Introduction

Your passion for prayer is evident in the sacrifice of time you are making today. As you come to Him, be certain and confident that God will hear and answer these prayers. He will provide you with all you need to put Jesus' words into practice.

For the second day of our FLGA District Prayer Vigil, we are focusing on our walk together, our worship and our church workers. We have almost 200 congregations in our District. Some have been worshipping together for over 100 years, others for just a few. We have congregations in big cities and rural areas, by the water and near the mountains. Today we pray for these worshipping communities. The people, that by Your grace, fill our sanctuaries.

If you find your mind wandering or if you have additional time, begin to meditate on one of the suggested scriptures relating to the Vigil's theme. They are listed for you on the last page of this document. May this time of prayer and meditation with our Lord open your heart more fully and prepare you for the many challenges and blessings that lie ahead!

Opening Prayer

Gracious God, in Your Word, we are reminded how it "is good for us to gather" as Your loved and redeemed people. Lord, we have missed being in community with each other, singing Your praises, praying, growing and then being sent out. Yet even more importantly, we treasure Your presence with us in Word and the Sacrament of Your table. For those who still cannot meet together, be with them in these days when it is not possible. When we must be apart for reasons of safety, we trust that You surround us with Your protection. Help us to celebrate the ways that we can be connected and continue to experience Your promise "that where two or three are gathered together in Your name, You are present." Encourage us in connecting as we are able, reaching out to our neighbors in love with the hope of Christ. Lord in Your mercy.

Guide our congregations, Pastors and all those who serve Your Church, as we consider how best to prepare and respond in our congregations, families, workplaces, and communities. Give us courage to face these days with faith, not fear! Lead us to respond boldly with compassion, concern, and acts of service, trusting that You abide with us always. Lord in Your mercy.

Lord, we are called to be Your servants. Yet we have nothing to offer except the desire to honor You and be workers in Your harvest. We are but frail broken vessels, yet You chose us. We therefore pray, grant us Your Holy Spirit, that we would not speak our own words, but Your Word. We pray this not for our own benefit or pleasure, but that others too may know of Your love, power and protection. Lord in Your mercy.

Give us courage to confess the name of Jesus Christ before all men. Help our congregations and each of us as individuals to care for them, to act as neighbors to them and to share with them what You have given to us. Send us, Lord as witnesses of the Good News of Your love made known in Jesus Christ. Lord in Your mercy.

God, You are our peace and our strength, we pray for Your Church, our local congregations, our nation and the world as we face the uncertainties around the corona virus. Protect the most vulnerable among us, especially all who are currently sick or in isolation. Grant wisdom, patience, and clarity to those on the front lines, whether in healthcare, government service or in the many other essential services that meet the needs of Your people. And Lord, watch over them and protect them as they perform their duties. Lord in Your mercy.

Keep us, dear Lord, under the shadow of Your mercy in this time of uncertainty and distress. Sustain and support the anxious and fearful and lift up all who are hurting and struggling. Provide for Your peoples' needs as You provide the resources for the mission and ministry of Your Church. Lord, we pray this so that we may rejoice in Your comfort knowing that nothing can separate us from Your love in Christ Jesus our Lord. **Amen.**
