

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



Whether it's holiday music and Christmas carols, the seemingly never-ending din of commercials trying to entice you to buy some product, or the sounds of family and friends gathered together to celebrate, the holiday season is upon us.

When these things come, it seems that all our attention turns to that circumstance and when that happens, it's hard to hear...the sound of God.

However, as I write this devotion, I am sitting in my office at home reflecting upon the past week and the sounds that came with Hurricane Milton and before that, Helene. Those sounds began like the wonderful sound of rain falling and a breeze blowing through the trees. Yet that changed as the storm grew and approached and the sounds turned to a howling wind, eaves rattling, rain hammering the windows and the cracking of branches and trees coming down. When the storm had passed, the sounds changed again. This time it was the hum of generators across the neighborhood, chainsaws and for some, the sighs of people

Some of my favorite sounds are waves along the beach, a fish slamming my lure as I reel in my line and the laughter of our family gathered together. I'm sure you have your own favorite sounds, and they changes how you respond to the rest of the world."

I'd suggest you read that quote again. "Everything you hear has an impact on you" and me! In our world today, the sounds we hear are



the laughter of family gathered together

mostly loud, angry and lack hope. They are anything but comforting. Instead, they are depressing, exhausting, discouraging and even scary. read the Bible daily and more than half of Americans have read little or none of the Bible. We are being influenced, even discipled, sadly, by the sounds of the world. pretty great explanation.

In this very noisy and dark world, let us commit to paying attention to the sounds of God—in His Word, in worship, through

Research estimates the percentage of negative news to positive news is about 9 to 1. When you consider that "everything we hear has some impact on us," this research should cause us to pause because if this is true, that 90 percent of news is negative, then this is changing how we see and respond to the world. It changes our outlook and attitude. When our auditory senses are pounded by this kind of noise, it impacts the rest of our lives. Short tempers, quick to anger, no patience and even fear and hopelessness can begin to filter into our lives.

Becoming aware of this and how serious it is, should cause us to find out how we can listen for other sounds in the midst of all the noise. I remember once using a four-letter curse word around my mom. Not only was I quickly set straight, but she said, "If you hang out with people with potty mouths, you're going to have one too!" Her wisdom applies also to the impact of the sounds we hear. Therefore, as disciples, Christ-followers, we should consider what sounds we are letting in. Maybe we should pay less attention to the sounds and noise of the world and more attention to the sounds of God.

Our God and Creator loves to speak to His children. He loves for His children to come and listen to Him. Yet research indicates that less than 11 percent of Americans

Growing Tomorrow's Leaders —— High School Leadership Event

Forty-two high school students from 16 congregations across the Florida-Georgia District gathered for a transformative weekend at Lake Yale Conference Center, November 1-3, for the annual Youth Ministry Leadership Event. Focused on developing the next generation of leaders, the weekend offered students a chance to grow in their understanding of leadership through biblical teachings and practical applications.

The theme of the event centered on the story of Nehemiah, exploring how God called him for a specific purpose. Students learned about five key leadership approaches:

- Prayer and Planning
- Setting Goals
- Building a Team
- Developing Strategies
- Staying Focused and Fresh

The larger group was divided into two teams: 25 freshmen and sophomores, and 17 juniors and seniors. Each group participated in sessions designed to meet their developmental stage and leadership needs. One group, led by DCE Dave Timmerman (Grace/Jacksonville, FL) and Rev. Pete LeBorious (Mount Calvary/Warner Robins, GA), explored biblical and strategic leadership. They delved into what it means to lead from a Christian perspective.

Meanwhile, DCE's Nick Moss (St. Paul/Lakeland, FL) and Lori Schwan (St. Michael/Fort Myers, FL) led the other group in discovering the various components of leadership. Through

small group challenges and personal inventories, they identified tasks that bring joy and energy versus those that may lead to burnout and frustration.

This practical exercise helped students gain a deeper understanding of their own leadership styles and preferences. The weekend also featured three young adult leaders —Andrew Cheyne (St. Paul/ Lakeland), Jonas Mark (Grace/Jacksonville), and Janet Oliver (St. Michael/ Fort Myers) — who shared their experiences of faith and leadership with the students, providing inspiration and mentoring for the next generation. In addition to the leadership sessions, the weekend

More than 440 middle school students and adults gathered at the Lake Yale Conference Center from November 1-3, 2024, for the *Middle School Youth Gathering*, part of the FLGA District Youth Ministry Weekend. This year's event, centered around the theme "Pressure," was an unforgettable experience that encouraged youth to explore the burdens they face and how they can find rest in Christ.

The theme was inspired by Matthew 11:28: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

The weekend kicked off on Friday evening with a Mass Event featuring Cassie Moore as the keynote speaker and Tribe and Tongue as the Gathering band. The night began with

It was a powerful visual metaphor for the pressures we all face in life. Saturday was packed with activities that encouraged both spiritual growth and fun. The day began with breakfast and a Bible study before moving into the morning Mass Event.

Wesley Wright and Peyton Popp led the group in fun, interactive games, followed by music and another inspiring message from Cassie. During this time, youth were asked to reflect on their own pressures and write them down on the boxes that had been used during the Friday night challenge.

The afternoon included engaging breakout sessions on topics like "Creating Diamonds vs Bursting Pipes," "Failing Pressure," and "Pressure and Pop Culture." Each session provided practical and spiritual insights on how to handle life's challenges. Afterward, students had some free time to burn off energy with games like volleyball, kickball, trivia, and even sno-cones sponsored by LCMS Youth Ministry. The evening Mass Event once again brought the group together for a powerful time of worship and learning.

Tribe and Tongue led a spirited praise session, and the room was filled with joyful music. In a meaningful moment, the pressure-filled boxes from earlier in the weekend that had been flattened and reassembled into the shape of a cross. This powerful image reminded everyone that, just as Jesus carried our burdens on the cross, we can give our pressures to Him.

Sunday morning provided time for

packing up and a final worship service before the journey home. Rev. Cris Escher, Grace/Port St. Lucie, FL delivered a sermon that encouraged attendees to remember that Jesus is always there to help carry our burdens, providing lasting relief from the pressures of life.

The 2024 Middle School Youth Gathering was a

weekend full of fun, faith, and fellowship. It was a powerful reminder that, no matter how heavy the pressure may feel, Jesus offers us rest and the strength to face any challenge that comes our way.

Meet the Vicar

Jacob Anderson Serving Mount Calvary/Warner Robins, GA

When Jacob was young, he would play in his dad's church office. "At that time, there were just two computers: one my dad used for his studies and an old clunky one that could only run Solitaire. I joked that one day I would have an office as a pastor with the new computer while my dad would get the old one. This joke stuck with me and sometimes haunted me as I felt the expectations of being a pastor. As I grew older, I wanted to do anything but go into ministry — I considered driving a semi truck, joining the military, working with horses,

> becoming an auctioneer," he continued. "I didn't even really want to go to college, but that's what kids my age all seemed to do.

entering the medical field, or

"To my surprise, I was accepted, and I remember staring at the computer scrolling through the list of majors, the only one I really recognized was Theology — so, I clicked it. Praise the Lord that I did, as those classes helped shape my path to the seminary.

All of this to say, I didn't feel the calling until I was living in Tennessee over a summer, working at Federal Express.

I was offered a position on a ranch where I had worked in Iowa, but the condition was that I had to quit school and start immediately. I was crushed! I thought becoming a pastor was what God wanted

me to do, but this job offered everything — money, a truck, a house, and opportunities to grow in the horse business. I asked for a day to think it over. That evening, my manager at FedEx noticed something was wrong and asked me about it. I explained my situation, and he shared his backstory: he was a recovering drug addict and alcoholic, angry at God and the world. His anger had ruined his relationships, including those with his parents and loved ones. My manager told me that he wouldn't talk to God about anyone until a kid from Iowa started working in his warehouse. Week after week, our conversations centered around Christ. He went on to explain that during his years at FedEx, no one could work with a particular older lady who hated her life, but she asked for me. He looked me in the eyes and said, Jacob, what I'm trying to say is that you have a gift with people. Don't waste that gift on horses.' Once he said that, I made the phone call. From that point on, I stopped fighting God and said, 'Okay, God, I'm here. I feel your call. I'm yours; wherever you want me, I will go."

Jacob had a number of role models who played a major part in his life. He states that his biggest influence has to be his parents. Their love for each other, their love for God and witnessing their missional heart.

When Vicar Jacob isn't working he enoys motorcycles, fishing, and hunting.

Jacob Anderson was born in Warsaw, Poland, however, after God closed the window of overseas missions for his parents, his family settled in a small town called Ocheyedan, Iowa, where his dad served two congregations. "This is where I spent most of my childhood, hunting, fishing, and as much time outdoors as I could until my parents decided to retire and move to Florida," Anderson said. "I questioned the move, but once I discovered deep-sea fishing, I embraced the Florida life while still spending summers on my brother's farm in Iowa."

Jacob attended Concordia University/Seward, Nebraska, where he majored in Theology and Pre-Seminary studies.

"I am the youngest of ten siblings — having seven brothers and two sisters! My father is an LCMS pastor, and my mom was a nurse. When God called them to Nigeria, she became a stay-at-home mom, teaching and raising all of us."

What Does Your Congregations Policy Say About ...

Has this ever happened to your ministry? Someone calls the church asking to rent space for a special event. Your church approves it and then you learn that the meeting was of such a nature that had you known in advance, you would not have allowed the space to be used by the applicant? Or how about this, you hire someone and shortly after he/she begins posting things on their social media feeds that are, shall we say, not flattering to the ministry and in fact, the posting flies in the face of what we teach, confess, and believe.

Or how about this, a member of the congregation asks the Pastor to perform the marriage ceremony for her daughter. Of course, Pastor advises that the mother that the bride and groom must undergo counseling with him. When the happy couple arrives at their first counseling session, Pastor meets Carol and

Brenda-the wedding couple.

If you called me about one of these issues or, for that matter, any potential legal issue involving your congregation or school, you no doubt heard me ask . . . What does your Statement of Faith and Facility Use Policies say? OR, What does your Social

Media Policy say? OR, What does your Marriage Policy say?

The question is not intended to embarrass but rather to identify what effective "legal" response would be

appropriate for your ministry in that situation. These policies are important "secular" legal documents that help your legal team protect your ministry. The Lutheran Legal Legue has worked with several congregations throughout the country to assist them with their

various policies. To be sure, no one policy fits every ministry. Nevertheless, your ministry should be establishing ALL the policies that could lead to better protection for the Ministry. Don't delay developing policies for your ministry. Your District Office and Lutheran Legal League want to

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Fall Pastors Conference Explores Discipleship

District clergy, wives, deaconesses and vicars gathered in Daytona Beach, FL for the 2024 Pastors Conference September 23 through 25, 2024.

Keynoter, The Rev. Dr. Scott Rische, International Director of Pastoral Leadership Institute (PLI),led the conference through "The Why and Ways of Discipleship" — creating communities that foster a discipleship that leads to Christ-likeness and the making of other new disciples.

"It's always about a deeper relationship with the Father through Christ and His Spirit, and a brighter reflection of Christ to the others in our lives," he emphasized. "You cannot disciple without teaching, but you can teach without discipling."

Rische explored discipling within a community. In small groups or gatherings of people we are able to spend time together, build trust, hear God's truth (the Word), tell the truth (transparency) and provide encouragement and help that can lead to transformation. "It's about helping each other to seek Christ and follow and obey Him in order that we may become more and more like Him."

Rische used Acts 2:42-47 as an example of how there were both large and small gatherings. He encouraged the pastors to explore "another wing" of congregations — smaller groups where people can help each other grow in their relationships with God.

Throughout the conference Rishe challenged the participants to ask questions in their congregations, help people make time and develop formats for smaller gatherings to not only follow Jesus, but to fish for men in making disciples.

The Rev. Dr. Bob Newton former LCMS District President for California/Nevada/ Hawaii, underscored that "God is first and foremost a missionary God!" From the moment of the call, God became the Missionary seeker of the world. He emphasized from Genesis to Revelation God's word is a missionary story.

"The Old Testament portion of the story told us how our heavenly Father began again and again several times over. Each major restart was in partnership with His children, sinful human beings," Newton said. "The New Testament portion of the story tells us how our heavenly Father begins one final time." Newton used GPS as an illustration — with "repent" being replaced with "recalculating, the Kingdom of God is at hand."

Like a GPS, God views our lives from a vantage point far outside our limited worldview. He sets the coordinates of our journey — discipling our naitons — at our baptism. He is able and desirous to complete that journey with us. "I am the way; follow me!

Since 2015 the FLGA District gives the Barnabas Son of Encouragement Award to recognize outstanding pastoral ministry within a Lutheran school. It celebrates an Alongsider partnership between a pastor and a school. It celebrates an Along-Sider partnership between a pastor and school and is presented to a Pastor at the Educators Conference on behalf of the District's educators. This award highlights the work of pastors who faithfully encourage and support their school community.

This year's award was given to The Rev. Michael Popp, pastor of Grace/Jacksonville, FL Lutheran church and school. Pastor Michael was born and raised in Freeport, IL, attending Concordia College/ Seward, NE, receiving his degree in Elementary Education in 1998. After teaching middle school for two years in Columbus, NE and five years in Davenport, IA, he was called to help start the middle school and the athletic ministry at Grace/Jacksonville in 2005. In 2015, he answered the call to enroll in the Specific Ministry Pastor (SMP) program through Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO to be the Associate Pastor of Grace. In addition to his duties at Grace, Pastor Popp is the Director of Athletic Ministries for the FLGA District, the President of the Jacksonville Christian Athletic League, and a board member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Michael was married in 1998 to Grace's 3rd grade teacher, Jessa, and they have two boys, Peyton (Grace Graduate '15) & Addison (Grace Graduate '16). Pastor Michael loves coaching basketball and watching the Chicago Cubs, Bears, Bulls, and Blackhawks.

"Michael Popp is truly the bridge between school and church ministries," offered FLGA Executive Director for Schools and Youth Ministry. "You walk with us and encourage us every step of the way,

meet with us one-on-one — all while remaining tireless, humble. You

cannot think of Grace/Jacksonville's congregation and school without thinking of Michael Popp. Relationships extend beyond graduation —you continue to be involved in marriages, baptisms, counseling, and funerals. You are the spiritual foundation of the faculty.

"Through difficult transitions, Pastor Popp has been a constant. He's never lost hope. He's never lost faith. He relied on Proverbs 3:5 and chose to 'Trust in the Lord with all his heart' — a man who walks with grace and always points to Jesus. Pastor Michael Popp is truly a Son of Encouragement," Tanner emphasized.

"For years I have watched people get awards and thank everyone else on their team, crew, or group for making it possible. Sports, music, movies — it doesn't matter. And now I know why. They may award an individual, but I think it's very telling that the one year I have to rely on everyone else to survive, I am honored like this," exclaims Michael Popp.

"Let me explain. In January of 2023, we lost our principal at Grace/ Jacksonville and I was asked to step in as the 'Temporary School Administrator' while we explored options. Having taught for more than 20 years and going through SLeD In 2012, I felt somewhat qualified.

"In July our Senior Pastor took a call and I was now Sole Pastor and the TSA. And just to make this a good story 14 months later, our church secretary of 20 years retired and our school board chair was stepping down. And that is when God taught me through perseverance and humility how to delegate. Everyone stepped up. Both the retired pastors at Grace, Pastor Rick and Pastor Pete, started preaching again to keep me at 50 percent.

"The ladies in the office all stepped up. Former Ben Eggars Award Winner Dave Leimer became our Vice Principal and took on a lot more. His wife Ann, our organist and director of Music took over music completely. All of our teachers took on more in terms of discipline, planning, accreditation, paperwork — and we had a new PE teacher and Athletic Director who would normally have the principal for support with any parent issues, but not when it's your dad.

"But no one took on more extra work and felt the burden more than my wife. I heard her say from time to time it felt like she had no pastor or principal, and I understood completely, but could do little to help. She was on an island. The pastor's wife can be a lonely position, but the principal's wife on staff is tougher. And she was both. But praise be to God we got through it. And the blessing of it all is lots of people found new gifts. More people took ownership of our ministry. And now God has blessed us with the Timmerman's, not only giving us a wonderful principal, but a new partner in the church office who has been a blessing and is helping me look at the ministry at Grace in new ways with a passion for people like I have. I really want to thank the Grace church and school leadership and the entire congregation for their support.

"I have three more people I need to thank — even though they are no longer at Grace, their support of me over the years was huge AND I bugged them a lot last year. First I want to thank Pastor Jeff Skopak. When I went through SLeD and had four calls to be a principal and just didn't feel like the Lord was leading me in that direction, he called me into his office. He had only been at Grace less than a year, but said he's been watching me and had an idea to run by me. He said I seem to like talking about Jesus more than Math or Science and there is this SMP program to Ordination and he would like my specific ministry to be the pastor to the school.

"It was a wild concept! I'm grateful for his support and vision for me.

"Next I want to thank my former principal, and another Ben Eggars award winner, Rod Jackson," Popp continued. "I remember going to his office and sharing what Pastor Jeff asked me to consider with SMP and wanted his thoughts. And he said something like, 'well that makes a whole lot more sense than principal if you ask me.' I wasn't sure if I should be hurt or affirmed. He's the best and I still love him, even though he left us for St. Luke's.

"And finally I have to thank our Empress of Education, Jennifer Tanner. Having worked together since 2006 as teaching partners, her opinion meant a lot. And when we taught junior high, we would have lunch together everyday. So I asked Jennifer if she thought Grace would ever see me as a pastor after all these years as the crazy middle school teacher and athletic director. She said 'I think they already do!"

"It was a pivotal moment for sure. And thank you for allowing me to bug you all last year. She might be more thankful for Sonya than the staff. And a little insight for all of you... Jennifer loves it when you surround her and lay hands on her while you pray for her. Thank you everyone for your support and a special thank you to all of you that nominated me. To God be the glory."

"Doc Foelber," Former Ann Arbor Maestro and Fine Arts Chair, Called Home

The Rev. Dr. Paul "Doc" Foelber, 98, was called to his heavenly home on October 1, 2024. Foelber served at Concordia/Ann Arbor, MI as both the Fine Arts Department Chairperson and Choral Director from the college's inception to 1990.

As a founding faculty member of Concordia/Ann Arbor who served the institution for nearly 30 years, Doc Foelber's impact was felt by decades of alumni. A memorial service and reception will be held on February 8, 2025, at St. Luke's/Oviedo, Florida. Memorials may be contributed to Trinity HOPE, a charity that provides food to thousands of hungry children attending Christian schools in Haiti. Their website is trinityhope.org/

Dr. Foelber, the youngest of five children, was born in Fort Wayne, IN to Esther and Elmer Foelber. From an early age, he loved music, sports, and fishing. He studied piano, organ, viola and voice; he also played baseball and tennis.


Paul attended Concordia Junior College in Fort Wayne, and then Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO. While at the seminary, he played shortstop on the baseball team, captained the tennis team, sang in The Bach Choir of St. Louis, and sat first chair in the viola section of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. With encouragement from the director of the symphony, Paul took a one-year leave of absence from the seminary to accept a scholarship at Northwestern University School of Music and earned a Masters in Instrumental Music. He then returned to the seminary and completed his Doctor of Divinity degree.

Upon graduation from Concordia Seminary, Paul married Dorothea Gerken. They moved to Seward, Nebraska, where Paul taught at Concordia University there for two years. Paul then accepted a call to start a church, St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, in Silver Spring, Maryland, where he grew a congregation from eight members to more than 400 members in approximately four years and completed his coursework for a Ph.D.in Sacred Music at Catholic University/Washington D.C. He then accepted a position to chair the music department at St. John's College/ Winfield, KS, and completed his Ph.D while teaching and coaching.

In 1963, Dr. Foelber accepted the offer to chair the Fine Arts Department of Concordia/Ann Arbor, Michigan, where he taught courses in music and humanities. He also coached the tennis team. Dr. Foelber directed the Concordia College Choir and toured with them throughout the United States and in Europe.

During his time in Ann Arbor, Paul also directed the Ann Arbor Cantata Singers and served on both the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Commission of Worship and the Inter-Lutheran Commission of Worship. He was frequently invited to minister to Lutheran churches throughout the Michigan District. He enjoyed preaching — and fishing — in many of Michigan's enclaves from Walled Lake to Alpena.

In 1991, Dr. Foelber accepted a position as pastor of Our Savior/ Heartland, MI, where he served for three years. He and Dorothea then moved to Lutheran Haven/Oviedo, FL. During his time there he has



served as pastoral assistant or interim pastor at several LCMS congregations in Florida for more than 20 years. He also created and directed the Lutheran Cantata Choir. Ever aware of the needs of others, Paul and Dorothea organized a communitywide volunteer visitation system so Lutheran Haven Assisted Living and Lutheran Haven Nursing Home residents would be visited once a week, and they oversaw that visiting program during the time they lived in Florida. In February, 2024, Paul and Dorothea moved from Florida to the Goodwin House, a retirement community in Falls Church, VA to be closer to family. Dorothea and their children were at Paul's bedside at the Goodwin House on the day he peacefully went to heaven.

Jesus Calls Pastor Bob Strickert Home

The Rev. Robert H. Strickert went home to be with the Lord on September 27, 2024, under the care of Ogeechee Area Hospice in Statesboro, Georgia. Pastor Strickert was 93.

The youngest of seven children, he was born in Jackson, Missouri, on September 18, 1931, and was baptized two weeks later. His father and three brothers were Lutheran pastors, and his sister married a pastor.


At his confirmation at age 13, Bob also decided to become a pastor and eventually attended St. Paul's College, Concordia, Missouri, where he served as yearbook editor and student body president. Later he attended Concordia Seminary/St. Louis, MO. While there, he served as a resident counselor and earned degrees of master of divinity and master of sacred theology.

Bob met his wife, Eunice, at St. Stephen's/St. Louis, MO. They were married in 1956. God blessed their marriage with three children, the youngest of whom, Mark, preceded them in death in 2014. Bob and Eunice remained deeply devoted to each other until she died in 2015. She supported him in his ministry, and they enjoyed traveling, the beach and various places in North America and Europe. Left to mourn Bob's death and to celebrate his victory in Christ are his son, Kevin and his wife, Anne; his daughter, Carla Branch and her husband, Gary. He is also survived by seven grandchildren.

Bob spent his entire ministry in Florida and Georgia. His first call was to begin a new mission congregation at Hope/Bradenton, FL, where he served for 15 years. He then became pastor at Rivercliff/Sandy Springs, GA, where he remained until retirement 25 years later. After retirement, he also responded to the call to be part-time interim pastor at congregations in Cumming, Marietta and Dahlonega — all in Georgia.

Bob's service in the Florida-Georgia District included nine years as the district vice president, 16 years as circuit visitor, pastoral counselor for the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, 30 years on the board of Lutheran Services of Georgia, synodical reconciler and Consecrated Stewards facilitator.

In 2000, the District Convention recognized him with the "Servant of



Christ" award. In 2022, he moved to Statesboro, Georgia, to be closer to his family. His friends, family and parishioners will remember him as funny, gentle, humble, wise, compassionate and selfless. A memorial service was held October 1, at Rivercliff/Sandy Springs, FL. Pastor, Author, Actor, Singer, Chaplain, Don Roberts, Passes

The Rev. Donald Stephen Roberts, 78, departed this life in Leesburg, Florida, on September 26, 2024. Don, born in Kentucky, was the only child of Donald Ross Roberts and Helen Jean Angel. His family moved around the country but eventually settled in Ft. Myers, Florida, where Don graduated from Ft. Myers High School. He attended the University of Florida in Gainesville where he was a member of Chi Phi Fraternity. He also attended the University of South Florida. He graduated with a B.A. in Psychology and later a M.S. in Rehabilitation Counseling. Immediately after, he served in the US Army at Ft. Sam Houston at the end of the Vietnam War.

After marrying his wife Paula in 1971, he returned to Ft. Myers High School as the Counselor at the Exceptional Learning Center. He later became the Vice President of First Leasing and Funding of Florida and started a practice in marriage and family counseling. He and Paula began working in community theater and television, acting in some of the first Crime Stopper TV reenactments. He was President of the Cape Coral Players and was involved in nearly every production for 11 years. When several groups joined together to purchase the historic Arcade Theater downtown, he and Paula were involved in almost every


Pastor Roberts was also an author, writing numerous books for a wide

According to St Amour, the people were enthusiastic about the opportunity to receive such specialized health care services. Many people are suffering in this community. Although there is a large hospital in the Nan community, the vast majority of rural residents cannot afford to travel to a health center, the mobile clinic team was determined to bring health care to them. And thanks to the generosity and partnership of community members, they were successful in their mission. These people cannot afford to pay for the services.

One of first adult day care facilities in Palm Beach County celebrated 25 years. When New Day Adult Care Center, a non-profit mission of Faith/ North Palm Beach, FL, opened its doors 25 years ago this month, it was one of the first of programs of its kind in the County. "We saw a need to help our senior citizens who could not afford or who were not ready for longterm care, by providing care during the day and returning to their home in the evening," said church member Fran Hickman. Additionally, the impetus of the Center was to provide respite for caregivers of those who have physical frailty, as well as those who have begun their journey through cognitive decline.

Those missions continue today.
According to the Center's longterm Administrator, Julie Tombari,
"Our goal is to find or provide services
to allow clients to stay in their home
as long as possible." In recognition of
its momentous milestone, the Center
held a celebration on Tuesday, October
15, 2024. On any given weekday, more
than ten public transport buses, as well
as family members arrive at New Day's

doorstep dropping off participants to spend the day enjoying a variety of activity programs and access to needed health care/support.

"New Day's success stems from our administrator, said Benjamin Schuemann, president of Faith. "She takes time to work with the families. New Day was purposely designed to have a home-like feeling when you walk in. It gives clients the warm comfortable feeling they need."

Scheumann noted that as New Day progressed through the years, Tombari saw a need to implement more in-depth services for those on the path of Alzheimer's, and related disorders, hence nearly 10 years ago its Integrative Memory Enhancement Program (IMEP) was added. New Day boasts of being the only such provider of IMEP in the county. Created by St. John's Council on Aging, this highly beneficial program affords mental and physical exercise, as well as brain games and an assortment of fun and beneficial therapies. "This unique program is a structured, researchbased program that integrates the mind, body and brain connections to

boost cognitive reserve and minimize the progression of dementia," Schuemann continued.

One IMEP client sdescribed the program as "adding so much to my life. There's fun companionship and encouragement. Your program really works. I have seen a real improvement in my memory since I have been coming. My family has noticed it too."

Anyone who has cared for an aging loved one knows the mental, physical, emotional and spiritual toll it can take on a daily basis. As such, New Day, in conjunction with the local chapter of the Alzheimer's Association holds monthly educational support groups with guest speakers who address dealing with everyday situations. Practical examples of issues faced by caregivers include dealing with a parent who doesn't want to shower, incontinence, or walking through the house in the evening after bedtime. The mission of New Day Adult Care Center is to enhance the lives of dependent adults and their caregivers by providing quality social emotional, intellectual, spiritual and compassionate care in a communitybased program.

Two districts – English and the Slovak Evangelical Lutheran Church (SELC) – are non-geographical districts. The English District has 161 and the SELC has 52 congregations.

The LCMS has district conventions every three years, and the schedule includes time for conducting business, electing officers and sharing information. The conventions also offer opportunities for worship, nurture, inspiration and abundant fellowship with classmates, professors, friends and family.

The Florida-Georgia District will convene this coming June.

In addition to the commitment of the necessary time and energy that goes into a convention, the FLGA District now seeks nominations for service — officers and members of boards and commissions. District



Secretary, The Rev. Dr. Greg Michael, will accept nominations for a wide range of positions to be decided at next summer's convention.

Basic qualifications for candidates for all positions include:





- good standing in his/her congregation and community;
- a commitment of time needed to fulfill the responsibilities of the position (meetings);
- good communication and participation skills.

Also up at this convention is the District Secretary — who must be an ordained minister, highly qualified in word processing, communications and business practices.

FLGA District Board of Directors is comprised of parish pastors, commissioned Lutheran ministers and laypersons (men and women who are members of our district congregations. Qualifications sought for these people are the ability to make decisions and provide leadership in his/her congregation

At this June's convention delegates representing each congregation will elect:

- District President;
