Seminary Opens 185th Academic Year With 122 Students

Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO held the Opening Service for its 185th academic year in the Chapel of St. Timothy and St. Titus. Seminary President Dr. Thomas I. Egger preached on the new academic year theme, "We Belong to Christ," based on 1 Cor. 6:19-20 and Rom. 14:8-9.

The service concluded a week of orientation for the Seminary's 122 new students, which includes residential and distance students in both the Ministerial Formation and Advanced Studies departments.

During the service, distance students enrolled in the Specific Ministry Pastor Program, Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology, Center for Hispanic Studies, Crosscultural Ministry Center and Online Deaconess Studies Program were recognized for their vicarage and internship assignments.

In the July/August, 2023 Annual Report issue of Lutheran LIFE, we incorrectly reported Grace/Naples, FL's congregational contribution. The 383-member congregation's contribution was \$42,000 for yearend 1/31/2023. This equates to \$110 per congregation member. We regret the error.

What Does a Leader Look Like?

What do you look for in a leader? For generations, God's people were hoping and praying for a leader, a King to fight for them. They wanted a strong charismatic leader, one who could problemsolve, a winner-takes-all kind of leader. Yet instead of giving them what they wanted, God gave His people what they most needed. He gave someone they did not expect as a leader . . . His Son.

Contrary to the popular characteristics of leaders then (and now), they received Jesus, not a man of noble birth or the best schools, but a carpenters' son from a "nothing place" called Nazareth. On top of that, Jesus wasn't known for normal leadership attributes, instead He was known for humility.

In Philippians 2, Paul reveals his prayer for the followers in Philippi to complete his joy by being united. Paul knew that if Christians were to live a life worthy of their calling (1:27–30), they had to turn from "selfish ambition or vain conceit" (2:3) and be unified through having the same mind, love, and be one in spirit and purpose (v. 2). Such leadership is easier said than done!

I remember watching our girls play soccer when they were very young. There wasn't really much teamwork other than they all had the same uniform. When you watched the team on the field, at times it looked like everyone was going in different directions. Talk about the challenges of getting everyone on the same page and united with one another!

This is also true with our coworkers, friends, and family alike. Paul's solution was to lead through humility, that is considering others above ourselves (v. 4). Paul points us to the ultimate example of humility, Jesus Himself (Philippians.2:5–11). Many experts believe early Christians sang these words during worship gatherings. They are filled with rich teaching of the life and saving work of Christ. But don't miss Paul's purpose in writing these words . . . He wants the Philippians to be united, and the only way that will happen is to model their lives after Jesus Often the greatest lessons in **life** come from the least

expected places and people. As I was reflecting upon this, I thought about a song from Jimmy Buffett that actually speaks to this very thing. The song is "It's My Job."

In the middle of late last night
I was sittin' on a curb
I didn't know what about but I
was feeling quite disturbed
A street sweeper came whistlin' by
He was bouncin' every step
It seemed strange how good he felt

So I asked him while he swept He said "It's my job to be cleaning up this mess And that's enough reason to go for me It's my job to be better than the rest And that makes the day for me"

Since I was a teen, I've always had a job, beginning with roofing houses, Publix, church janitor, the State of Texas, and Allstate Insurance. Along the way, I've been asked by people why I do what I do? I think some of that comes from seeing me enjoy working and striving to do it well. My answer, like yours, could be to support a family, because of education or it's something I'm passionate about. But the answer I believe is most profound is saying, "This is my calling!" In a very real sense, this expresses accurately the New Testament's perspective on serving as the way of Christian life!

We who are in Christ are all called to lives of service. Serving is integral to our response to who God is and what He has done for us. When Jesus called His disciples to come follow Him and be "fishers of men," He wasn't just saying, "You sit there in the boat and watch!" No, it was as if He was saying to them, "I have a job for you to do. I want you to be involved in My work and mission!"

Regardless of how you may serve the Lord in the Church and in your life, it's all about serving and leading like Jesus! Whether you're called to serve as a Bible-study leader, work with youth, volunteer in the school or church nursery, sit on a board or committee, make phone calls, maintain facilities, pray from home, raise children, care for a sick or elderly loved one, or in any number of roles, God's call to service is about being united with Christ and seeing others

united with Him as well.

In Biblical terms, service is not a pathway to greatness; service is greatness. For as Jesus said in Mark 10:45, "Even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." We don't serve sacrificially in hopes that we'll be "promoted," as in the workplace or school, nor do we serve for some reward. Jesus says, "If anyone would be first, he must be last of all and servant of all" (9:35). You see, it's not all about you or me.

Ultimately, we serve the Lord and those around us, so "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Phillippians 2: 10-11). Do you see? Our focus is not inward upon ourselves or our wants or perceived needs. It is looking with the eyes of Jesus that when He saw the needs of the people, He had compassion upon them.

People of the Florida Georgia District, we are to live united to Christ and for Christ! The apostle Paul understood this clearly when he wrote, "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" (GALATIANS 2:20).

So, how does the "life you now live" reflect this? My prayer is that each of us will daily remember that through our Baptism, we are united with Christ. And in response to what He has done for us, may we serve Him by humbly serving those around us so that they too may "acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord!"

Veterans of the Cross Retreat Announces Dates, Place and Theme

Retired church workers and their spouses will be gathering once again at the St. Stephen Retreat Center in Titusville, Florida from Monday, March 4 to Wednesday, March 6, 2024 for the annual Veterans of the Cross Retreat.

The retreat was established in 1979 by the late Florida-Georgia District President Dr. L. Lloyd Behnken to stimulate retired professional church workers with relevant ministry and senior presentations in addition to helping people connect with friends from years past.

The theme for the 2024 retreat will be "Pace for the Race."

"As people enter retirement, a major question one might ask is 'What does God want me to do with my remaining time in

this world?' Ms. Ruth Wiedenmann, retreat chairman inquired. "This is critically important!"

The writer of the book of Hebrews explains that, for followers of Jesus, life is primarily a matter of running "with endurance the race that is set before us" (HEBREWS 12:1). For Paul, the goal of that race was to finish strong (2 TIMOTHY 4:7).

In order to reach that goal, Paul set everything else aside, keeping his eyes fixed firmly on the prize. (Philippians 3:14). This should be our goals as well — to finish strong, running the race God designed for us and pacing ourselves so we don't miss the opportunities before us.

"No matter who we are, what our age or how far we've traveled on our pilgrimage, the Lord still has a job for us to do," Wiedenmann said. "There is an urgent

need to continue to serve the Lord. Let us find the pace that will see us over the finish line. Come to the 2024 Veterans of the Cross Retreat and rediscover God's purpose for your life and advancing the cause of His Kingdom."

The annual presentation of Behnken Medallions will also be a significant part of the retreat. These are be given to "veteran servants" in four categories: pastor, teacher, church at large and lay person.







Convention Approves Revision of University and College Bylaws



The five presidents of the synod's Concordia's stand on stage in unity as the convention voted to adopt Resolution 7-04B, "To Revise Bylaws to Revisit and Renew Relationship of Colleges and Universities with the Synod." This extensive resolution, spanning approximately 25 pages *Today's Business*, is the product of four years of work demanded by 2019 Res. 7-03, passed at the LCMS Convention in Tampa, FL. Floor Committee 7 Chairman Rev. Dr. Scott R. Murray introduced the discussion by asking the five Concordia Presidents to stand. "We are delighted to have those faithful leaders here with us today. All through the process of Floor Committee 7, they have adamantly described their desire to be more faithful and more tightly tied to the church, her confession, her teaching." Murray presented the five university presidents (from left) Dr. Michael Thomas, Concordia/Irvine; Dr. Erik Ankerberg, Concordia/Wisconsin and Ann Arbor; Dr. Russell P. Dawn, Concordia/Chicago; Dr. Bernard Bull, Concordia/Nebraska; and the Rev. Dr. Brian Friedrich/Concordia, St. Paul. Prior to the vote the assembly gave the men a standing ovation as they confirmed they unanimously supported the resolution.

Delegates adopted Resolution 7-03, which affirmed the LCMS Commission on Constitutional Matters opinion that actions taken by Concordia/Texas (CTX) to change its governing documents are in direct conflict with the Synod's Constitution and Bylaws and are thus null and void. Resolution 7-03 also called upon the CTX president, Dr. Donald Christian, along with CTX administrators who advocated for and supported CTX's purported separation, and the CTX Board of Regents (BOR) to submit to the governance of the Synod, repent, and seek reconciliation and restoration by rescinding their actions. Dr. Christian did briefly address the convention delegates. The resolution, which further asked the LCMS Board of Directors (BOD) and others to take action to address the situation, was adopted with 72% of the vote.

In keeping with the spirit of Resolution 7–03, on Tuesday, Aug. 8, the LCMS BOD reached out to the CTX BOR to request a board-to-board meeting in August. Members of the current Concordia University System Board of Directors will also be invited to attend the meeting.

Convention Delegates elected 22 pastors, commissioned ministers and laypersons to fill seats on the Concordia University System Board of Directors, as well as on the boards of regents for the Concordia universities and seminaries.

WE PREACTION CONVENTION

Resolutions About Schools, Family Life, Young Adults and Youth Passed With High Margins

Convention delegates adopted six resolutions presented by Floor Committee 12 on Schools, Familu, Young Adults and Youth.

Since convention business was running slightly behind schedule, LCMS President Matthew Harrison asked the assembly if they wished to "move with alacrity on less controversial overtures" by voting on the resolutions without hearing any debate. The assembly voted in favor of this motion.

As a result, delegates proceeded to adopt the following resolutions.

First, advisory commissioned minister Dr. Christopher Cody, education executive for the LCMS South Wisconsin District, introduced the rationale for Res. 12-01A, "To Produce Uniform Set of Lutheran Academic Standards for Our Schools." This resolution was composed in response to four overtures calling for distinctively Lutheran curricula for all subjects and grade levels. "Standards and curriculum are often used interchangeably," Cody explained. "Standards are goals for instruction that remain constant; curriculum is the content of the instruction — the textbooks and other materials that are used to achieve the standards that can change over time. Estimated expenses for the creation of Lutheran curricula for all subject matter is cost-prohibitive an estimated \$30 to \$50 million."

A uniform set of Lutheran academic standards would provide guidance when purchasing textbooks and other curricular materials. Furthermore, these standards could be used by Concordia Publishing House in future curriculum development.

Next, the convention considered Res. 12-02A. In light of "governmental, legal and related institutional overreach," which often results in children being subjected to anti-Christian indoctrination on a variety of matters, Res. 12-02A moves to affirm and confess the Godgiven authority of fathers and mothers in the education and raising of their children.

Res. 12-03A, "To Address Commissioned Minister—Teacher Student Debt," resolves to encourage congregations and schools to regularly conduct salary and benefit reviews — with an emphasis on assisting teachers with student debt repayment as a regular employee benefit, and contribute to church work scholarship funds in their districts. These actions are especially urgent given that low salary is a primary reason that fewer students are studying to become

teachers, and student loan debt is a primary motivation to seek higher paying employment.

A resolution giving thanks for Lutheran schools passed unanimously as did on encouraging family devotions putting an emphasis on "fathers" leading devotions in the household.

One final resolution — Res. 12-06, was passed encouraging the use of Current Research and Resources for Ministry to Youth — urging LCMS congregations to involve high school youth and young adults in the lay leadership of the church; encouraging pastors and youth leaders to develop relationships with young people; commending LCMS Youth Ministry and LCMS Rosters, Statistics and Research Services for their research efforts; and encourages all Synod congregations to study "Relationships Count: Engaging and Retaining Millennials."



Mission: Haiti Launches "Meals for Months" Program, Community Health and Development

Mission Haiti is a faith-based 501c3 non-profit, tax exempt corporation that grew out of the Florida-Georgia District of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. It is registered with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Affairs and files an annual report with the State of Florida, which can be viewed on that website.

"Mission Haiti promotes self-sufficiency projects, medical care, nutritional and educational programs, and health education for children and families," explains Mark Brink, board chairman for the FLGA organization. "Mission: Haiti walks beside our Haitian brothers and sisters in Christ, investing in them and celebrating with them as they achieve self-sufficiency and their vision for an abundant life in Christ."



All of the financial resources received from supporters of Mission: Haiti are utilized exclusively to enrich the lives of the people of Haiti through a variety of ministries. Donor support has made this ministry possible for nearly 25 years.



"Community Health Outreach events are designed to evaluate and aid those with physical concerns and to educate families and community leaders how to better care for themselves and others," offers Dr. Nancy Swisher, a Family Practice physician from Wisconsin. She has served in medical missions in the Middle

East and South America as well as Haiti. She has served with Mission: Haiti since 2012, traveling three times a year to bring medical education and help to many different

areas of Haiti. Her compassion, expertise, skill and concern for helping Haitians learn how to take the best possible care of their families has alleviated a great deal of suffering and illness.

"Certified medical professionals lead workshops for expectant mothers and mothers with infants. Participants learn about healthy birth practices, proper nutrition for mother and child and safe infant care. Infants also receive 'well-baby check ups.' Sessions for families focus on making healthy food choices, the importance of clean water, how to avoid cholera and parasites and the importance of personal hygiene," Swisher says.

Haiti is the most impoverished nation in the Western Hemisphere. Nearly 75 percent of children in traditional orphanages have a parent or adult relative who could care for them if they were able to afford the child's schooling and food. GROWW is a Mission: Haiti program that provides everything needed for children to thrive in their home and stay in school.

"For just \$1 per day, a family can be supported enabling a child to stay in school," points out Anne Dobbins, one of Mission: Haiti's staff persons working in the Orlando area. "Walking alongside the residents of each community we are able to develop sustainable projects that enrich their quality of life — things like chicken coups and goat farms, agricultural improvements and clean water projects."

Lutheran Social Services of Northeast Florida Participates in "Summer Without Hunger"

Summertime, for many, means vacations, and days of play in the sun. But for some children and families, it's a time of less access to food. Thousands of children in Northeast Florida rely on free and reduced lunch programs and Lutheran Social Services of Northeast Florida (LSSNEFL) worked hard to provide these throughout the summer.

"It's heartbreaking to think of a child or a family to go without food," offered Bill Brim, President & CEO of LSSNEFL during a June live interview with First Coast Connect. "LSSNEFL predicted the need this summer to increase by approximately 10 percent based on previous years. The LSS Food Pantry saw a 30 percent need increase in 2023 compared to this time in 2022."

According to Brim, they responded to the need by kicking off the "Feed the Future" summer campaign. The goal of the campaign was to raise at least \$10,000 by June 30th. Because of those who generously donated during the Feed the Future summer fundraiser, the LSS Food Pantry was able to ensure almost every foodinsecure family stayed fed this summer!

"That's more than 85,000 meals for children and their families!" he explained.

"The LSS Food Pantry has been seeing an increasing need for food this year. In May, 2023, we served 45 percent more families than in May, 2022. We asked for help from the community, and so many came to the aid of our food-insecure neighbors.

"Our original goal was \$10,000. Once we got halfway there, a generous donor offered to match the next \$5,000 raised, dollar-for-dollar. In the end, our campaign exceeded \$18,000 to support the pantry in a time of need, ensuring fewer families struggle with hunger in our city.

"While the need is still pervasive, we're so inspired by how our community bands together to support one another in a time of struggle."

About LSSNEFL

Lutheran Social Services of Northeast Florida was incorporated in 1979 by a consortium of Lutheran churches and Jacksonville, Florida community leaders. The first initiative operated by the nonprofit was the Nourishment Network — a small food pantry that has fed hundreds of thousands of food-insecure families for more than 40 years.

Just one year after the launch of the Hunger Relief program (formerly known as Nourishment Network), LSSNEFL began resettling refugees admitted to the United States due to dangerous political climates or natural disasters in their own countries. Four

decades later, the Refugee Services program team still helps hundreds of refugees each year, from finding them places to live to assisting them with employment. In 2022, LSSNEFL, along with its partners, served over 2,500 refugee clients.

In 1992, LSSNEFL established the AIDS Care and Education (ACE) program to provide case management, mental health services and education for people living with HIV and AIDS.

In 1995, the Representative Payee Services program was implemented after the Social Security Administration and the Florida Department of Children and Families approached LSSNEFL to help with the management of fiscal affairs for low-income people who need help managing their income appropriately to provide for their basic needs. This includes but is not limited to those receiving Social Security and disability benefits as well as VA and Railroad Retirement pensions.

In 2017, LSSNEFL partnered with LISC Jacksonville, United Way of Northeast Florida, Family Foundations and the New Town Success Zone to launch Steps 2 Success, Florida's first Financial Opportunity Center. S2S provides integrated employment and financial coaching, along with emergency income supports, to help people attain their goals and realize their vision.

"Everyone needs a fresh start at some point. Whether it's a family having a hard time putting food on the table, or a refugee trying to find their place in a new world, Lutheran Social Services of Northeast Florida is here to help. For more than 40 years, we've empowered hundreds of thousands of people in Duval County to start again," Brimm concluded.

Redeeming Life Celebrates Milestone Anniversary

Lives are changed in an instant sometimes — a lottery win, a car accident, a promotion with relocation, or a positive pregnancy test. At Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries (RLOM), the acceptance of a pregnant mom into our maternity home and program can be one of those life changing moments. It can end homelessness, food scarcity, and fear for physical safety from abuse. Overnight, a young woman can go from living in crisis and terror to a predictable and safe lifestyle.

Yet, so much of the success with the residents Of RLOM is built, fought and won in the everyday moments, in small accomplishments and in single steps on the path toward independence. These courageous women who chose life for their unborn babies make choices each day and those choices shape their lives, for the better.

One resident stands out as a beautiful story of a life deeply changed during her time at RLOM. This uoung ladu came to us as a foreign refugee, having grown up in an orphanage. She arrived in Central Florida pregnant and alone yet found RLOM and was welcomed in. With a grade school education and no job skills, she worked hard to earn her GED while working at a fast food restaurant. This mom diligently followed the RLOM program and managed to save money each month despite her low income.

Her child was born healthu on Christmas Eve and this mom took to motherhood beautifully, seeking to give the baby all that she never had. When her maternity leave was up, she took a job in childcare so she and her little one could be together on their commute and she could check in during the day. While this childcare position was convenient with her new baby boy, it created another obstacle-poverty level earnings. She worked hard and yet at the end of a year in the maternity home, she found she earned so



little that she didn't qualify for most housing despite her savings.

She applied to and was accepted into Redeeming Life's Transition Home Program. At the transition home she could pay a lower, income-based monthly fee, live in a safe neighborhood and receive continued support from the RLOM ministry. This includes weekly meals and worship, and one-on-one life skills coaching. Here, she continued to work hard and take steps to realize her goals. She took classes and eventually attained her Child Development Associates Certificate and got a raise, which qualified her for more housing opportunities. Her child arew and flourished. she aimed to teach him English and Spanish as well as her native language. She continues to teach him life skills and he is becoming a responsible household member who thoroughlu enious cleaning with his mother as one of his favorite hobbies!

The small choices she made each day — get to work, study for a new certification, parent this child to develop strength and character, save moneybuilt a changed life for this mom and child. Over the course of three short years, she has saved enough for a fully funded emergency savings account and then some! This sizable nest

egg and practice of savings, coupled with her modest salary increase gave her great hope for fully independent living.

The most impactful thing that happened during this resident's time in the Redeeming Life Program was that her son was baptized and she became a confirmed member of the Lutheran Church. By His grace, they know saving faith. Their eternal lives are forever changed. This young woman is deeply faithful to God and continues to prioritize her involvement in her faith community. Her son is a light in the Church and enjoys being involved in all aspects of the worship service.

Now, after three years this brave young woman has graduated from the RLOM program! She found nearby housing that she can be proud of, housing that is safe for both her and her son. For the first time ever they will each have their own bedrooms! As she leaves the RLOM program she is working to gather all of the household essentials her little family will need.

Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries is headquartered in Sanford, Florida where it began in 2013 with a vision and a Christcentered maternity home to help single moms in crisis pregnancy situations who courageously chose life for their unborn babies. Several years later they opened a transition home to allow moms and babies to live in a sheltered environment while continuing to build job skills and complete educational goals before living independently. Redeeming Life's program offers moms more than just housing with the inclusion of a life skills curriculum, support for education and job skill training, a familylike setting, and the personal and spiritual support to build a successful and independent life.

District Scholarships Announced

to filing an application and be enrolled full time in a rostered church worker program. An applicant may only receive a scholarship from one district. A District scholarship may also be awarded for the spring and summer terms and for special programs (SMP, EIIT, etc.) that fit the guidelines. LWML FL-GA District scholarships are dependent upon maintenance of a 3.0 GPA. Scholarships are

given in two installments — half at the beginning and half at mid-point of the school year. LWML FL-GA District requires the submission of a transcript copy at the mid-point of the school year. Three (3) current letters of recommendation are required. Applicants also must have a signed letter outlining applicant's:

- a. vocational calling,
- b. educational goals,
- c. previously attended schools

and degrees awarded,

- d. activities, and
- e. plans for educational financing. Scholarships are available to members of the FL-GA District congregations for full-time service in The LCMS and attending one its Concordia University System colleges or seminaries. LWML FL-GA District also awards a Kuiper scholarship for a mission- minded individual.

Scholarships are awarded based on need, scholastic progress, and aptitude.

What Are These Schools?

At this time, the
Concordia University System
(CUS) is comprised of six
colleges and universities:
Ann Arbor, MI; Chicago,
IL, Irvine, CA, Seward,
NE; St. Paul, MN; and
Mequon, WI.

Together, along with two seminaries in Fort Wayne, IN and St. Louis, MO, they offer more than 160 undergraduate and 50 graduate programs. While each institution is unique, all eight campuses approach learning from a Lutheran context. The common goal is to develop Christian leaders for the church, community and world. Recently a supporter of Lutheran higher education commented, "The Concordia University System is one of the most powerful and far-reaching tools the Lord of the Church has given The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to take the Good News of life in Jesus Christ to a

world desperately in need of hearing and believing in Him, through professional church workers and those trained for other service in our communities."

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Floyd Behrens Called to Glory

Dr. Floyd Frank Behrens, 92, of Seumour, passed away on June 15, 2023 in Seymour, Indiana. He was a native of Lincoln, KS. He graduated from St. John Lutheran School, Lincoln, KS (1945), Concordia High School (1949), and Concordia Teachers College/Seward, NE in 1954. Behrens held a Masters Degree in Elementary Administration and Doctorate in Elementary Education from Appalachian State University, Boone, NC and the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley (1966).



On March 30, 1974, Dr. Behrens married Janet

E. Wessel, Seymour, IN, at Peace/Arvada, CO. Floyd and Jan worked together in the teaching ministry at Concordia/Seward, NE, and Grace Lutheran School/ Winter Haven, FL, for more than 30 years.

Floyd also taught and was an administrator in Lutheran schools in Nebraska and Hawaii. One of his favorite roles at Concordia/Seward was advising freshmen as they began their college education. In 1988 a Call was accepted to Grace/Winter Haven, FL, as the school's administrator, retiring in 1998. Floyd was involved in a variety of parish activities, district education committees, and school accreditation teams. After retirement he remained active in Grace — serving on the program committee of Veterans' of the Cross. Jan and Floyd enjoyed ten years of travel in the U.S. and a number of foreign countries following retirement. One of his most fulfilling post-retirement endeavors was assisting the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod's mission to help strengthen Lutheran school ministries.

Dr. Behrens was preceded in death by his wife Jan.

Remembering

Editor's note — as the Florida-Georgia District celebrates our 75th Anniversary, Lutheran LIFE will be profiling some of the "Pioneers of the District." Special thanks and credit to President Emeritus Gerhard C. Michael, Jr., Charles Hofman and Eileen Bishop-List for past research. Biographies have been edited for space.

The Rev. Dr. August
Bernthal always thought
of himself as a family man whose
love and compassion carried over
to his second family at Grace/
Winter Haven, FL. Viewed from a
larger perspective, the District,
the Synod, and the world beyond
became his extended family as
he vigorously served his Lord.
He was born in Saginaw,
Ml, on November 14, 1922. He
received his education at Alma (Ml)
College; Valparaiso University; and
Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO.

During World War II he served as 1st Sergeant in the famed "Yankee Division" and was awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in the Battle of the Bulae. While at Concordia, he married Mildred Dorothy Vogel in 1948 after obtaining the required special permission from the Seminary president. Gus once told me that he and Millie lived in "cramped. prefabricated government housing reserved for missionaries along with the very few married couples" on the sem campus. Gus met Millie at Valparaiso University, where she graduated with a degree in social work.

In 1950 the honored World War II veteran and recent graduate of Concordia Seminary accepted a position as Missionary-at-Large in Winter Haven, FL Some serious problems of the small mission congregation arose during the first year. Yet, as a result of Bernthal's compassion for his members, a sense of congregational family steadily emerged. It was this close feeling of family among the members at Grace that he nurtured and loved. Upon arriving at Grace, Millie played the plano and organ. For the first decade at Grace she was very involved with music, the children's choirs

and Sunday School. In every way her ministry was devoted to children. She humorously recalls, "Gus wanted a large family — he thought it was a good way to fill up the Sunday School — what a better way to help the congregation grow."

The Bernthals managed to raise six children while growing the Grace/Winter Haven congregation. "The church was our extended family, and Gus cared for his people so much we wanted

them to be a part of our family. For many years, every time we had a new member reception at church, we had another one at home. He loved having people over to our home. During our 50 years at Grace, there was a sense of continuity, of families being born, baptized, confirmed and married — sometimes for three generations in the same family," Millie said.

Pastor Bernthal served his entire pastorate — - from 1950 until his retirement in 2000 — at Grace which remained the primary passion and focus of his ministry. As its first pastor, he saw the congregation grow from 20 communicants to more than 2,800 baptized members and one of the largest congregations in the FLGA District. Despite his many church and civic responsibilities, he also started missions in Bartow, Sebring and Lake Wales.

Dr. Bernthal served as Chairman of the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services from 1975–97, where he championed the cause of those persecuted and forgotten. Grace congregation members opened their hearts and doors to many refugee families throughout those years. Bernthal traveled to refugee camps in Africa, Southeast Asia and the Philippines on behalf of URS and United States Ambassador to Refugees, H. Eugene Douglas, and worked diligently in refugee resettlement. Dr. Bernthal joined a group of government officials and ambassadors on trips to El Salvador and Nicaragua. He served as president of the board of directors of Lutheran Ministries of Florida.

Bernthal was elected to three terms as Florida-Georgia District President from — 1963 to 1974. During his decade of aggressive District leadership, he brought a broader outlook. His new motto was "From Toccoa to Balboa." He was thankful that the District presidency — which at that time was not a full-time position — allowing him time to be primarily a parish pastor, the role he enjoyed the most

He served as Chairman of the District Committee on Missions and Church Extension, a member of the Board of Directors and editor of the District supplement of the Lutheran Witness — the origins of Lutheran LIFE magazine. He also acted as the one-man Public Relations and Communications Department for the District, a member of the Stewardship Committee, Program Chairman of the District Pastoral 19 Conference and pastoral advisor of the Lutheran Laumen's League.

In 1964 he received the honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Concordia Theological Seminary/Springfield, IL. Dr. Bernthal was elected President Emeritus of the District in 1994. Yet, despite all these offices and honors, his first love was his family and

his church family at Grace.

Dr. Bernthal served the LCMS in many capacities. He was Fifth Vice President of Synod and Chairman of the Committee on Ethics. He was a longtime member of the Board of Directors of Valparaiso University as well as the Lutheran Music Program. His involvement in local civic activities was widespread and diverse. His

sermons have been published in a number of books, and worship services at Grace were a staple in radio broadcasting for many years in Polk County.

Rev. Wyatt Kimberley — another FLGA District "Pioneer of Faith," once wrote, "Dr. Bernthal distinguished his office as District President by his dynamic leadership, his evangelical spirit, and his unfailing attention to a multitude of administrative details. The progress of our Florida-Georgia District must largely be attributed to the faith-filled vision, selfsacrificing efforts, and God-given gifts of President Bernthal and his ability to inspire his co-workers to join hands and hearts in the challenging mission of the Church."

Bernthal's church family at Grace and generations of his own family preserve and continue his legacy. Gus and Mildred's legacy includes six children, 17 grandchildren and at the time of his death on January 27, 2004, two great-grandchildren. He was 81.

"He was a good friend, a great Christian leader and an example of what a Christian should be," said Martha Vaughn, a longtime member of Grace/Winter Haven, FL who knew Bernthal for 50 years. "His influence was felt way beyond the city limits of Winter Haven."

Millie Bernthal passed away on December 20, 2019 at the age of 95.
