COMPELLED!

We all know that we live in a polarized society and world. So, who or what do we blame? Opinions abound over who's at fault. It's the media, our education system, government, social media, Trump, Biden, Harris, religion, Putin, China, capitalism, wealth, poverty, race, liberals, conservatives.

LIFELINES

You get the idea. We don't get along. We are polarized. And I'm not referring to someone else. I mean us.

This is real as we've all experienced it. One word and we become defensive or want to flee. It's sad. Worse yet, in this polarized world we live in, we quickly lose sight of the very person Christ set us free to be . . . and we fail to see, serve, and love — our neighbor. It is with that in mind that I point you to God's powerful Words in 2 CORINTHIANS 5:13-21, because they change everything. Go ahead and read it — I'll wait.

CORINTHIANS 5:13-21

¹³ If we are "out of our mind," as some say, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. ¹⁴ For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. ¹⁵ And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again. ¹⁶ So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so no longer. ¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: [a] The old has gone, the new is here! 18 All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: ¹⁹ that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. ²⁰ We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us we implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. 21 God made him who had no sin to be sin [b] for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

How awful that selfishness and pride lead me to be argumentative. How shameful that I let greed control my life and even my gifts in relation to Christ. How sad that my words can be driven by a desire to be right or appear better. The fight with our sinful nature is real. Yes, sin can so control and compel us. In God's family, repentant sinners run to the cross, to Christ to free us from our guilt and shame. Yet amazingly, despite what we said or did or posted, week after week we receive from our God what we least deserve — His love! Not anger or punishment or death. Not even hell. But week after week we receive mercy, grace and forgiveness. Why? God loves us in Christ Jesus. And it is that love daily received anew by faith that fills our hearts to such a degree that it will compel us in the way we live.

That's what the apostle Paul is telling us: "¹⁴ For the love of Christ compels us, because we are convinced that One died for all; therefore, all died. ¹⁵ And he died for all, so that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him, who died in their place and was raised again." Get it? Christ's Love . . . Compels Us! It controls our lives. It's our motivation for everything we do. Why? Because we are convinced of something. We've experienced His undeserved love. We've come to know and believe that "One died for all; therefore, all died." In Christ we are dead to sin and alive in Christ who controls our hearts and lives. Jesus, who died for all is our compelling motivation. For our greed, our anger, hate, pride, and selfishness. He took it all on Himself so that we could be with Him forever. And so, "And he died for all, so that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him, who died in their place and was raised again." Christ's love is so unending and life-changing that it becomes compelling — life changing to the point that we "can't

help but live for Him" instead of for ourselves. In Christ we get to be Christ's hands. We get to be generous, speak well of and defend others. Yes, Christ motivates us & compels us to live for Him!

So, what does that look like? What does it look like to have Christ's love compelling us to have Christlike love for God and for our neighbor? Paul tells us in the next verse, "As a result, from now on,

we regard no one according to the flesh." Instead of considering their ethnicity, education, pro this or pro that or consider how they look, or what they have.

What if, in every situation at home, work or in public, we regarded everyone from a spiritual view, as the All who Christ died to save? What if we looked at them as children of God that Christ purchased and bought back from the depths of hell when He died and rose for their sin too? Sounds like a fantasy, but it's not. For when we realize that we all have the same need and consider Christ's love for us . . . we're **Compelled!**

And so, God has then given us this ministry of reconciliation. We get to serve God and serve neighbor with the Good News of reconciliation. We get to live in such a way and regard other people and serve other people in such a way that we love them just as God loved us. How? *Christ's Love Compels Us!*

We just can't keep it to ourselves!

Christ's love is so compelling that we not only serve others in love, but we also share the message of His love. "And he has entrusted to us the message of reconciliation. ²⁰ "Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God is making an appeal through us."

Surprised? I am. Christ loves me, Christ loves you so much that He not only died and rose for us hopeless sinners to give us new life, but Christ now sends us out as His own ambassadors, daily.

Now to the world and even to us, this sounds as though we've lost our mind! Paul even made such an observation (v. 13). But when we consider our every sin, ugly, hateful and ungodly thought, word or action. Then we realize that in no way do we deserve His love . . . yet "God so loved the world that He gave His Son..." the truth is we are **COMPELLED** to share what we have received that they too may

Lutheran Haven Dedicates Newly Renovated Assisted Living Facility

Lutheran Haven dedicated "The Harbor" in late August to a crowd of more than 150 residents and friends who joined together along with their Board of Trustees in prayer and worship to dedicate their beautiful congregate care facility.

The Rev. John Elliott led the service and Lutheran Haven Trustee and SELC District President, The Rev. Waldemar Vinovskis, spoke of the history of this facility and remembered his attendance at its groundbreaking many years ago.

"The Harbor will be a place where care is given, His word is heard, His sacraments are distributed and celebrated, and His name glorified," he underscored. The vision of Lutheran Haven has been to gradually move toward an aging in place model of care by expanding their assisted living rooms and adding several new and expanded services. By renovating their former nursing home and expanding into additional assisted living spaces, they have been able to add numerous amenities giving them the capacity to further integrate their

expansive community.

"Our goal was to increase the use of these former spaces for the entire Lutheran Haven community so our residents can more easily interact with each other regardless of whether they are living independently or need the additional care of assisted living," offered Mary Ann McCunn, Development Coordinator for Lutheran Haven Foundation. "This significantly adds to the sense of community and has been the overarching vision for The Harbor."

According to McCunn, previously, it was not unusual that when an independent living resident moved to the Assisted Living Facility, they felt a little isolated from various community activities which were held in other buildings on campus. Now, several activities and services are more readily available by bringing them under one roof. This includes:

- Outpatient physical therapy
- Additional physician office spaces and exam rooms
- Larger chapel space for Sunday worship services

- A large multi-purpose room for various activities
- New and expanded dining space
- A pub and game room
- The relocation of our Pastoral Care Team
- Beauty Salon
- Respite rooms for when a resident is discharged from the hospital but needs a bit more care before returning home. Respite rooms can also be used for a caregiver who simply needs a break from the daily caregiving needs of a loved one.

The Lord designed us to live in community regardless of age. God created us to live life with others. For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. 1 Corinthians 12:20. Now, our community, in its entirety, can gather for worship, fellowship, and recreation, along with the expanded healthcare services this new renovation provides.

He responded by asking a question, "What is the real difference between a congregation that thrives and one that doesn't?" Paul and Jake started naming some things. Then Jake remembered a recent conversation with the pastor of a growing church in another state where his daughter attended. "Her pastor told me it came down to people loving Jesus and then loving other people. But I still think the answer is contemporary worship."

The Coaching Leader said, "It would seem like a good idea to offer something that would appeal to people's tastes. Kind of like good business — offer what the people want." Then he asked, "Yet what are people actually craving: contemporary worship or loving relationships?" They both replied, "Well, it's probably loving relationships."

"Of course. People today are often lonely and looking for significance. If you started a contemporary service you'd pour lots of time and effort

But more importantly, we assume that's what people want but sadly they aren't even looking! Sadder still, most wouldn't even know if you offered it,

and wouldn't care."

Then the coaching leader asked. "What was that neighborhood ministry you both were excited about?" Paul and Jake had previously mentioned a neighborhood tutoring and help center idea. There was nothing like that in South county. "If you put your time and effort behind that and invited your neighbors to participate — Christian or not they will be moved seeing Christ's love in you and through you."

Paul said, "Yeah and the

tutoring caring ministry would give us every reason to make friends with our neighbors, love them and be "little Christs" for them. It would be a great excuse to show them Jesus.'

Jake then said, "Right and if we work to involve them they will feel like they are doing something meaningful beyond themselves."

"Now that sounds like a real game changer! And it's exactly that kind of selfless love that set apart the early church in a hostile Roman empire" said the coaching leader. "And when they fall in love with you, they will fall in love with Jesus, and if they have no religious background, which most don't nowadays, they will likely be ok worshipping Jesus the way you do, contemporary or not." Jake then turned to Paul and said sheepishly. "Of course! The answer is loving people in Jesus' name."

Concordia University/Ann Arbor To Shut Down Majority of On-Campus Academic Programs After 2024-25

Nationwide, colleges and universities are facing unprecedented challenges. Demographic shifts resulting in fewer college-aged students, changing economic demands, and rising competition are impacting enrollments, especially in the Midwestern United States and most certainlyl among smaller private institutions like the Lutheran higher educational institutions like those in the Concordia University System (CUS).

Concordia University/Ann Arbor [CUAA] will transition a large number of its academic programs to online-only learning after the next school year in an effort to cut costs. The LCMS Ann Arbor university currently offers 53 on-campus academic programs. Only seven will be offered in the 2025-26 school year. On-campus classes and activities will remain on campus during the 2024-25 school year.

These pressures, combined with the return of high inflation, have created profound disruptions in the higher education marketplace, undermining the financial stability of many institutions. A \$9-million budget shortfall is anticipated at the Ann Arbor and Wisconsin campuses for the next year.

Concordia/Ann Arbor (CUAA) explored pathways for the campus to work toward autonomy within the CUS. A special task force with expert representation from across the Synod provided reports and recommendations from committees related to accreditation, financial, legal, and LCMS identity matters.

After an in-depth analysis of these reports, CUAA concluded that it did not have the resources to pursue autonomy from its larger affiliate at Concordia/Mequon, WI, but the plan was to keep the Ann Arbor campus open past June 2025. CUWAA's leadership has reaffirmed its commitment to continue Ann Arbor's academic programs and as many co-curricular activities as possible for the 2024-2025 academic year. After June 2025, Ann Arbor will continue to operate



with a carefully curated portfolio of academic programs.

Diagnostic medical sonography, nursing, radiology technology and rehabilitation science are the only on-campus undergraduate offerings remaining after next year, graduate programs in occupational therapy, physical therapy and physician assistant degrees also will be offered on campus. Seven programs, mainly focused on education-based degrees, will be offered online. All other programs will be cut completely, university officials said.

With regard to athletics, all intercollegiate sports that can be conducted with adequate roster sizes will continue throughout the 2024-25 academic year, including participation in any postseason competitions. From current reports, roster sizes for most sports appear to meet these requirements.

Following the 2024-25 academic year, all intercollegiate athletic programs on the Ann Arbor campus will be discontinued. CUAA students who have been receiving university athletic scholarships will continue to receive that level of institutional aid from the university — even once CUAA athletics concludes as long as they remain a full-time student pursuing their initial degree. Current and prospective students have the option to transfer to the CUW campus to participate in the sport to which they are committed. The amount of financial aid for fulltime students will not change.

"This has been a painful process for our entire Concordia family," states CUWAA President Dr. Erik Ankerberg. "While this isn't the outcome many people have hoped for, I rejoice that our Lutheran mission will continue in Ann Arbor. As our CUWAA family heals and finds a new path forward, I am grateful to each and every member of the Concordia community for their fervent prayers. For the sake of our students and in service to our Lord, we will embrace the opportunity to forge a new path forward."

Despite these changes, CUWAA says they will continue to: • prioritize their Lutheran missional

commitments;

provide current students with a pathway toward degree completion;
maintain a presence in Michigan and achieve a financially sustainable model;

• communicate clearly and consistently throughout the transition.

In a recent comment, CUWAA President Ankerberg stated, "Concordia University Wisconsin is doing all it can to maintain a physical presence in the Michigan District. We are prioritizing our missional commitments as part of the Concordia University System by seeking to serve as many LCMS students as possible and by rebuilding our church work programs to meet the needs of the church today and into the future.

"We are also promoting our strongest academic programs including health care and legacy liberal arts education — as means to encourage students to find other vocations through which they can serve their neighbors. Finally, the university is making these necessary changes so the Ann Arbor campus not only survives but is sustainable and successfully carrying out its work for generations to come."

This fosters a sense of purpose and fulfillment among the congregation, encouraging active participation and deeper spiritual growth. Moreover, focusing on kingdom possibilities encourages long-term planning and sustainability. Churches can adapt to changing needs and continue to make a significant impact in their communities over a period of time.

On the other hand, Churches that concentrate on potential liabilities prioritize risk management. They allocate resources to legal compliance,



insurance, and safeguarding against potential issues. This ensures stability and protects the church from unforeseen challenges.

Addressing potential liabilities can reduce stress for church leaders and members.

By proactively managing risks, the church creates a secure environment, fostering peace of mind. However, a strong focus on potential liabilities may limit innovation and growth.

Churches might miss opportunities to expand their ministries and reach new people, leading to stagnation. The most effective strategy involves *balancing kingdom possibilities with managing potential liabilities*. By addressing risks while pursuing visionary goals, churches can achieve sustainable growth and make a lasting impact.

While we must be mindful of the risks associated with our ministries, we are comforted by Jesus words: "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." [MATTHEW 6:33]

Parents of students who attend Zion's recently expanded school program will receive a copy in their monthly carline packets.

"In addition, new distribution outlets for *Zion Rejoices!* have been added by individual Zion members who accepted the challenge to share the Good News of Jesus," Simon continues, "New distribution sites include a book club, thrift shop, food pantry and medical offices. Funding by anonymous donors allow the 44-page booklet to be given away without cost."

"Each year these books become more popular and the number produced and distributed is always increasing," says Zion's Senior Pastor The Rev. Dr. Curtis Deterding. "This year we are printing 1,600 devotional books the largest number ever."

Content was written by 20 Zion members. The 2024 theme highlights Christian virtues as the "silver threads" that bring readers closer to the manger. Each daily devotion includes thoughts that link faith and life, a prayer, Scripture references and "bonus content." A

complete schedule of holiday worship services is offered on the back cover of the booklet.

Erick's grandparents were also role models for him — his grandfather was an LCMS pastor in the Tampa Bay, FL area and his grandmother an English teacher. As a result, Erick — along with his siblings — developed excellent speaking and vocabulary skills.

Erick attended Concordia/ Irvine, CA but transferred to California State University/San Bernardino primarily to keep his educational costs minimized. During his university years he considered a career in the military.

Distr<mark>ict</mark> Members Participate in Kenya Mission Trip

During this past August, 2024, several Florida-Georgia District members and two additional individuals participated in a mission trip to Point of Grace Academy (POGA) outside Kisumu, Kenya.

For 13 years, POGA has given a topnotch education to the students from all areas of Kenya. From its start in 2011 — with just 11 students — it had grown to more than 600 elementary students and more than 200 high school students. POGA provides for their spiritual growth with chapel services, as well as religious instruction during the week. This past year, POGA added a clinic to their campus, which services the student body as well as the surrounding community. This clinic currently sees approximtely 50 people weekly, providing standard medical care.

During the week-long trip, team members worked with the students and taught religious stories. They also helped in the medical clinic assisting the technicians and workers. Each morning began with a delicious breakfast before beginning the various activities of the day. The group received a Bible verse each day to contemplate as they went about their activities. The group met regularly for a delicious lunch and then began afternoon activities which included discussion with groups of students or playing some games.

Supper followed the afternoon activities with a devotion lead by Pastor Dennis Meeker, one of the founders of POGA. On Saturday the group hosted a supper for the students — helping serve the meal. The meal consisted of rice, chicken, chapati (flatbread), cabbage, and watermelon, along with a soda to drink. This meal helped the students and team to get to know one another.

On Sunday the group worshiped at the POGA chapel, with the FLGA District pastors helping in the service. Pastor Jeff Moore preached on John 6 and Pastor Tim Brown lead the liturgy. The children sang beautifully during this service.

On Monday, the group handed out dresses and shorts sewn by the FLGA and Michigan District LWML to the girls and boys of POGA. They also sorted through the donated supplies for the classrooms and the pharmacy — including supplies, clothing items, Bibles and catechisms that had been in checked luggage — 32 bags in total.

District's Early Response Team '

Florida-Georgia Lutheran Early Response (FGLER), has been awarded a \$10,000 National Disaster Response Grant from The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod. The grant has been awarded as part of the Synod's effort to equip disaster response organizations so they can assist in the church's response to serve others in the wake of disasters. FGLER will utilize the grant as matching funds to purchase equipment and an enclosed trailer that will enable volunteers to conduct disaster cleanup.

As a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS, Florida-Georgia Lutheran Early Response serves and assist pastors, congregations, the Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod (LCMS), and their communities throughout the District area and beyond by providing training in disaster preparedness and response, disaster and emergency readiness planning, and management of disaster events for churches and LCMS Districts.

In the early morning hours of Sunday, May 26, tornado sirens sounded in Benton County, Arkansas. It wasn't the first time they had sounded, as tornados had struck nearby in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Nebraska, Missouri, Iowa, and Kentucky several times over the previous week.

One of the hardest hit areas was the Rogers and Bentonville area of northwest Arkansas. The National Weather Service reports that at including an EF3 (the largest ever recorded in Arkansas) — touched down. An F3 tornado has winds estimated between 162-209 mph. Homes, businesses, buildings, and trees were destroyed; sadly eight people died. Within hours, the Mid-South District of The LCMS. coordinating with the five LCMS congregations in the area, quickly geared up for a response from LCMS Disaster Response's Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT) volunteers to come in to assist with recovery efforts.

Mid-South District Disaster Response Coordinator (DDRC) Janet Simko arrived and set up operations at Holy Trinity/Rogers, AR. The church opened its doors to house and feed the LERT volunteers. Members of the church brought in an abundance of food and drinks, and prepared breakfast and dinner, for them for the five weeks of operations.

DDRC Simko began the heartrending task of damage assessment, meeting with church members and their neighbors who had sustained damage during the storm. She conducted assessments of the damage to determine if the LERT volunteers could help, primarily in clearing tree debris. More importantly, she listened to their stories, letting them share their experiences of the storm and the stresses of trying to recover.

In the five weeks of operation, a total of 50 LERT volunteers from nine different states assisted 35 homeowners, and removed 315 trees from their properties. These trained LERT volunteers brought equipment, including chainsaws, aerial lifts, tractors and skid steers.

FLGA Responds

Directors Joel Mathews, wife Kathy, and Director Jim Rice, traveled to Rogers from Florida with one of FGLER's two skid steers.

When Mathews arrived on June 12, there were two other volunteers who had been working for three days manually dragging tree debris to the curb. One of those volunteers, Ricky Gross, said that "More tree debris was moved [by the Bobcat MT100] on their first day then they had moved in three days!" Needless to say, they were overjoyed with the arrival of this equipment!

Both Rice and Mathews are trained LERT chainsaw operators, taking turns between cutting and skillfully operating the MT100 on the often-challenging Arkansas hillsides. During their stay, they were joined by volunteers from Kentucky, Wisconsin,

Illinois, and Missouri, clearing tons of tree debris.

Mathews shared the story of one job they worked: "Pappa John,' 79, with tears in his eyes, related how he and his family had heard the storm come through, and then the crashing of trees around their home. When they emerged from their home, they discovered more than a dozen trees had come down or were broken in their yard, yet their house was untouched. After finishing the work we preparing to leave when Papa John shared with us: 'God was watching over us then, and now he brought you here. There is no way I could have been able to do in months what you guys did in two days!""

Serving Christ through serving others! At another location, while the

At another location, while the LERT volunteers were removing a large damaged oak tree from a back yard, Katherine, a neighbor, hesitantly stopped and asked Mathews if the LERT volunteers would be able to help her. She had two large oak trees come down, and two other large trees were damaged. A tree company had charged her \$8,000 to remove the two oaks and cleanup the broken limbs on one tree. The company left ten feet of trunk attached to the large, downed trees and butchered the other tree. The LERT team took care of the trunks and tree in the back yard for



her — without charge.

The stories from survivors abounded. More than a month after the storm, the tears and quaking voices still came as they shared with LERT volunteers. Many related how God was watching over them and brought them through the storm. It was an opportunity to pray with them, hug them, and ultimately demonstrate the love of Jesus Christ through LERT disaster response. The hospitality shown by members of Holy Trinity was unbelievable! They frequently expressed heart-felt thanks to the LERT volunteers for their work.

Partnering with the Florida-Georgia District, FGLER is a volunteer-based nonprofit that provides disaster response training and some equipment for volunteers, and helps churches coordinate disaster responses. EPHESIANS 6:13— Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand.



District Icon and Campus Theologian Pastor Erich Heintzen Carried Home to Jesus



The Rev. Dr. Erich Heintzen III (Emeritus) passed away on August 1, 2024 following a massive stroke.

Heintzen graduated Concordia Theological Seminary/Springfield, IL in 1961 and served his first parish in Dickinson, ND. The next 20 years were dedicated to campus ministries at University of North Dakota, University of Denver, Colorado Women's College, and Florida State University. Heintzen's passion for campus ministry can be attributed to his father. In 1941 Heintzen's father began 17 years of service as the first full-time pastor of University Lutheran Chapel at the University of Illinois. In 1958 he left to teach Church History at the Springield LCMS Seminary and rose to the rank of Full Professor serving the Seminary as a member and chairman of multiple committees.

Campus ministry has a long history in the LCMS that dates back to September 1920. The work in Champaign began in 1941, when Heintzen's father was student pastor. Heintzen purchased a house on the corner lot where the church is currently located. For the first decade, students met in the campus Episcopal church. With the increase of students following World War II, the present church building was built in 1951 and dedicated in 1953. A student center was added to the church in the 1960s. Schuermann now serves this congregation as its sixth called pastor.

The FLGA District's Pastor Heintzen served at Our Savior/ St. Petersburg, FL, from 1980-2000. After his retirement, he continued to serve at Our Savior as Pastor Emeritus, teaching Bible studies and visiting homebound members. Heintzen had a tremendous spiritual impact on many in the Our Savior congregation and beyond.

Pastor Heintzen served as a voting pastoral delegate to the 60th Regular Convention of the LCMS in July, 1998 held in St. Louis, MO.

He was active in numerous leadership roles in the FLGA District. After his retirement in 2000, he continued as Minister of Senior Adults and in other teaching and supportive



capacities. He leaves behind a Gospel-centered ministry filled with care, compassion and sharing of God's living love to those whose lives he touched.

He was a great pastor, father, husband, friend and mentor. He is survived by his wife of 65 years, Barbara, and sons Paul and Erich IV, and grandchildren. He is preceded in death by son Mark. His spirit will live on forever in the memories we cherish and the love we shared. A memorial service was held on August 17th at Our Savior/Saint Petersburg, FL.



Jerrold Collins



Rev. Stephen P. Starke has always had a heart for hymns. At a young age, Starke played hymns out of The Lutheran Hymnal and read


through the hymnal to pass the time before Sunday services.

Thrive Community Lending Provides Microloan For Ukraine Eatery in Georgia

A Ukraine-based eatery has opened its first U.S. location in Roswell, GA. Lviv Croissants is a chain founded in the city of Lviv, Ukraine that has expanded to 189 stores across Ukraine, Poland and Slovakia.

Ukraine native, Pastor Petro Dudnyk, serves as the franchisee for the Georgia location. Dudnyk, also co-owns a Lviv location in Kramatorsk, Ukraine. He came to the U.S. in 2022 for his son's wedding and remained after war broke out in the country. He funded his portion of the U.S. location through Thrive Community Lending, which provides microloans for refugees and immigrants.

The Lviv eatery has been popular for 37 years, offering quality food, coffee and ambience. The menu for the Roswell facility will be similar to European locations. Savory sandwiches on the American menu include the pastrami croissant; the Lviv croissant with salami, ham, Swiss cheese, lettuce, cucumber, tomato and garlic sauce; roasted pepper chicken; Italian charcuterie with salami, prosciutto and capicola; and a turkey avocado BLT

Sweet croissant offerings include a strawberry and mascarpone croissant and an option filled with pistachio cream, while savory breakfast croissants include one filled with cabanossi sausage, Swiss cheese, egg and Sriracha aioli and another with lox and cream cheese

Mid day menu items include a handful of salads, soups and sides, as well as an extensive beverage list with espresso drinks, teas, lemonades and smoothies.

In addition to bringing a flavor of his home country to the U.S., Dudnyk also hopes to bring awareness to events unfolding there. The beverage cups will feature a QR code enabling guests to get information on United for Ukrainian (U4U) Kids, a program that Dudnyk and his wife started to connect orphans from Ukraine to host families in America for one month. Last year, they connected 100 kids — many of whom lost a parent to the war— with host families in the U.S.

Largo Congregation Operating Successful Food Bank

Stop by **Christ The King/ Largo, FL** on any Saturday morning at about 10 AM and you will find Pastor Joe Adams visiting with a number of people outside their Christian Ministry Center. (CMC) They are talking about current events and whatever other subjects come up as they are together.

They are building community.

What you cannot see is that inside the CMC are a number of volunteers — 25 on any given week — attending to the ministry of unpacking and sorting fresh fruits, vegetables, non-perishable food items, breads, and meats in preparation for the opening of the Christ the King Food Bank at 1:00 PM. About 15 minutes prior to opening, registration begins, numbers are assigned, and the doors open for the clients to begin coming in to 'shop' for food.

Those being served come from Largo, Seminole, Clearwater and all around Pinellas County. There is also a foreign contingent from places like Cuba, Brazil, South Africa, Portugal, Bosnia, and Ukraine. Some of the most recent arrivals are not yet proficient in English but understand and appreciate the assistance offered by this group of dedicated saints.

C. J. has captured the heart of Pastor Adams. He describes this ministry as, "we build community, in the community while the people are waiting in line." That is one of the reasons Adams comes early — he meets and greets those in line and spends time in fellowship and prayer for and with those in need.

Future plans at Christ The King may include an occasional sitdown meal in the mibistry center. This ministry began about four years ago when the congregation's administrative assistant, Pauline Pereira, began giving away bags of food to those in need who came to the office. The need became so great that the ministry transitioned from an occasional bag of food from the office to become the Christ the King Food Bank. Pauline knows that witness to Christ is important, so they do much of it through the signage around the hall. Those signs include scripture passages and sentiments such as. "This is what God has given us, so this is what we have to give to you."

The food bank feeds approximately 175-200 families each week with the kind assistance of stores like Publix, Walmart, Aldi, and



The LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs are a bridge for compassionate ministry, opening doors for conversation about faith and creating opportunities to share the mercy, compassion, presence and proclamation of Jesus Christ.

And they're on the ground in Winder, Georgia just 72 hours after the tragic school shooting at Apalachee High School on Wednesday, September 4th. Winder is about 50 miles northeast of Atlanta. **Trinity/Athens, GA** and Pastor Tim Davis are serving as the host congregation for our Comfort Dogs

Two 14-year-old students and two teachers were killed in the school shooting. Nine other people — eight students and one teacher — were wounded and hospitalized, all of whom are expected to survive.

The suspect, Colt Gray, 14, a student at the school, and his father were questioned by law enforcement last year regarding "anonymous tips about online threats to commit a school shooting," according to FBI Atlanta and the Jackson County Sheriff's Office. At that time, there was no probable cause for arrest. The shooting is at least the 45th school shooting in 2024 and the deadliest this year, according to news reports.

Colt surrendered immediately after a school resource officer rushed in and confronted him — just minutes after the first shots were fired around 10:20 a.m.

Two days later, on Friday, he was charged with four counts of murder. The suspect's father, Colin Gray, 54, was arrested on four counts of involuntary manslaughter, two counts of second-degree murder and eight counts of cruelty to children. Colin gave his son an AR-15 style rifle as a gift, two law enforcement sources said. It's unclear when he gave the gift, but it was after authorities interviewed the father and son last year in connection with threats to Lutheran Life Florida-Georgia District Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod 5850 T. carry out a school shooting. Colt was a new student at Apalachee High, having only been there for a partial day. The day of the shooting was his first full day at the school — so it's unlikely he even knew his victims.

At a Friday hearing, Judge Currie Mingledorff told Colt Gray that if convicted he could be executed. The judge later had to call the teenager back into his courtroom to correct himself: The maximum penalty for a minor is life in prison



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without the possibility of parole, under a landmark 2005 Supreme Court decision acknowledging that developing brain science shows adolescents lack maturity and should not be put to death for a crime — however horrendous — they committed before adulthood.

Nine Comfort Dogs headed to Winder. Four FLGA Comfort Dogs: — Moriah, St. Luke's/Oviedo, FL; Jemimah, St. Paul/Boca Raton, FL; Peace, Trinity/Orlando, FL; Hope, Faith/Marietta, GA; — joined five other canines from North and South Carolina, Tennessee and as far away as Nebraska. We grieve deeply for this devastating loss due to a senseless act of violence. Let us hold in our prayers the students, faculty, parents

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and family members and the Winder community traumatized by this act. And may we also pray with our actions, as individuals and as a society, to take the necessary albeit difficult steps to end gun violence through principled personal decisions and public policy.

Let us also keep LCC Comfort Dogs in our prayers as they interact with the Winder community suffering and in need. These gifted canines, deployed in times of disaster and crisis, will most certainly bring comfort to all those affected, including the first responders and the volunteers who serve them.
