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John Roth Selected for Florida Gulf Coast University Leadership Institute

Florida Gulf Coast University Athletics will select from applicants a few to experience the E.A.G.L.E. Leadership Institute for a given year. This year, Pastor John Roth, Thrive/Estero, FL, has been asked to lead two sessions in September and October on Leadership and

Character. It is another opportunity to meet with various students and parts of FGCU to connect them to more than the wisdom of leadership principles, but the underlying reality God has for us as those created in God's image.

Congregation leaders of Thrive are working alongside Pastor Roth and others at FGCU to hold an open forum concerning some campus preachers. who, sadly, give Christianity a bad name. They have verbally attacked some students and provoked them. (The word they preach has no Gospel in it, but judgment and condemnation alone and gives a distorted view of God.). Thrive and Roth hopes to train a group of students to encourage others not to interact with these preachers so they have less incentive to come on campus, and to let FGCU students know the Christian student groups are much different.



Be strong through the grace that God gives you in Christ Jesus. You have heard me teach things that have been confirmed by many reliable witnesses. Now teach these truths to other trustworthy people who will be able to pass them on to others. (NLT, 2 Timothy 2: 1-2).

We sometimes hear about traditional trades and crafts being in danger of dying out or being lost. If such skills and crafts are to endure, they need those

who now practice them to pass-on the knowledge and techniques to others. Otherwise, the skills and crafts die out with the craftsman.

To some extent, the same goes for matters of faith. If our faith is to accomplish that for which it is intended and not just survive but thrive, we need to ensure future generations will know what the Christian faith is about and how to receive God's aifts of grace and live it out. Our faith may be intensely personal,

but it's not meant to be just private. We can't keep it to ourselves as a precious possession. On the contrary, it needs to be passed on!

Today, as I write this article, I received news that the Senior Pastor I served with as Associate Pastor in my first congregation, died yesterday. Pastor Dan Otto was a man who helped to shape and mold me during the early years of my ministry into the pastor I became. He had 37 years of ministry experience when I arrived in 1998. Yet his deep faith and passion for seeing Christ's Church grow was as fresh and strong as the day he left the seminary in 1961.

Dan loved discipling people both formally and in the daily walk of life. He knew how to be a friend, how to listen, how to help people understand things of faith and God Himself. He loved to pass-on, to teach the truths of God to others! Dan believed that being a Christian was not just about religion. Instead, it was to be intertwined with our whole life and being. Dan sought to live as an Along-Sider. I believe the words of our reading from Peter were likely a driving force in how he sought to pass-on to others the gift of God's grace in Christ. "Now teach these truths to other trustworthy people who will be

able to pass them on to others."

As we journey through this season of "thanksgiving," I am overflowing with thanks for the many Along-Siders in my life. People like vicars who influenced me as a youth like Mike Mast. Brian Kneser, or my brother and fellow pastor, Jonathan, my neighbor Mrs. Pabisch, Sunday school teachers like Judy Helling, youth leaders, college professors like Dr. Frahm and Dr. Stalhke, my accountability partners and more. The truth is, as I think about it, I've regularly had people who have been Along-Siders in passing on the truths of our faith, so that I would be able to pass them on to others.

You might be a little surprised that I am writing about Living as Along-Siders: Disciples Making Disciple Makers, knowing that

our Conference under that theme has past. Yet this is no mistake.

The theme and focus of our President's Equip Conference was not meant to be "one and done!" Instead, our prayer is that each of us will continue to grow in coming along-side of others and walking with them in life that they too may experience the "joy of the Lord's salvation."

Our belief is that Living

as Along-Siders is one of the most powerful ways for us to honor our Lord's command to "go and make disciples," to "be His witnesses" and to "love our neighbors as ourselves."

During the coming weeks, as you reflect upon your life and all your blessings, I pray you will to take time to remember and give thanks...to give thanks for those who came Along-Side of you and helped you to understand and believe the incredible truths of our faith! Then

as you consider those individuals, I encourage you to respond with the psalmist when he says: I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds. (Psalm 9: 1). Yes, let us give thanks by passing it on to others that they too may begin Living as Along-Siders:

Belton served 27 years as pastor of Peace/Decatur, GA. He served 12 years on the LCMS Board of Directors and as a proclaimer for three LWML conventions. Belton



has also worked extensively in youth ministry and LCMS Youth Gatherings. Belton wrote daily devotions for Portals of Prayer in conjunction with Concordia Publishing House and has commentary to be included in The Great Sending II. He is married to Wenona and has one foster son Michael. He enjoys time on the beach, bike riding and spending time with family and friends.

Keynote Speakers Ron & Barb Pennekamp

The Rev. Ron and Barb Pennekamp have been married for 51 years and have been blessed with 7 children and 19 grandchildren. They have served congregations in Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois and Florida — Ron as a Lutheran pastor and Barb as a Lutheran school teacher. District Hosts LCMS Second

For the second time in the past year, the FLGA District was privileged to host the LCMS Black Clergy Conference (BCC).

St. Paul/Jacksonville FL was the host congregation in Spring, and this past October 9-12, Rivercliff/Sandy Springs, GA hosted the group of nearly 100 participants from across the nation.

Under the theme, "Empowering and Advancing the Next Generation," the BCC has developed a five-point Vision:

▲ 1. ~ Communication — keeping the church at large in touch and up to date with news and issues impacting ethnic groups within the church.

2. ~ Ministry Focus — creating multi-generational dialog between church leaders and members that leads to a mind-shift which strives to engage people who are not currently engaged.

▲ 3. ~ Ownership — encouraging congregations and partners in Black Ministry to invest financial and other resources which will advance Black Ministry for the sake of the next generation.

▲ 4. ~ Recruitment — identifying individuals for professional church work and congregation leadership.

▲ 5. ~ Revitalization — intentionally partnering with congregations, schools, institutions, agencies and partner ministries to recreate, reorganize and restructure in a way that effectively reaches the next generation.

The Rev. Dr. S. T. Williams, Jr., St. Paul Lutheran, Los Angeles CA., serves the BCC as President. Rev. Dr. Victor Belton, FLGA District 1st Vice President and Rev. Dr. Wilton Heyliger, pastor of Incarnate Word, Stone Mountain, GA., worked with Atlanta area pastors Terrell Davis and Carl Morten to prepare a vibrant program. Sisters in the Spirit, led by DCE Michelle Pitts, Our

"New crayons, new backpacks — it's back to school time here," reports Sheryl DeWitt, Executive Director for Redeeming LIfe Ministries/Sanford, FL.

"We have two residents who are returning to their studies. One mom is training to be a dental technician and one mom is studying to become an RN. We are so proud of these women as they work, attend classes and parent their little babies. They are working so hard to be able to live independently!"

According to DeWitt,
Redeeming Life continues to
hear from pastors, laypeople,
and district workers about
the opportunity to open a
maternity home in their
part of the country. "We
know God is leading His church to
help with housing, help and hope
for courageous women who
choose life for their babies.

"Spiritually, we know we cannot live independently of the Lord. Throughout history, people have tried to live fully without God, but He created us to be part of His family and we need His love and grace," DeWitt says.

Redeeming Life's East Dundee, IL facility is well under way. "After a few slowdowns this spring and summer over unexpected problems and the required fixes, our new Illinois maternity home is once again smelling like sawdust and progress. We've held a program called 'Sponsora-Room' and it's off to a good start — with several bedrooms and other areas in the home sponsored by churches who will raise the moneu to furnish that area. With funding levels from a few hundred to thousands of dollars, the program has something for everyone.

Currently, every classroom is full, but parents are encouraged to add their children to the school's waiting list because openings do become available during the school year when families move.

Called to Trinity/Cape Coral, FL, he has served as their pastor since his ordination in July 2007. He and his wife Kim have four adult sons.

According to Rev. Gerhard Michael, retiring mission pastor at St. Peter, "This installation was a most joyous event, as it marked another milestone in the congregation's effort to reach out more fully to its community. The only formal Lutheran presence in Lumpkin and Dawson counties beginning in 2008, it was chartered as a congregation in 2018, and after 15 years was able to call and install its first resident pastor, truly a day of rejoicing."

The mission effort was begun by Wayne and Nancy Kuhlmann, a lay couple from Living Faith/Cumming, GA and assisted by a number of different pastors until December, 2013, when Pastor Michael assumed the pastoral leadership. Since September 2020, Rev. Dr. David F. Kruger has assisted him. These "semi-retired men" have now "passed the baton of leadership" to Pastor Kanefke.





Trinity/Trinity, FL broke ground September 10th marking the start of construction for a new 5,400-square-foot combination sanctuary and fellowship hall. With planned completion in early 2024 this marks the next phase of a long successful ministry to the Trinity, FL area. Trinity is located at the junction where Pasco, Hillsborough and Pinellas Counties meet and The Trinity Community is named after Trinity College of Florida, a Bible college founded in 1932, when it relocated to the first occupied site in the communities developed by James Gills in the late 1980s.

The congregation's multiple ministries includes monthly breakfasts for the homeless population of Moonlake, annual Vacation Bible School programs, a Senior Wish Tree at Christmas, Adopt-a-Highway program, LWML, Saturday Children's Ministry, and a recently started on-line prayer request ministry.

As part of his remarks Trinity's Pastor Marc Nauman said "God has been so faithful to our congregation and I can't wait to see how He works through the people of Trinity to make a greater impact in our community. This new sanctuary will play a big part in helping us do that!"

Congregational President Marc Truit added "Trinity, Florida is at the epicenter of growth in one of the fastest growing regions of the country. Our congregation's need for growth is right in line with the needs of our community. Ground breaking is a celebration of a lot of hard work by many involved. I am honored to have served a role and I cannot wait to realize

our upcoming ability to serve our community growing needs with our expanding Sanctuary."

During the four year planning and permitting phase of the hurricane resistant, 140 MPH rated structure, costs for the multimillion dollar project nearly doubled, making financing especially challenging, and signifying a true leap of faith by this congregation. Completion of this work will ultimately provide space for additional ministry to this community especially with the repurposing of Trinity's original 1,650 SF multi-purpose building to provide much needed office space and classrooms, and soon a new Rebecca's Garden of Hope children's ministry.

of Theology and certification as a Director of Church Ministries.

DIRECTOR OF CHURCH MINISTRIES: DCM

This is a relatively new program in the LCMS and only offered at CUW. Graduates in this program will be eligible to be a rostered church worker. This is what Concordia University Wisconsin says about this program: "The beauty of 'the Body of Christ' is that each of its members has a unique and vital role to play. The same goes for church-workers. While the Church needs well-trained ministers for the pastoral office, it also needs 'Faithful Aarons' who can support the work of their pastors. Perhaps the Lord is calling you to 'hold up the prophet's hands.'

Concordia's Director of Church Ministries (DCM) program will provide candidates with the theological training and skills to make an impact wherever they are asked to serve. Graduates will be prepared to be a professional church worker, assisting the pastor in developing and leading congregation ministries. This may include supporting Bible studies, community outreach, mercy work, and administrative duties. Because no two graduates will have the exact same roles, course participants and graduates will benefit from management and leadership courses that will help adapt to any situation."



During October of each year Trinity/Athens, GA dedicates quilts and yarn works that the "Sew and Sew" ladies group made. These items are then given away to various community needs. In October of this year they had 70 quilts and numerous knitted items to give away. They will go to Trinity's military veterans (30) and the Lauren Greene Cancer Center as well as homeless individuals. Since inception Trinity has donated more than 1,000 quilts worldwide to various needs.







Fort Lauderdale Lutheran Legend Cliff Berry Called to Glory

Clifford Livingston Berry, Sr. passed away October 2, of this year. A native of Fort Lauderdale, FL, he was the fourth of five sons born to Rena and Martin Berry on March 23, 1930. Along with his brothers, Gene, Martin and Curtis, Cliff was educated at Trinity Lutheran Church & School/Fort Lauderdale, FL.

After graduation Cliff joined the Air Force, and while stationed in San Antonio, Texas, he met his future wife, Betty. They were married in 1951 and returned to Fort Lauderdale. He began his career in Port Everglades working for Pacific Molasses.

In addition to his full-time job, Cliff became a hardworking entrepreneur on the docks of Port Everglades. In 1958, with just 10 employees, he founded Cliff Berry, Inc. and began branching out into the fields of oil and chemical clean up and disposal. Other family businesses followed, including Port Everglades Overnight Trailer Park and Poplar Lodge Supper Club.

Cliff was awarded the Coast Guard Distinguished Public Service Award in 1991, the highest honor the USCG gives to a civilian other than the Life-Saving Award and in 2001 he was awarded the prestigious Seafarers Golden Compass Award given to outstanding contributors.

In the Lutheran community Cliff and Betty Berry were devoted members and life-long supporters of Trinity Lutheran Church — especially the school for more than 70 years. From churches and community organizations, to schools and the Little League, Cliff Berry has been a lifeline of support for groups that improve the quality

of life in his native Fort Lauderdale and the Port Everglades community.


Cliff and Bettu also led the way in forming Lutheran High School of South Florida — a first among LCMS congregations in Southeast Florida. Cliff helped corral more than a dozen LCMS congregations stretching from Hollywood to Pompano Beach into an association that served the high school-aged students coming from those congregations.

The Berrys regularly provided financial support to many educational institutions as well as the Florida-Georgia District. They also participated in the development of the Cooperative Feeding Program of Broward County. Cliff was also famous for his barbecues and golf tournaments that enabled dozens of organizations to raise their own funds.

When asked about the special influences in his life, Cliff named two — his faith in God, and his lifelong partnership with his wife, Betty, who predeceased him this past February 9th. Their strong Christian faith most certainly shaped their extraordinary generosity — believing that God had blessed the two of them with everything they had, so that they could be a blessing to others.

Cliff is survived by his six children: Cynthia Berry, Sandra Berry, Candace (Donald) Church, Barbara Berry, Kimberlee (Joseph) Sawyer and Clifford Berry II, 11 children, and five great-grandchildren.

Memorials can be made to the Seafarers' House, a non-profit organization where Cliff Berry chaired the board of directors.



Seafarers' House is supported by the faith-based community as well as by labor, business and civic leaders with a mission "to offer refuge, resources, renewal and respect to the maritime community through multi-faith service." Open throughout the year, Seafarers' House is a safe, friendly place where mariners can connect with their families, relax. or get emergency assistance if needed. With the help of its supporters and volunteers, Seafarers' House offers many services including low cost international phone calls, free transportation, Internet access, counseling services, emergency assistance and liaison with authorities as well as recreational facilities. Seafarers' House was recently honored as the 2012 Seafarers' Center of the Year bu the International Committee on Seafarers' Welfare — the first American agency to receive this international honor. Seafarers' House annually hosts as many as 150,000 visits by cruise and cargo ship crew members as well as port workers.

Church Planting In Puerto Rico District Partners With LCMS Missionaries to Plant Churches in Puerto Rico

For the past two years, FLGA District has been a partner with the LCMS church planting efforts in Puerto Rico. In early October, FLGA Director of Mission and Outreach, Rev. Dr. Peter Meier and his wife, Kathy Meier, attended a meeting of the Puerto Rico FORO in Mayaguez, PR, which gave first hand information about mission work on the Caribbean island.

The FORO is a group of congregations, individuals and Districts that support mission work in a particular location and who meet once or twice a year to learn the culture, the mission strategy and see for themselves how the Gospel is being shared. FOROs are now the primary means of direct support for international mission work around the world. Latin American FOROs were the first to adopt the FORO concept.

In Puerto Rico, the LCMS has three church plants: a brand new one in the capitol city of San Juan, another in the southern city of Ponce, and a third on the west coast city of Mayaguez. The primary mission strategy in Puerto Rico involves several components: Preaching the Gospel, community outreach, church planting and education.

The mission team is comprised of Missionaries Rev. James and Christel Neuendorf (Ponce), Rev. Adam and Christine Lehman (San Juan and Ponce), and Rev. Gustavo and Ruth Maita (Mayaguez) together with Volunteer Coordinator Ashley Lehr (Mayaguez).

'The vision is to plant a fourth church and for each of the four churches to plant three additional sites, which will one day be served by local planters and pastors, raised up from the communities," explains Dr. Meier. "These sites will allow anyone on the island to have easy connections with our Lutheran missions. What a great example of multiplication—of churches

and of harvest workers!"

"The FORO gave a weekend example of a team experience as our group toured and worshiped at all three churches, enjoyed a night tour of Ponce, learning the culture and history of Puerto Rico, and had a morning cultural experience in Mayaguez touring a Rum distillery and shopping at the 150 year old Franco bakery," Meier continues. "We enjoyed a typical Puerto Rican lunch in the home of a church member, as well as meals at the Mayaguez church prepared by church members. The FORO meeting focused on mission strategy at each of the three church plants, and a financial report detailing how FORO dollars are spent."

To learn more about the FORO and mission work in Puerto Rico there will be an opportunity on January 9 for a "Transformation Tuesday" — featuring the Maitas and Ashley Lehr. Volunteer Coordinator Ashley Lehr invites short-term volunteer teams to come for mission trips and to learn about life on the island. 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Pioneers of the Faith: Missionary Heros Reminiscing About Dallas & Susan Gibson,

Even hurricanes and hardships could not stop Dallas Gibson from singing his favorite children's hymn, "I Love to Tell the Storu of Iesus and His Love." Long before the Florida--Georgia District was formed, Dallas Gibson was a pioneer Lutheran preacher in Greater Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

After graduation from Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO in 1926, he accepted a call to serve a Southern District preaching station in Fort Lauderdale. He was ordained on September 5, 1926 — to become the pastor of a small group of residents to become Trinity Lutheran Church. He preached his first sermon there on September 12, 1926.

When Pastor Gibson went to preach his second sermon, he found that the congregation had vanished! They had been blown off the map on September 18 by one of the most devastating hurricanes ever to hit Florida.

A stalwart survivor, Dallas Gibson mopped up the receding waters and struggled to minister to the 18 surviving parishioners who had not abandoned Florida. In 1932 he uraed his small aroup of about 40 members — who had officially organized Trinity in January 1927 — to purchase plots of land that included an abandoned awning shop.

This building became the first church and was later used to house a kindergarten, a first grade and a social hall. Dallas and his new bride. Susan. lived next door in a modest parsonage that remained their home for decades. Their screened-in front porch doubled as a Sunday School room, where chirping canaries cheerfully commented on Concordia program pamphlets.

South Florida in those daus was a torturous place to live. An alligator from a nearby canal

once trudged across the church property and even with screens on the windows, mosquitoes infested the church. Singing the words, "I love to tell the story," Pastor Gibson was the first to climb a ladder to paint the awning shop church. He fought sandspurs and weeds while canvassing the area for new members.

His second-hand Model T Ford broke down regularly. Most of his calls were made on foot. Years later Dallas helped pour cement and lau concrete blocks for the first sanctuary and school buildings. During World War II he brushed up on his German and boarded a Nazi submarine that had been captured by U.S. troops and brought to Port Everglades. Pastor Gibson preached the Gospel to those on board.

At Trinity he continued that linguistic skill by conducting a church service in German every Sunday evening until 1955. Dallas Gibson was a strong advocate for Lutheran schools. Susan and he established Trinitu Lutheran Day School in 1933 with just 13 students. Dallas used his carpentry skills constructing some of the desks and chairs himself. The school burgeoned and succeeding classrooms through grade eight were added.

Each week he would play a spirited game of tennis with any student available after school. Despite insurmountable odds and lack of funding, Gibson founded a Lutheran high school by 1945, the first in South Florida. The school peaked in enrollment at 341 students in grades kindergarten through twelfth in 1948.

His dedication to the school never ceased. During a crucial football game in which there were no extra players for subs, a player broke a shoelace. During a time-out, Pastor calmly carried an extra shoelace to the field. It was another way of singing "Jesus and His love."

Dallas Gibson was instrumental in planting other Lutheran churches and schools in the Fort Lauderdale area. In January of 1953, he urged members in Hollywood to form St. Mark's. Later he urged a group to form Grace in north Fort Lauderdale, which later added a preschool. In July 1955 a third group and Pastor Gibson held their first service for Faith west of Fort Lauderdale, where Susan Gibson started a kindergarten in September 1955. As a class level was added each year to grade eight, the enrollment reached 350 pupils. Pastor and Susan continued to serve Faith until 1976.

In September 1975 Dallas Gibson experienced a series of heart attacks, which resulted in his resignation as pastor of Faith effective February, 1976. Had his health lasted until September 5. 1976, he would not have missed a single church service in 50 years. Dallas Gibson passed away in May, 1980.

People remembering Pastor Gibson said he communicated his Christian faith as greatly as his sermons, was a plain man who spoke and acted with such sinceritu and humilitu that his life became his sermon.

A pioneer for the Lutheran faith in South Florida, Dallas Gibson was a planter of churches and a steadfast advocate for Lutheran dau schools and high schools.


Susan Gibson was one of the District's areat teachers and matriarchs. Dallas fondly told everyone how he found his wife in the Five and Ten Cent store where she was employed after she moved from her position as a public school teacher in Alabama. The recent seminary graduate and his "dime store" sweetheart were married on November 24. 1927. Susan's genteel graciousness and melodious Alabama accent warmed the

hearts of parishioners and went on to win new members in every new setting. In 1933 Susan was the only teacher in Trinity's newly established parochial school of 13 pupils. She refused to accept any salary for her teaching, and for the rest of her lengthy teaching career she taught voluntarily with steadfast love and without pay.

Susan was a soft-spoken yet surprisingly strong missionary for the growing church and school. Early Sunday mornings she would travel by car to pick up and deliver students for Sunday School, week after week. She always arrived on time to graciously greet people at the church door, then stood by Pastor's side to say a word as

worshipers filed out of church.

Susan's calm demeanor, gentle strength and humble Christian faith were her hallmarks throughout her many years of service. Largely through the efforts of Susan and Dallas Gibson, the District LWML was officially organized on September 30, 1945, at Trinity/Fort Lauderdale. In September 1955 Susan began a kindergarten at Faith. She encouraged another new Lutheran school in 1956 at St. Mark's/Hollywood, which became a reality in 1957.

Susan Gibson's legacy remains, fondly remembered by the Lutheran schools she helped establish and by hundreds of students whom she taught so lovingly. For Dallas and

Susan their students became their sons and daughters born of labor and love for the Lord. The song they sang so often, "I Love to Tell the Story of Jesus and His Love," is still being sung today in the churches and schools they established.

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Remembering and Celebrating Cliff & Betty Berry

I met my friend Cliff Berry 50 years ago while I was a college student at Valparaiso University in Indiana. A few of my fraternity brothers suggested we escape the frigid weather of the Midwest for our ten-day spring break. Valpo's campus was called "the tundra" for a reason during the winter months when heavy snow would blow down from Lake Michigan.

We headed to sunny Fort Lauderdale where the

"guildy ladies" would often host barbecues at their homes to ensure our students would get a few good meals while in town. Valparaiso University Guild was heavily invested in recruiting students, raising funds to support the students' phusical and spiritual welfare. and serving as ambassadors for Valpo. One of the mom's in Valparaiso's quild knew this quu who owned a trailer park at Port Everglades and directed us there for safe haven during our spring break. We pitched tents and had access to showers, rest rooms and even a swimming pool.

Cliff and Betty Berry, the owners, invited us up to their private residence for dinners, card games, fellowship and

Bible study. They only had two rules: #1 is that we had to have a designated driver when venturing to the famous Fort Lauderdale strip, and #2 is that no matter how late we were out on Saturday night we had to be in church on Sunday morning.

Trinity/Fort Lauderdale was the church home of the Berry family and Cliff and Betty were legends when it came to supporting the congregation's many ministries — especially the grade school known as Lutheran Central School.

Fast forward to graduation and one of my best friends received a call from Central's principal Orlyn Schlie to teach at the school. Praise the Lord ... spring break could continue! Good friends still would venture to Fort Lauderdale each spring and crash

the small apartment of Gary Groth. Schedules didn't always coincide so while we frequented places like the Candy Store, the Button, Penrods and the Elbow Room — and came home well after midnight — poor Gary had to get up the next morning to teach.

After a few bachelor years, I married my college sweetheart, Eileen Bishop, and we eventually relocated to Fort Lauderdale and even lived in the

same apartment complex as Gary. We joined Gloria Dei/Davie — a congregation that launched in the living room of Jim and Joan Schoeff — another pair of Lutheran pioneers who saw a need for a congregation and high-school west of Fort Lauderdale. With the help of Lutheran Church Extension Fund — and plenty of planning by a handful of charter members they acquired about 20 acres of land.

Lutheran High School was fed by more than a dozen congregations from North Miami and Hollywood to Pompano Beach, Florida. Cliff and Betty Berry were tireless recruiters, promoters and friends to Lutheran High.

They were famous for hosting golf tournaments and barbecues to raise funds for teachers and administrator salaries and operations.

Pastors can be protective of their flock — especially when it comes to wallets of their members. Cliff was a master at corralling pastoral and congregational participation. Endlessly! He was a gifted mentor to me and many others during my tenure as board chairman of Lutheran High School.

Betty was called to Glory this past February. Now Cliff has joined her just eight months later. I know Cliff missed her dearly. It's comforting to know she welcomed him to his heavenly home. They left a passionate family who I know will continue their legacy.
