the church, no lessening of our joy as we look to the closing weeks of the semester, even if our rejoicing is done a little differently this year with social distancing or isolation in our homes, living rooms, basements and yards instead of together in the chapel."

After the concluding services, both seminaries plan to post a list of where the students and graduates will be going.

"Call Day loses the handshakes and hugs, singing together with full voices, and looking at beaming faces when the assignments and calls are handed out," Nielsen said. "But the excitement is not lost. The anticipation of 'Where will I go?' continues to build. Congregational members will rejoice because a vicar or intern or candidate is on the way to serve them

"This year, the way Call Day is carried out is different, but what remains the same is that our gracious Savior gives us so many reasons to celebrate. Thanks be to Him!" Nielsen concluded.

The Skit Guys, who will be performing at the planned September President's Equip Conference, have launched a nightly online series for all ages called "Bedtime Bible Stories with The Skit Guys." Tommy Woodard and Eddie James are The Skit Guys and they are filling a need for people and families, especially since church and Sunday school aren't happening as they normally would. Each episode of Bedtime Bible Stories features a story from Scripture, a thematic keyword, a prayer, and a Bible verse that viewers are encouraged to memorize over the course of a week — and they're funny too!



The show airs at 7:30 <u>PM (C</u>entral Time) every night on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and YouTube, and viewers engage with the video and each other in a chat while it airs. But if that's too late for your little ones, the recorded sessions are also available on their website: skitguys.com.

Seminary President Emeritus

Rev. Doctor Karl Barth Enters Rest

The Rev. Dr. Karl Barth, who served as president of the LCMS South Wisconsin District (SWD) from 1970 to 1982 and as president of Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO, (CSL) from 1982 to 1990, died Feb. 16. He was 95.



Barth graduated from Concordia College/ Fort Wayne, IN, in 1943. He received his Master of Divinity from CSL in 1947. He served as assistant pastor at First English Lutheran Church in New Orleans from 1947 to 1950; pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church in Centralia, Ill., from 1950 to 1952; and pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in West Allis, Wis., from 1956 to 1970.

Barth was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Divinity by Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, in 1975. He served 16 years on the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR) and as CTCR chairman from 1974 to 1982.

Barth served on various other LCMS boards, including the LCMS Board of Directors, and directed the Synod's 150th anniversary celebration. His Synod duties took him to partner churches and seminaries in Europe, Africa and Asia, and he remained active in retirement as a preacher, writer, advisor, mentor and fundraiser.

Barth was preceded in death by his wife, Jean (Kelly) Barth. The Barths were married for 68 years and were blessed with five children: Linda (Tom) Grams, Karl, Laurel (Chester) Buchanan, Kurt, and Lisa (David) Graf.

CSL President Dr. Dale A. Meyer said, "Karl Barth served Concordia Seminary at a very critical time. ... [His] tenure brought the stability and positive prospect for the future that an institution must have. Concordia Seminary thanks our Lord for providing President Barth, and we extend our condolences to his family."

LCMS President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison said, "Thanks be to God for Dr. Karl Barth! He was a rock steady leader during some of the darkest times in the history of the Missouri Synod. His father had been president of our seminary in Springfield, and Karl followed faithfully in the footsteps of his dear father, both in confessing the truth of God's inerrant Word, and in leading a seminary with great fidelity.

"We shall miss our friend and father in Christ, but only until the resurrection! Amen, come Lord Jesus." He is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

What a beautiful greeting this is, and even if you were not able to verbalize that on Easter Sunday, it is still true. Many of us have heard the old Bill Gaither song, "Because He Lives." While we may not totally agree with the theology of the song, look again at the truth of the chorus: Because He lives, I can face tomorrow; Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future; And life is worth a living

just because He lives. Life is worth living, especially

as we discover our purpose and celebrate our faith. We are confident (meaning "with faith") that the Resurrection of Jesus is our hope in the midst of an often-hopeless world.

The world all around us is living in fear and needs hope right now! God has given us the very message of hope to share as we proclaim the living and risen Jesus. From the very beginning, God's desire was for this good news to be shared with the world.

As soon as Jesus appeared to His disciples, He was empowering them to go into the world. We read in JOHN 20, Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent Me, even so I am sending you.' And when He had said this, He breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them, if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld.'

Without question, the disciples were living this moment in fear. They had watched Jesus die. Each was a known associate of Jesus. They were concerned there was a price on their heads. After all, who knew what Judas had told the officials? They worried about what this would mean for their families. It would not take long for news to get back to Galilee. In fact, the bad news was spreading like a virus . . . perhaps this was the reason Jesus' first words to them was "PEACE."

While it was a common greeting in that day, I cannot help but think it had an especially poignant meaning to the disciples that night. In spite of their fears, Jesus still sent them into the



world. Maybe He reminded them of His earlier words, *Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom.*

Jesus makes this promise to us too in the midst of our fears! We have the joy of knowing that our Savior is alive forevermore, and He has promised us new life eternally. This means we do not have to fear the sting of death any longer. No one will escape it, but those who believe in Jesus know it is not the end! We already have the victory! We can boldly proclaim with Paul, *The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.*

Disease may affect our physical bodies, but it cannot take away what Jesus has freely and graciously given to us through His death and resurrection! It is with great confidence and boldness we say with Paul, For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. We don't have to live in fear because Jesus has given us hope, real and abiding hope.

This hope filled the disciples with a profound boldness that would continue to grow each of them in the coming days. Following the Ascension, they go as sent missionaries to a world that didn't know Jesus, willingly risking their very lives, filled with the hope and love of theirs, and our, Messiah.

Jesus has now placed the mantle of responsibility on each of us who proclaim His death and resurrection. The word *responsibility* often frightens people. It is simply the ability to respond. Even as the Father sent Jesus, God now sends us into a world filled with fear and hopelessness. We are lights in the darkness. We are not becoming lights, by virtue of Jesus' rising from the dead and our faith in Him; we are His lights, made so by His grace. In the midst of hopelessness, we carry true hope into the world, a hope that we find in Jesus! As Paul reminds



us, For to this end we toil and strive, because we have our hope set on the living God, who is the Savior of all people, especially of those who believe.

It is our privilege to go to the highways and byways with the message of forgiveness and life in Jesus as we shine His light and share His hope. The season of Easter is all about life over death. It is a season of *victory*, celebrating that we no longer have to live in fear. We do not have to fear death; we do not have to fear sin, disease, hardship, or persecution. We have hope that grounds us in the truth of Jesus Christ. This is the hope we get to share with the world!

As I've pondered the COVID-19 virus, while it is certainly wise that we all take necessary and proper precautions, we can do so with hope. The Psalmist tells us, Your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.

My times are in His hands — so are yours. This reminds me that God has it all under control. I don't have to understand it. I don't have to agree with it. I don't even have to like it. You can't add or take away from the days ordained for you. What is more important is how you use the days God ordained for you. He is Sovereign, and we can put our trust in Him. If you need proof just look to Easter, when our Lord Jesus came back from death to life. We don't need to live in fear! The Risen Jesus is our hope, and the hope for the whole world! Because He lives, we can celebrate — today, tomorrow, and eternally!

In the midst of all that is happening around us today, let's not forget to look forward, with 2020 Vision, and plan for tomorrow and all that can be accomplished as we shine His light. Read through the following pages for some wonderful examples of what can happen when God's people come together to share the hope and love of Jesus.

Lessons from a Quarantine

Sitting at home they missed the sermon and the occasional solo singing of "Sally the songbird" (a nickname they had given her privately). She had a nice voice. But now they seem to be on their own. It was an anxious time.

So they would catch a bit of religious television. They tried a couple of times to click on a link from the church's email to watch the service. But it wasn't the same so that didn't happen too much. The pastor even called once. That was really nice. They thought, maybe we'll come back after this virus thing passes.

Maybe? That's the fear of every caring pastor. That this "virus thing" will disrupt the patterns and habits of people and afterward they may not even come back!

What can we do?

What should we do?

It appears as if God has temporarily taken away a key ingredient to our ministries: the gathering of people in corporate worship. That can be detrimental to our relationships including our relationship with Jesus. But it likely is also an opportunity to address something that we may have been missing: intentional ministry of one on one care and encouragement.

In the past we used that corporate worship as a convenient starting place to connect with people one on one. We chat on the way out, we got to know, we encouraged, went together to Bible class or we just had a cup of coffee. Yet maybe we became less than intentional in our relationships assuming that the worship services alone were enough to minister to people. But now that we don't have that convenience and blessing of corporate worship, we are of necessity becoming more aware of the critical nature of one on one ministry.

So how can we connect with people now? How can we strengthen relationships and faith and help one another to serve others who are likewise anxious and lonely? Those are great questions for a coaching Christian leader.

It's really pretty straight forward and doesn't require a lot of training. How about the telephone? We can simply check in. Step one: ASK, "how are you doing?" Step two: LISTEN (this is the most important part).

■ Step three: ASK, "how can I pray for you?" If they say yes, you immediately have permission to call again to follow up on how God is answering prayers. You can even pray right there on the

phone. (Notice this first call said nothing about "telling"?) You get the picture. In this way, one call will lead to multiple calls. Multiple calls lead to sharing what you read in your devotions that morning (if you did) and additional questions. Such as: "how are your friends, family and neighbors?" "How is God using you to bless them?" "How can I support/pray for you in your blessing of them?" "Who do you know at church that you can call?" Affirmation and thanksgiving can follow. One believer encourages another.

This is not a pastor thing. It is a body of Christ thing. It will probably require lay leaders to model the way so that it can be replicated by John and Mary and others. God has blessed us with relationships. So God is inviting us to step into what might be new behaviors and conversations to love on the people He loves. One on one ministry like this, whether member to member or member to unchurched neighbor is the necessary counterpart of corporate worship. Two sides of the same coin. Along the way we can share stories of what God is doing in those conversations with our fellow members and our pastor.

Together you can praise God that He is working through the body of Christ in tangible and substantive ways. John and Mary can't wait to come back and share what God has been doing through their phone calls. In fact they are bringing two couples to church when corporate worship resumes next month!

We may even come to give praise to God for a virus. It is an opportunity and even an excuse to love our neighbors like never before. Come to think of it, we can continue this even after the virus passes! What a blessing!

Payroll Protection Program Applications Now Available

The US Department of Treasury Payroll Protection Program (PPP) borrower information and Ioan application is now available online. This is a Small Business Administration (SBA) Ioan program with a feature which allows for partial Ioan forgiveness, available to small businesses and non-profit organizations. This is a time-sensitive program with lending offered through an approved SBA lender.

The loan application acceptance process begins on April 3rd and ends

on June 30, 2020. Should you decide to pursue this funding, please start the process *now* as funds are limited.

In addition, the LCMS headquarters and Lutheran Church Extension Fund have issued letters that provide additional clarity.

A letter from Congress regarding the intent to include houses of worship is available online.

We continue to update our website with the information we receive from the Synod office, Concordia Plan Services, and other resources that might be of assistance to you.

The FLGA District office continues to seek further clarification and details from the Small Business Administration (SBA) and other Treasury publications on this statute.

If there is one thing I know about youth workers, it is that they are great at networking with other people for creative ideas. Amazing new ministry ideas have sprung up during this time of physical isolation right here in our district.

At Messiah/Tampa, FL DCE Abby Moss was already doing short daily Lenten devotions via text messages before social distancing was a thing. The teens she has connected with have been posing questions and responses and creating hashtags on what they are discovering. Abby also suggested the online resource of Visual Faith Ministries (www.visualfaithmin.org/) which provides great free resources for journaling.

Josh Cromley, the DCE at Faith/Merritt Island, FL has been producing Lent and Sunday videos for Facebook and YouTube. He has also found good connection with families through the Remind App as he also encourages them in family devotions.

The youth at **Our Savior/Saint Petersburg, FL** have been put into digital youth groups online and their DCE, Cassie Moore, interacts with them several times a day. She has also done a few Zoom meetings and they started filming school-wide devotional videos that are being sent out to families.

At **St. Luke's/Oviedo, FL** DCE Megan Skelton has been hosting children's message lessons online in between their Sunday morning streamed services. She has been sharing ideas for games, snacks, and activities that families can do together to enhance the lesson based on things they have around the house. DCE Annalisa Fitzsimons has been encouraging parents of middles schoolers as they strive to parent well while everyone is at home, including faith conversations and fun. She has been sharing these ideas through Instagram stories, messages, and the US Postal Service.

Eric Gerken, the DCE at **Prince of Peace/Orlando**, **FL** has been reaching out to the youth through phone calls and texts. He has also found Zoom and Kahoot! to be helpful online tools to connect with youth.

Leah Welter, the Director of Youth and Family Life at Grace/Winter Haven, FL has actually found better attendance for their Facebook live Sunday School then they were getting in person. At Our Redeemer/Augusta, GA, DCE

Josh Eckstein released a web page filled with Sunday School resources for families. He is using YouTube as well to connect with the youth. Josh and his pastor, Roger Schwartz, are teaming up on a church-wide Bible Study opportunity for their congregation.

Faith/Viera, FL sent out \$25.00 to each family in the church with a note that said, "If you need this, please use it. If you don't need it, please pass it along to someone who does." David Timmerman, the DCE at Faith, also has been sharing short children's messages via YouTube, Bible studies on Zoom, preschool chapels on Zoom and YouTube, and Facebook Live videos for some of the larger Bible studies.

Kami Jo Mogelang, the DCE at Grace/ Naples, FL has been sharing children's messages in their Facebook Live worship and providing Zoom lessons with kids for Confirmation and youth Sunday School.

At Zion/Fort Myers, FL DCE Tim Richter has also been doing children's messages in the live stream services and sending links online for Sunday School experiences for families.

At **St. Paul/Weston, FL**, we sent out short video thoughts for youth on YouTube to do while they are at home. We have recorded songs we sing in chapel and Sunday School and shared them with families on a YouTube playlist. We have also connected on Zoom for youth Bible class, and

Zoom and YouTube videos for confirmation classes. While all this technology is great for connecting with



people, sharing ideas, Bible studies, worship, Sunday school, confirmation, and more, we can't forget about the simple one on one connection with people. Cassie Moore said, "Honestly, the most impactful moments have come from me texting students and parents and just checking in and offering to lift them up in prayer."

Personally, I am thankful that even though our context for doing ministry right now has drastically changed, the message of the Gospel has not changed. We are children of God and while the times may seem uncertain, sharing the Gospel message is still our calling.

The gas 'shortage' was really all in our cars instead of at the pumps!

Once the panic subsided, the gas trucks were able to fill the tanks at gas stations once again and everything returned to normal.

So the question for God's people at a time like this is, how do we now live? The answer to that question is completely dependent on answering

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We have also set up "Zoom" sessions and Pastor Pete LeBorious has moved his college age group meetings from McDonald's on Sunday nights to meeting virtually online. In doing so the group has grown from three or four to more than ten. Perhaps that age group is finding it more convenient.

Our entire worship team has begun planning to start a Daily Devotion and Word of the Day that will be Monday thru Friday on our congregation's website. I've been thinking of doing this for quite a while and this crazy pandemic helped make it a "now" decision.

I don't think any of us who are living through this pandemic will ever forget it. This has totally changed our lives. I have never experienced a time in my lifetime — now more than six decades — where we were given a "shelter in place" order. The panic buying at the grocery stores reminds me of the gas "shortage" crisis in 1979 when I was a freshman in college.

After the Iranian Revolution, gas shortages occurred, and while it was about a four percent decrease in the world supply, it created a "panic buying" of gasoline that led to long lines at the gas stations.

I can remember people were topping off their tanks every day instead of driving around with a more important question: Who are we? You and I know that we are God's children, sinners all, but forgiven and redeemed by Jesus' blood shed for us at Calvary. And being

a redeemed sinner is so important! Since we are redeemed, bought back from sin, death and hell, we are empowered by the Holy Spirit, who works through God's Word, our Baptism and the Lord's Supper to live the life we are called to live *IN* this world, but not *OF* this world.

When others panic from fear of this virus (or anything else that may come upon us in the future), we don't fear because we trust the Lord to be with us and guide us through this tough time, we pray and trust that the Lord will guide the scientists working to find a vaccine to stop the pandemic and therapeutics to cure it for those who are victims of the virus, we do our best to be good citizens and follow the dictates of the government (put in place by God — see ROMANS 13), and we ask God to protect us, our loved ones, the people of our country and the world until the pandemic is stopped.

During this State of Emergency, many of us are finding that we have more time at home! Imagine that! How many of us say over and over again that life is so hectic — if we could just slow down a little bit! And now we can!

Families have more time

together — how wonderful!

District President Greg Walton encourages us all to use some of this time to be in God's Word, to seek His direction and guidance and peace — rather than just binge watching television. That's a great idea . . . why not re-read the Small Catechism — you'll be amazed how relevant it really is!

Sharing Hope in the COVID-19 Crisis

Life has quickly changed. From social distancing, to worshipping online, to jobs lost and schools closed. Yet we know that we have a God who is unchanging, whose "mercies are new every morning; great is Thy

faithfulness" (LAM. 3). It is therefore our privilege to share with those who are struggling and who often don't know the hope that we have in Christ.

Amazing Grace/Oxford/ The Villages, FL is in the midst of bringing that hope to many who have been laid off due to the Coronavirus. In partnership with a local foundation, the congregation is partnering with the Santoro Foundation and local businesses to give \$100 Publix Gift Cards to laid off workers. Those receiving the gift cards are referred by their employer —who partner with the charitable group to cover up to 50 percent of the card value.

"The response of those receiving the cards has been humbling," Pastor James Rockey offers. "We had people crying saying they weren't sure how they would feed their family this week! One woman responded saying, 'I was just

praying that the Lord would show me what to do . . . and the phone rang telling me about the grocery card!"

Amazing Grace also partnered with the Foundation to provide the Gift Cards to their Early Learning Center staff and many of the families from the center. To date more than \$7,500 has been distributed and up to \$50,000 has been made available. "It is our prayer that these cards will bring hope to those struggling and assure them that they are valued and loved," Rockey concluded. "When people ask why we are doing this, our answer is, every day we experience Christ's love. So, as John writes, 'We love because He first loved us!'" (1 JOHN 4: 19). When you walk down the street of Frankfurt, Germany you might be surprised at the faces you see in crowd. Frankfurt is home to the central bank of the European Union. This banking city has attracted people from all over the world. More than half of the city's population have foreign passports.

At Trinity Lutheran /Frankfurt, Germany, the English-speaking, worshipping community comes from 16 different nations. Missionary Pastor Gary Schuschke (below) and the members of Trinity work together on two main mission goals. The first is to bring the Gospel out to the four million people who live in the Rhein-Main area of Germany. The second is to prepare members to take the Gospel back home with them to all the countries from which they come.

Two of our newest members — Sarah (above), whose mother is from Zimbabwe and her father lived behind the Iron Curtain in East Germany as a child — and Deborah (below), whose parents come from India and work in international banking. Both of these girls will grow up speaking three languages at home and will likely learn more in school. Imagine the plans that God has for these children as they grow!

You prayers and support make it possible for Pastor Gary Schuschke and the members of Trinity Lutheran Church to minister to the people of greater Frankfurt and to families like Sarah's and Deborah's.



These days, we are all wondering, "What good can God bring from this pandemic?" "How is God working through all the pain and struggle to bring the good He's promised?" (ROMANS 8:38).

I wonder if the Easter story and post-Easter appearances of Jesus might give us a clue. Read through the post-Easter appearances in the Gospels with highlighter in hand. There was a lot of *GOING* going on, from those who were going to the tomb, to Jesus final words to His disciples at His ascension, to the scattering of the persecuted Christians in the early days of the Christian Church. Why all the going? I think its part of God's genius plan.

When Jesus ascended into heaven, he gave his Church a vision

and a mission. We call it the "Great Commission" (MATTHEW 28:18-20).

The vision is that His Kingdom will reach every person and permeate every nook and cranny to the ends neighborhoods, according to God's plan. We have been called and set apart by the Spirit through our baptism into Christ. God's grace and peace is ours. It's multiplied again

of the earth. The mission is for His followers to make disciples as they are going about their every-day lives. The means to accomplish this was also given — Baptism and the Word of God.

St. Peter in his first Epistle, pictures how God's genius plan will be carried out: "Peter, an apostle (sent one) of Jesus Christ: to the elect exiles (chosen and sent ones) dispersed (scattered, sent out) in Pontus, Galatia, Capadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the

Father, and set apart by the Spirit for obedience and for sprinkling with the blood of Jesus Christ. May grace and peace be multiplied to you" (1 PETER 1:1-3).

It's genius. And it fits our current circumstances.

The sent ones (believers — us!) are scattered throughout the world, in various communities and



and again to us. And we are the ones sent out to multiply it, that is, to share God's grace and peace with others as we are going about our daily lives. That's the basic element of making disciples. As new disciples are made, they gather together in groups of disciples (church) to grow in faith as they study and share the Word of God and receive His gifts in the Sacraments.

God's plan is genius. It's simple, reproducible. And it works.

God's genius plan involves addition and multiplication of disciples. And God's genius plan involves us individually, and in groups (which we call congregations or churches). We are the ones to whom God has entrusted His plan!

Let's dig deeper. Disciple-making is the addition of one new disciple or a new family at a time. This is the mission of the local church, the people of God in their daily lives and spheres of influence. These days, we are literally reduced to the simplest forms — our immediate family, neighbors, a few co-workers. By our witness of word and deed, we invite them to meet Jesus, to learn what He is like, and what he's done for them. That's disciple-making, even in a pandemic.

At the same time, local church leaders must think multiplication which involves releasing and sending people to start new faith communities in new places to reach new people. Today, we are not sending large groups to start new churches in new communities. Rather, we must think neighborhood, house churches, simple faith communities.

Addition takes place locally as new disciples are made. This is an essential

part of God's genius plan. Intentional multiplication is also an essential part of God's plan to reach new groups of people with the Gospel. Multiplication involves equipping, empowering and sending Christian people into their communities to start new faith communities which will add new disciples and will intentionally multiply by releasing and sending people to start new in still more locations.



Genius!

In these days of the Coronavirus Pandemic, we are presented with a real-life illustration of multiplication - the multiplication of the virus by social contact. Let's apply this idea to the church. Jesus' goal is not to build bigger churches and to gather bigger crowds. His goal is to make disciples who are released and sent in order to multiply according to God's intent. His goal is that his church will fill every nook and cranny of the world! That requires releasing and sending on our part. These days of "shelter in place" have pressed us to do this in new ways using social contact and technology to equip, to empower and to send.

Adding and accumulating will no longer get the job done.

Today, the vast majority of churches in the U.S. (80-90%) exist in a survival culture. The average church has below 100 members and struggles to survive. They focus on gathering and keeping the next few members, rather than on raising up and sending the next 10 leaders. They often operate with a "scarcity" mentality, protecting their resources. They are stuck. But they could actually multiply!

Another group of churches have an additiongrowth culture. About 10-20% of U.S. churches are in this group. The Pandemic has challenged these churches severely. They can no longer simply rely on growing in attendance and making an impact by serving their communities. Adding new multi-site locations isn't possible right now. Plans for adding new staff, starting a building project, even increasing support for missions and mercy work have been put on hold.

What if we were to ask and answer questions like these: How might we use this opportunity to start a network of new faith communities in our region? What if we planted a series of new micro-churches in places where we already have a handful of members? What would it look like to plant five new microchurches before we add staff? What if our next staff is a network leader for these micro-churches? What if we designate a generous portion of our tithe for starting new faith communiites?

Less than .01% of US churches are actually multiplying churches, according to Leadership Network and LifeWay Research. These are churches that have multiplication at the core of their values and practices. They may be churches with as few as 100 members. They define success by their "sending capacity" rather than their "seating capacity."

These churches have a culture of multiplication



Some Questions for Discussion & Action:

1. In this time of Pandemic, how might God have strategically placed you to be a part of his genius plan? What is your role as one who is called and sent by the Holy Spirit? Pray about this. Talk about this with a few others.

2. What difference would it make if your church embraced the values and behaviors (culture) of multiplication? What would be different about the way you operate?

3. What are the first simple steps you will take to learn more about the culture of multiplication and how to shift to that culture in your church?

which tells the stories and celebrates the behaviors of multiplication. These churches will start a new church before they build or buy their own first building. They will send a church planter or before adding their second and third staff members. They will commit a generous percentage of their tithes to church planting and prioritize that commitment. They will plan to start or join a network of churches who collaborate to plant new churches, and thereby accomplish more than any one of these churches could do on their own.

God has a genius plan. It works. It has worked since Jesus' ascension. It works in our day of Pandemic and post-pandemic time. It begins with leaders who value multiplication as well as addition, and who want to be part of God's genius plan to call and send his people to every community and neighborhood until every nook and cranny of the world has seen the Kingdom of God in its midst. It looks like reaching many for Jesus in 2020!

And it begins with you.

This world turns and turns. Regularly expected things are not as normal. Things seem to blow up and there seems to be a lack of order and normalcy.

This is perhaps how the COVIDW-19 Coronavirus challenge has many of us feeling. Nothing is normal, usual, casual or stable. Everything is in a state of flux.

Understand these times of stress and crisis are not unique to the United States but even now, as with this global pandemic, every nation is challenged, has decisions to make and every nation is being uprooted and disturbed. Our Father has no regard for some people over others, consequently every nation, or people have challenging times that call them back and remind them of the Sovereignty of God. Even the people of God, Israel, have passed through these kinds of challenges before and their God, our Father, in loving grace and mercy, has always been right on time dispensing everything necessary for His people and nations to survive and thrive.

The son of Miriam Brauer Guelzow and the Reverend Roy Guelzow, James Roy Guelzow was born on April 15th in Columbus, Indiana. He entered God's family of grace through baptism on May 9, 1948.

Pastor Guelzow came to the FLGA District in 1955 when his father accepted the call to establish Grace/Fort Lauderdale, FL. Jim attended Concordia College, Milwaukee, Concordia Senior College, Ft. The Rev. Dr. Jon T. Diefenthaler is President Emeritus of the Southeastern District of the LCMS, having served in that office 2003-2012. He is currently a Church-Relations Advisor for Lutheran World Relief and an Adjunct Professor at Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO.

Born and raised in Milwaukee, WI, Jon is a graduate of Concordia/Milwaukee, WI, Concordia Senior College Ft. Wayne, IN and Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO. He also received an M.A. degree in American History from Washington University/St. Louis, and a Ph.D. in American Religious History from the University of Iowa.

The subject of his doctoral dissertation was H. Richard Niebuhr, and he has since published two books on the work of this 20th century American theologian.

During the course of his career, he was on the faculty of Concordia Theological Seminary, Springfield, IL (1972-1975), and he served as pastor of Bethany/Waynesboro, VA (1975-1997), as well as senior pastor of Our Savior/ Laurel, MD (1997-2003).

As a District President, serving his full nine-year term, he was a member of the Board of University Education (2005-2009), the Commission on Theology and Church Relations (2009-2112), and Vice Chair of the Council of Presidents (2009-2012). In addition, he was a member of the Board of Regents, Concordia/New York (2013-2016) He has been widowed two times: Linda Reineck (1994) and Vivi Provine (2018), and he has four children and twelve grandchildren.

For the past two decades, he has resided in Columbia, MD. Jon was the chief coordinator of ECCE — the East Coast Common Endeaver, a gathering of the United States East Coast District Presidents. He also participated in the Southeast Regional Gathering — a group of LCMS District Presidents and

ELCA Bishops, all from the Southeastern United States. He also has been involved in Lutheran World Relief. Jon has a reputation for being an excellent preacher, teacher, and communicator as well as a great leader. While serving as the District President of the Southeastern District he

Worldwide concern about the COVID-19 virus continued to grow as this issue of Lutheran Life went to press. The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod (LCMS) is closely monitoring the situation to provide the best possible information and counsel to LCMS staff and missionaries who may be in areas of increased risk.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), coronaviruses "may cause illness in animals or humans. In humans, several coronaviruses are known to cause respiratory infections ranging from the common cold to more severe diseases such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) and Severe Acute **Respiratory Syndrome**

(SARS). This new virus – #19 – and disease were unknown before the outbreak began in Wuhan, China, in December 2019."

According to the WHO, as of March 1, there were 87,137 confirmed cases of COVID-19

d writing, there have been more than 12,900 deaths related to COVID-19 in the United States. The death rate from COVID-19 in the state of New York is around 28 per 100,000 people. New York is the state with the highest number of COVID-19 cases. Kendall Cortright, director of LCMS Missionary Services

Cortright emphasizes that, at this time, no LCMS missionaries have been affected by COVID-19. All, he says, remain "safe and healthy."

There are, however, several recent CDC travel advisories regarding COVID-19, several in areas where LCMS missionaries are located, including South Korea and Italy (CDC advisory level 3 - reconsider travel), Japan (level 2 - exercise increased caution) and Hong Kong (level 1 - exercise normal precautions). OIM will continue to monitor travel alerts, particularly in countries where the LCMS has missionaries and that have a level 2 advisory or higher. The OIM is recommending all deployed staff prepare in advance for logistical challenges related to travel bans on affected countries and keep their travel to affected countries with level 2 or higher to a minimum.

"The virus is quite frightening for many people," Cortright notes, "but we recognize that its impact is relatively small in comparison to influenza, which so far this season has infected 26 million people, resulting in 250,000 hospitalizations and 14,000 deaths in the U.S. alone."
